## JOY IN SIBERIA OVER REVOLUTION

EMILES RETURNING EXPRESS LOYALTY TO NEW REGIME

## SOLDIERS WEAR THE RED BADGE

New Governor Arrived at One Point Just in Time To Be Arrested. Ovation for Exiles

Petrograd, April 1. (via London, April 4, -- Charles H. Boynton, the chairman of the Russian-American Chamber of Commerce, has reached here after a journey across Siberia. He said the revolution had been precied with enthusiasm at every lown through which he had passed. Twenty returning exiles, chiefly Socialists, were on hoard the train and were welcomed by immense serowds at the various railroad Estations. Military bands were par-(ading everywhere and speech making by revolutionary agitators went on day and night.

2 Mr. Beynton said the greater growd was composed of so'diers wearing the red badge of the revo-Hon. "I was impressed," he contimed, "by the unanimity of sondiment expressed on every side in Sfaver of a republic. The news of the arrival of the exiles seemed to Spreede us and at every station crowds clainored for a hight of athem and demanded speeches. One of the exiles, named Anisimo, a former member of the Duma who had been ten years in the mines. responded most frequently and spent most of his time on the platform.

"The speeches of all the exiles breathed loyalty and patience. They asked everybody to turn in and help defeat the common enemy. An amusing story was told on board the train with regard to a former gevernor who also was a passenger. He was a new appointee and had just arrived at his post at the moment of the triumph of the revofution. The governor later pledged his allegiance, fastened a red badge to his coat and was on is way to rejoin his regiment, but pparently still failed to apprecite the new order of affairs.

"After passing Ekaterinburg we entered the government of Perm. I was struck here by the fact that the demonstrations ceased. I learned latre that the governor of Perm was sa rabid reactionary and had expressed the news of the arrival of the exiles."

Mr. Boynton reported that travel ocnditions wer excellent and food abundant. He said that he had been told that an improvement was ioticeable immediately the new govcament took control.
