The King of Holland has likewise sent troops to Luxembourg, and ordered its new Governor, the Dake of Saxe Weimar, to allow its inhabitants only a month, from the date of ne 5th jest, to return to their allegiance. His Majesty is supported in the view of the right by the award of the great Powers of Europe represented by their Plenipotentiaries in the Congress of London, and aided in maintaining it by the troops of the German confederation, of which the duchy in 1815 was made to form a part. On the other hand, the people of the province have generally declared for a union with Belgium, and have sent their representation to the Belgic Congress.
