Conjecture has however disappeared before the reality; and we have but too gloomy details to give on the storm, which has visited our city and rages un-

til the hour of penning the present (6 o'clock P, M.) The gale was ushered in, on Tuesday morning, by a fresh breeze from the E. S. E. accompanied with a copious rain. A momentary calm followed the rising of the sun; but between 8 and 9 o'clock the rain began to pour anew and the wind gradually rose into violence. From that moment until yesterday at 6 o'clock those two elements have unceasingly inundated our streets and shaken our dwellings. The greatest damage has been sustained in the harbour. Of the number of vessels, now in port, scarcely two or three have escaped uninjured. The pediars' boats have suffered mostly from the violence of the gale; shattered to pieces by Ship Jason, Coir, Liverpool, the 7th. the larger crafts, their fragments strew the strand of the river.
