# GLOOMY NEWS FROM RUSSIA CAUSES U.S. TO HURRY ACTION

Foreign Mission To Be Dispatched at Once. --- Record War Budget Reported On in Congress. Food Legislation Planned.

Washington, May 15.—The receipt of further unfavorable news from Russia caused the State Department to hurry arrangements for the departure of the mission headed by former Senator Root. Some dispatches indicate that Germany is leaving no stone unturned to break down the Russian government with the object of forcing separate peace.

Washington, May 15.—The Appropriations committee of the senate today reported on the most gigantic war budget ever proposed by this or any other country. It carries a total of \$3,390,340,381,22 in appropriations. The President was clothed with sweeping powers to spend millions for ships and force the builders to construct them.

Washington, May 15.—Thirty-seven senators and representatives, members of the house and senate agricultural committees, Secretary Houson and Herbert Hoover, consulted with President Wilson tonight at the White House on plans for rushing food legislation.

After two hours the conference determined that minimum food prices be fixed and Food Dictator appointed. Hoover will be the dictator. The conference was the first of a series the President will hold to speed up war legislation.

Washington, May 45.—The United States is forced to go to France for Aeroplanes. Machines of American manufacture fail to meet the War Department test. The contract for supplying the entire army of 1,200,000 will be placed abroad. The initial order of 1,800 has already been placed.
