The packet ship Liverpool arrived yesterday from New York, has brought papers from that city to the 17th ult. An arrival from England has brought dates three days later than those previously received...

New York, April 17. The Ship Jubilee, C. pt. Chadlock, arrived yesterday morning from Liverpool, whence she sailed on 29th March...

The Sandwich packet had arrived at Falmouth from Lisbon. Among the passengers was Seoh'r Ferroh, with despatches from the Government of Don Miguel. She brings account of the death of the celebrated Marquis de Chaves.

The King of England continues to enjoy good health. A project is on foot in Holland to drain the lake of Harlem, which now covers 50,000 acres.

It is reported that Alexander Baring is about to be raised to the Peerage. Lord Doneraile has been unanimously elected a representative Peer for Ireland in the room of the late Marquis of Headfort.

The printers of Sheffield have petitioned Parliament for a reduction on the duty of advertisements inserted in newspapers. [Each advertisement now pays 3s. 9d. sterling duty to government.]

LONDON, March 24. The expedition to Cuba, according to a letter from Cadiz dated 5th March, would sail from that port on the 8th. It is to consist of 1 ship of the line, 1 frigate, 2 corvettes, and 1 brig of war...

Cádiz, March 5. El Señor Don Estanislao Morat has the contract for provisions, and he is actively engaged in affording a supply for at least 12 months. It is now well known that it was hunger, and not the Mexicans, that conquered Barradas.

PARIS, March 11.—M. de Monte Alegre, Minister of Spain, has received despatches from Madrid, with instructions to demand of Don Miguel in the most urgent manner the immediate publication of the amnesty which England, France, and Spain require of him...

It is affirmed that the Spanish General Barradas, who is now at Paris, has received from the King of Spain an honorable letter as a testimony of the esteem and favour of his Catholic Majesty.

Accounts from Vienna of the 24th February give news from Constantinople to the 8th ult. M. de Ribeaupierre has had an audience with the Grand Signor, with which he was satisfied.

Toulon, March 6.—Orders have just been given to the admiral prefect to have 55 flat-bottomed boats or rafts built at the port of Toulon, for the landing of the troops and the artillery.

Paris, March 8th. On the 5th of March, a conference was held between the Prince de Polignac and the British Ambassador, immediately after which the latter despatched a courier to London. It is believed that the Prince having resolved to strike a decisive blow, is desirous of consulting his friend the Duke of Wellington.

The Quotidian of 7th March, says, it is confidently reported that Gen. Clausel has applied to ministers for an appointment in the expedition against Algiers, protesting that henceforth his fealty is to the reigning dynasty.

London, March 7.—The rumor that a Minister is shortly to be sent to Portugal, is without foundation. There was yesterday a new discussion on the electoral franchises of the borough of East Redford. Mr. Tennyson proposed that its franchises should be transferred to Birmingham.

Mr. Conner, not apprehending that his amendment would embarrass the bill, and deeming it a proper opportunity for trying the question, declined withdrawing his motion.

The question being put on the propositions successively, they were both negatively by large majorities. On the suggestion of Gorham, and after some explanation from him, the bill was so modified as to apply to teas imported, from "any place east of the Cape of Good Hope," instead of "from China" alone.

Mr. Cambreleng moved to amend the bill, so as to put coffee on the same footing as to the privilege of being deposited in the public stores as tea.

This motion brought on some discussion between the mover, and Messrs. McDuffie, and C. P. White, in the course of which, the last named gentleman, in illustration of the subject, read the following statement.

Coffee imported in 1837 50,051,986 lbs. Exported 21,607,789 lbs. Consumed 28,355,197 lbs.

Coffee imported in 1828, 55,194,697 lbs. Exported 16,057,964 lbs. Consumed 39,136,733. The amendment was ultimately agreed to.

CONGRESSIONAL.

In the Senate, April 15.—The bill to alter the terms of credit on bonds given for duties on goods wares and merchandize, imported into the United States, having been reported by the committee correctly engrossed, was read the third time, and passed as follows:

A "bill to alter the term of credit on bonds given for duties on goods, wares and merchandize imported into the United States, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted, That, from and after the 21st day of December next, all duties on merchandize imported into the United States shall be paid or secured in the following manner, viz:

All sums not exceeding one hundred dollars shall be paid in cash.

