From the Richmond Compiler. Two American Ladies.—The two Miss Catons, who were as early as 1809 the reigning belles in Baltimore and Washington, were the grand daughters of Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, one

of the worthiest signers of the Declaration of American Independence. One of them was married to Mr. Robert Patterson, a merchant of Baltimore, and they went to France and England. Mr. Patterson died, leaving his widow a handsome fortune. Two or three years ago she was married to the Marquis of Wellesley, then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. Her sister was first married to Col. Hervey, Aid-de-Camp to Lord Wellington, who had distinguished himself and lost an arm at the battle of Waterloo. A few weeks ago Lady Hervey was married to the Marquis of Carmarthen, eldest son of the Duke of Leeds. The Marquis was born on the 21st May, 1798. He is the eldest son and "heir apparent," as the English papers style him, to the title of the Duke of Leeds. Thus fortune, in her freaks, has raised to two of the most distinguished noble families of the British empire two sisters, the daughters of an American republican, and the direct descendants of the only surviving signer of the Declaration of American Independence.

From the New-York Gazette. One of the most extraordinary acts on the part of a jury that we ever recollect to have recorded, occurred the present week in the Circuit Court in this city. It appears that the trial was given to the jury in the evening, who retired and after a long deliberation came into Court and informed Judge Edwards that they could not agree, at the same time requesting that they might be discharged. This the judge refused, when they returned to the jury-room, and after some further consultation, hit upon an expedient to get released. A paper was drawn up and signed by all the jurors, stating in substance that they had deliberated on the subject and had ascertained that they could agree upon a verdict. The document was folded up and sealed, and when the officer who had the charge asked if they agreed, such an answer was given to him by one of the jury, (who at the same time showed him a paper which it was a mistake enough for him to imagine was the verdict) as induced him to believe that they had really come to a decision—they were accordingly permitted to separate and return to their families and homes.

In the morning when the judge read this extraordinary document, he was, as it is very natural to suppose he should be, highly indignant at the contempt towards the Court over which he presided; he gave them a severe reprimand and told them to appear the next morning to hear his sentence. They attended at the opening of the Court, when the judge, after a proper admonition, ordered them to pay a fine of \$100 each.
