TO BREAK UP BANK PRACTICE.

A Novel Case Comes Up for Trial in the Federal Court at Omaha, Neb.

A case is on trial in the federal court at Omaha, Neb., that is attracting much attention from bankers and capitalists.

The treasurer of the mutual society known as the Modern Woodmen of America, going out of office turned over as part of his assets a certified certificate of deposit for \$15,000 on the Union national bank of Omaha.

The defense will attempt to establish that it is customary for national and state banks in the west to issue these accommodation certificates without consideration and which cannot be cashed.

The insurance company maintains that in any event the bank is liable for the amount of the certificate, because the insurance company actually took that amount of money, as the bondsman of the treasurer was discharged before the bank had repudiated the certificate.
