"Having some knowledge, from my official position at that time, of the policy and objects of the convention of 1828. I am quite persuaded that its main design was to lead, in a future partition of the territory, to the recognition of our claim to the country, not north, but south of the 19th parallel, and between that and the Columbia river. A division of the country upon that principle, with a reasonable regard to rights grown up under the joint possession, always appeared to me to afford a just and practicable basis for an amicable and honorable adjustment of the subject. Such, also, I was satisfied were the views of our Government at the time I engaged in my recent mission; and in earnessly and steadily laboring to effect a settlement upon that basis, I was but representing the policy of my own Government, and faithfully promoting the intentions and wishes of the President."

The Circular on Drawbacks.—There was a report for several days after the issue of the circular iron the Treasury Department, in relation to drawbacks, that it was to be reconsidered. But the report has died away, and so far as is now known, Mr. Walker is determined to let the circular stand.

Our readers understand the peculiarities of this question. On a large amount of the foreign goods imported into this country, and which remained unconsumed, and in a condition to be entitled to dehentire, there had been paid a duty so much higher under the tariff of '42 than they are charged with under the act of '46, that it was the interest of the importer to export them for the sake of the drawback.

It was predicted, at the time the new tariff was under discussion in the Senate, that these exportations would be trade, and Mr. Webster estimated that the loss which would accree to the revenue of the government; in consequence of these exportations, would be very large, so much so as to make a very material item in stating the probable condition of the treasury in the ensuing year.

When the bill of '46 was passed, preparations were mades to export the goods, on which the high duty had been paid, and which were entitled to drawback.—Mr. Walker then issued his circular of the 25th of August, instructing the Collectors of the several ports to reluse to pay the drawback, listen goods are intended ever to be reimported into the United States.

The whole question turns on the debenture oath prescribed by law, which the Secretary quotes and italicizes as follows:

"And the said exporter or exporters shall likewise make oath, that the said goods, so noticed for exportation, and laden on board such ship or veasel previous to reluse to pay the drawback, sing

such a thing might occur, and it probably has often occurred.

But Mr. Walker holds on to his construction of the law, novel and opposed to all precedents as it is. Yet this will not prevent the goods being exported. Some will go out with the intention of selling them for another market. Some will go out with the intention of bringing them back, if the interest of the owner shall seem to require it. In the first case there will be no dispute about the right to the drawback; and in the latter case it will be necessary for a suit to be instituted by the government to foreit the goods, vessel, &c. or the owner will sue the collector who refuses to pay the drawback, and have his retnedy against him as against any other individual who does wrong. In both cases the result will be the same: the government will lose, as it is right it should lose, the drawback; and the importer will pay, all be ought to be required to pay, that is the duty charged on the goons saken they are taken for consumption.
