WELCOMED AT PARIS.

The Automobiles Increase in Numbers and Popular Favor.

Not Only Pleasure Vehicles But Public Cabs and Delivery Wagons Are Now in Practical Use.

Consul-General Gowdy at Paris, reports to the state department that there has been a marked increase during the past year in the use of autimobiles in the city of Paris not only as pleasure vehicles, but for practical application as public cabs, and for business purposes as delivery wagons. They are especially useful for long distances. It is announced that soon there will be 100 motor cars driven by electricity running in the streets of Paris, and, if the experiment be successful. the cabs will be increased to 1,000.

With this project in view, a large plot of ground has been acquired, where the building of works necessary for the housing of the cabs and machinery for the electric supply are being rapidly this."

A training ground also has been made for the cab men. This is laid out with every possible form of paving wood asphalt, stone, etc.-including two steep hills. Here and there are dotted about a number of dummy figures, and in and out of these the cab men have to maneuver, under the orders of an instructor. As a rule in four lessons, it is stated, the driver is ready to navigate Paris, and after ten lessons is considered thoroughly competent.

Each cab is supplied with sufficient power to be driven 30 miles at about eight miles an hour.

Among the systems of automobiles in Paris there are mapy using petroleum, which called forth a most pronounced objection from the public by reason, first, of the odor passing following their passage; second, the noise, and third, for the passengers, the extraordinary vibration. A consummation of great value would be a machine which would combine durability, speed and economy without these annoyances and defects.

ROCK ISLAND ARSENAL.

Effort Being Made to Have the Plant Enlarged to Manufacture Small Arms.

Friends of the Rock Island arsenal have been in Washington for some time trying to get more liberal treatment by congress of that institution. They hope to secure a part of the appropriation for new machines, and the idea is to build up the Rock Island plant so as to enable the manufacture there of small arms for the army. It is said by the engineer officer and the ordnance experts that the plant of the Rock Island arsenal is sesceptible of developing to such an extent as to justify the employment of 25,000 men there.

The recent war with Spain and the condition of fright which was so prevalent in Massachusetts have led many thinking men of the house to the conclusion that the government should have a fully equipped arsenal and powder factory so far in the interior of the country as to be absolutely secure from invasion by any foreign army. This feature of the case is being impressed upon the attention of the house, and will, it is said, receive careful attention. so that in all probability Rock Island will at no distant date become a great center of ordnance supplies for the

ISLAND SINKS IN OCEAN.

Reitish Man-of-War Takes Important Soundings in South Seas.

The news has been brought to San Francisco from Australia that the Brtish man-of-war Penguin has just returned to Sydney, N. S. W., after taking soundings between the island of Longi and Auckland, N. Z.

The officers found that Falcon island. which suddenly came up out of the ocean in 1885, is gradually receding. When relocated by the Penguin's officers they discovered that the island is now three fathoms under water.

The officers of the Penguin also succeeded in taking the temperature of the ocean at a greater depth than ever before. Hitherto where the thermometer got down a certain distance it was invariably broken. On this occasion the thermometer was sent down 4.762 fathoms, where the temperature was found to be 35.5 degrees, while on the surface the temperature was \$2 de-

This line will be the first in the country, but it is proposed to build another line to the pyramids as soon as the natives become accustomed to the operation of the cars, and later to connect Alexandria and Cairo by trolley. Third Marriage of the Diva Predicted by an Italian Peasant Woman Many Years Age.

The prophecy of an old Italian peasant woman was fulfilled at Brecon, Wales, when Adelina Patti took Baron Cederstrom as he third husband. Patti; knew of the prophecy and probably found consolation therein when Roman Catholic and Lutheran ecclesiasticism seemed to stand between her and her

third marriage. The forecast which Patti made true is found in a volume of rambling sketches, entitled "Les Fugitives de Vienne," by Adolph Belot. The volume was brought out in Paris in 1883. Belot' relates that while he was in Monte Carlo Patti was made the subject of conversation between him and some friends. He expressed a hope to hear her in Paris, but was told it was vain, as she was to sail for America.

"She has been told," said Belot's companions. That if she goes to Americarte will hever come back, for she would die hile crossing the sea. A woman of ler own country told her

"Eh. bien!" replied Belot, "but to reassure her there is another prophecy which she probably has forgotten. One day in Florence I heard in the hotel where we both happened to be staying. a peasant woman predict to her that she would be married three times. As Marquis de Crux is not yet dead it is hardly probable that from the month of October to the month of March, her American season, she will have the time to bury Marquis de Crux, to marry Nicolini, to bury him also, and to take a third husband. AIDS SUBMARINE NAVIGATION.

George Jaubet Discovers Method of Renewing Oxygen in Air.

An important discovery has been an nounced by the French Academy of Medicine. George Jaubet has been experimenting on how to supply air or renew oxygen air for a man hermetically sealed in a space like a diving bell His hypothesis was that 79 per cent. of nitrogen contained in respirable air remains intact after the 21 per cent. of oxygen has been consumed, and that the same nitrogen, mixed with a new supply of oxygen, again becomes respirable air when the carbonic acid and vapor produced by breathing has been removed. M. Jaubet found his hypothesis to be correct. The most important question was the generation of oxygen. appears that he has discovered a chemical substance which, by contact with the atmosphere, clears the vitiated air of all impure gases produced by repiration and refurnishes, automatically, the requisite quantity of oxy fen. He states that six to eight pounds of this substance will enable a nai, to live for 24 hours in a diving bel! The importance of this discovery to homarine navigation is apparent.

- 少時精 Two members of the class of 1001, Princeton university, made a remarkable experiment during the Christmas holidays in practical sociology as applied to a study of the tramp problem in New Jersey. They put on old. dothes, placed revolvers in their pockets-the exact thing a true "hobo" would not have done-and left Princeton with not a penny in their pockets.

Walter Wyckoff, who made himself famous by playing traveling laborer for two years and writing books on his experiences, is now a professor at Princeton, and these two young men are members of his class. They wanted to practically test their teacher's teachings.

The students were Charles A. Foster and Alfred T. Fitzgerald. That is to say, these are the names they gave out. Their "tramp names" were "Hump' and "Mack."

They left Princeton on foot and got their first meal at a farmhouse. Then they boarded a railroad train and "bummed" their way to Monmouth. On the train, which was a freight, they fell in with some "hobos" and got a glimpse of their life there. At Monmouth they were challenged by the police and spent the night in the city jail. Near Perth Amboy they fell in with a big camp of tramps, and one of them was particularly striking. Of him one of the Princeton men says:

NOVEL LAKE MARINE PROJECT

Big Barge to Carry Small Boats Through the Lakes to the Erie Canal.

The Cleveland (O.) Steel Canalboat company at its meeting the other day decided to adopt a novel proposition in marine architecture. The company now sends canalboats down the lake in tow and then hauls them through the Erie canal.

The company has now constructed a steel barge 360 feet long and 45 wide, with double bottom and sides, which can be pumped out like a dry dock. Into this barge will be loaded the smaller boats for transportation to the head of the Eric canal, where they will be floated out and sent on their way. By the use of this barge the small boats will be saved from the dangers attending a trip on the lake in rough weather. Marine architects who have been consulted say the plan is entirely feasible.