All sums exceeding one hundred dollars shall, at the option of the importer, be paid, or secured to be paid, by bond or by a deposit of merchandize, as now authorized by law, one third in six, one third in nine, and one third in twelve calendar months, reckoning from the date of each respective importation.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary of the Treasury may give instructions to the Collectors of the Customs, under which instructions, the Collectors may receive bonds for duties from any purchaser, from an importer or consignee, instead of the bonds now required from the importer or consignee; but the entry shall be made and the duties shall be ascertained, as in other cases.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That no discount shall be allowed on the payment of duties to any person who is indebted to the United States on any bond due and unpaid.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That in every case where the owner, importer, or agent of any goods, wares, or merchandize, imported as aforesaid, and the duty upon which shall amount to one hundred dollars, or upwards, may, at the time of entry, or at any subsequent period, desire to pay the duties thereon in cash, the Collector of the port where the said goods, wares, or merchandize, may be entered, shall be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to receive the same, and allow a discount on the amount of the duties, at the rate of four per centum per annum, for such portion of the legal term of credit allowed by law on such duties, as may be unexpired at the time of making such payment in cash.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for officers of the Customs, at ports of delivery only, to take the oaths required of them by law before any magistrate, or other officer authorized to administer oaths within the district to which such port may belong.

In the House of Representatives April 15.—Tea and coffee.—Mr. McDuffie moved, that the Committee proceed to the bill "to reduce the duties on tea and coffee;" which motion was agreed to, and the bill was taken up.

On motion of Mr. McDuffie, the bill was amended, by substituting a specific duty of two and a half cents a pound on coffee, instead of the ad valorem duty, and the period for the commencement of the reduction changed from June 30 to December 31, 1831.

On motion of Mr. Duffie, the bill was further amended, by substituting a specific duty on the various teas, (amounting generally, to about half of the present duty) instead of ad valorem duty, and the period for its operation made the same as that on coffee.

Mr. Conner, of N. C. then moved to insert a clause to reduce the duty on salt to ten cents a bushel.

Mr. McDuffie beseeched his friend from North Carolina to withdraw this amendment. The merchants had been suffering for years for this bill; vessels were now coming in and insolvencies must be the consequence of further delay. The amendment would bring up a tariff discussion, and, although as much opposed to the whole system as any one; he deprecated bringing up the question on this bill. He therefore begged the gentleman to withdraw it.

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COMMERCIAL.

FOREIGN MARKETS.

LIVERPOOL, March 27.—Cotton.—The import this week in large, reaching 26,130 bags, and the sale are also very extensive, being 24,240 bags, at an advance of full 1-8d on Americas, and 1-8d to 1-4d on Brazils, viz.—500 Sea Island at 12 1/4d to 16 3/4d; 240 Stained do at 7d to 12 3/4d; 8300 Bowed at 6 7/8d to 7 1/2d; 2800 Orleans at 5 5/8d to 6 1/4d; 1100 Alabama at 6 1/2d to 7 1/2d; 1790 Pernambuco at 7 1/2d to 8 1/8d; 1080 Bahias at 7d to 7 3/4d; 2250 Maranhans at 7 1/4d to 7 1/2d; 30 Paras at 6 3/4d; 200 common West India at 5 1/2d; 300 Egyptian at 7d to 8 1/2d; and 800 Surats at 4 5/8d to 5d per lb. The export of Raw Cotton from Great Britain during the month ending 20th March, was 4193 bags, and from London, Liverpool and Hull, in the shape of only Calicoes (19,560) and Twist 8256, amounted to 27,596 bags of Raw Cotton.

NEW YORK MARKETS.

Saturday, 17th April.—Cotton.—Since our last report, very late accounts have been received from Europe—Liverpool to 29th, and Havre to 22d March, the advices from these markets especially the former, have been favorable, and large sales reported. In consequence there has been much activity in our market, and the sales from 10th to 16th inst. inclusive reach 6000 bags, namely 2000 bags of Uplands at 9 1/4 to 11; 1800 bags of Alabama at 10 1/2 to 12; and 2200 bags of New Orleans at 10 1/2 to 12 1/2 and very fine lot at 13. The range of our quotations we do not alter but on the common and middling qualities an advance of 1-4 to 1-2 has taken place since our last. The market closed yesterday with firmness and activity.

Molasses.—There has been some enquiry for New Orleans, about 150 hhds. have been sold at 30 1/2 to 31; and 100 hhds. New Iberia, at 32 to 33. For West India descriptions there has also been a moderate enquiry, and several hundred hhds. received direct and coastwise, have changed hands at terms which have not transpired. We therefore continue our quotations.

Sugars.—The demand during the week has not been active, but prices are nevertheless well maintained. In New Orleans, the private transactions have not been extensive. By auction yesterday 300 hhds old crop, brought 98 1/2 to 92 1/2 per 100 lbs. 4 months. For Porto Rico and St. Croix, there has been a moderate demand from the trade within our range. Yesterday 114 boxes White Brazil, were sold at 9 3/4, 113 barrels and 66 boxes Browns at 7 1/2. Several small lots of White and Brown Havana have changed hands within our range.
