Andre Lafargue will head the commission to represent New Orleans, the bicentennial celebration committee and the Louisiana Historical Society in France October 23 and 25, at the two hundredth anniversary of the delivery to Bienville of a royal commission to found this city, and will have special powers to appoint such persons in Paris as he sees fit as additional members of the delegation.

Edward S. Butler, prominent New Orleans cotton exporter, president of the New Orleans Cotton Exporters' Association, and a member of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange, was agreed upon by the farmers unions of several Southern states late Tuesday afternoon as the Southern man to be recommended for membership on the Federal Export Board.

John G. Kiser, posing as Major Baxter, a legitimate major in the regular army, is now held by Forrest Pendleton of the Department of Justice. Kiser, who admits being a deserter from the regular army, was arrested by Assistant Superintendent Warner of the Pinkerton Agency, and Captain Danforth, after being trailed by them for several hours. Kiser is charged with having victimized banks in Memphis, St. Louis, Kansas City and Buffalo, while he also is said to have pumped his hand on a federal charge in Atlantic City.

Rumors in business and financial circles for the past few days to the effect that M. S. Sloan, vice-president and general manager of the New Orleans Railway and Light Company, had tendered his resignation, was announced Tuesday in an official announcement by M. Sloan that he had resigned to become connected with the New York Edison Company. His resignation becomes effective October 15.

John Hamilton, negro, 39 years old, Tuesday night stabbed to death Audie Dixon, negro, 28 years, also of 321 Saratoga street. Hamilton, according to the police, was jealous because the woman had been friendly with another negro.

Willie Lee and wife Tuesday began suit against the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company for \$50,000 damages for the death of their son, Walter Lee, September 14.

Sergeant John M. Dunn, commander of the Twelfth Precinct Station, and seven policemen, were dismissed from the police force, at the regular trials before Superintendent Mooney Tuesday morning. The dismissal of Sergeant Dunn came as the result of charges of neglect of duty.

Two hundred second lieutenants who have been in training in Camp Gordon and Fort McPherson, near Atlanta, Ga., arrived in Alexandria on a special train over the Southern Railway from New Orleans. They will be stationed at Camp Beauregard. It is announced that General Haynes will hereafter be in command of the camp, with Major Money as a chief of staff.

Ellen, the 3-year-old daughter of Reverend and Mrs. J. A. McCormick of Franklinton, succumbed to burns at the Bogalusa Hospital. The accident which caused her death occurred at the McCormick home in Franklinton Sunday while the mother was heating some water in an open fireplace.

Eugene Watson, formerly sheriff of St. Helena parish, who now lives near Fluker, was fired on twice by Jim Nickels, a negro, who has been employed to pick cotton. Nickels, following an argument, ran into the house, got his shotgun and followed Mr. Watson, who was unarmed, firing at him, but missing. The latter armed himself and immediately re-
