**SUGAR CANE.**—We have seen a few stalks of the Ribbon Cane, raised in Clark county this year, on the Plantation of Mr. S. B. Shields. There was a quarter of an acre planted, and it yielded cane enough to replant about three acres the next season. It was planted on the 15th of March, and cut on the 21st of Nov. well matured. The cane is larger and the growth apparently more luxuriant than the common cane that we have seen grown on the Mississippi. Mr. Shield's plantation is on the Alabama river, in lat. 31½, and this is his first experiment. The Ribbon Cane is said to be more hardy than other cane. This was raised on what is called "second low grounds," and withstood the extraordinary drought last summer, which in some places, it is said actually withered and killed the forest trees.—*Mobile Register.*

**Bills of Exchange.**—In the Senate, on Monday, the subject of reducing from 20 to 10 per cent. the rate of damages to be allowed and paid upon the protest and from non payment of bills of exchange, drawn upon any person or persons in Europe, produced some discussion in which Messrs. Crary, Stebbins, Spencer, Livingston, Hart, Nelson and Bogardus took a part.—The proposition as passed by the assembly, fixing the rate of damages at 10 per cent. was agreed to; and on motion of Mr. Stebbins the rate of damages on bills drawn upon any person residing in the states of Maine, New-Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Delaware, Maryland or Virginia, or in the District of Columbia, was reduced in cases of protest and non payment, from 5 to 3 per cent; and in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Kentucky or Tennessee, from 7½ to 5 per cent. In the remaining states of the United States, and in the W. Indies, Canadas, &c. the rate of damages remains at 10 per cent. as now fixed by law.  
Mr. Crary moved an amendment to the first section of title 3d proposing to reduce the rate of interest from 7 to 6 per cent. and supported his motion at some length. The proposition was further supported by Mr. Hart, and opposed by Messrs. Spencer and Bogardus, and was lost by the casting vote of the chairman, 8 rising in favor and 8 against the adoption of the amendment.  
Mr. Birdseye then moved to add to the section a provision declaring that where a loan is secured by a mortgage on real estate, or is for the purchase money of land contracted to be sold the rate of interest shall be six per cent. This amendment was supported by the mover and opposed by Mr. Bogardus, but without taking any question, the committee rose and reported progress.

It appears that the violent storm of last week did not extend far to the eastward, and that that of the preceding week was less severe than in this neighborhood. The Gardiner Chronicle of

Friday last says, that on Wednesday the 7th ult. there was not a particle of snow there, or north of that place, but on Thursday there was a slight fall of snow towards evening, that it was cold the whole week, and on Saturday and Sunday the ice extended across the river in several places, but that since Monday they had had warm rains, and the ice had entirely disappeared.

The people of Vermont are at this time much interested in a project for connecting Lake Champlain with Connecticut river, by means of a rail road. It is thought that the subject will be brought up before the Legislature at its present session.

**CHILI.**—We learn from the Providence Journal that Mr. Allen, late minister to Chili, took leave of the Vice President of the Republic on the 31st of July preparatory to his departure. At the same time Saml. Larned, Esq. late Secretary of Legation, was recognized as U.S. charge d'affaires. Interchanges of cordial civility passed between Mr. Allen and the Vice President, though the former regretted that the claims of his fellow citizens on that government had not been satisfied. A Commercial treaty has not yet been effected between Chili and the U. States.

The case of Alexander B. Shankland vs. the Managers of Gillespie's last drawn lottery, for the payment of one half the prize of 25,000 dollars, has been decided at Washington, for the defendants. The claim was founded on a half ticket signed by J. F. Webb for D. Gillespie. It appeared that the original ticket had been delivered to the Managers by Gillespie, before his failure, for which he valued it at a value from them.
