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NEW ORLEANS: TUESDAY, MAY 12, 1829.

DONALDSON, May 9. The court for the second judicial district, opened in this town, on Monday last—Judge Esnault, presiding.

The suits in civil cases have been very few in number.

The criminal cases were four: Simon Whip, was tried on an accusation of manslaughter, and acquitted.

Clement Separo, tried for the same offence, was found guilty of assault & battery, sentenced to six months imprisonment, and the costs.

Thomas Jordan, charged with larceny, was acquitted.

J. B. Desarré, was sentenced to four days imprisonment, for assault and battery.

The Season.—The morning continues cool although at noon the heat is sufficiently felt. Vegetation has been much retarded. The cane on the plantations fronting on the river, is very small, considering how near summer is at hand. In places, back from the Mississippi, a few plantations seem as if they had got a month's or two start of the rest. Mr. Randal's on the bayou Lafourche, is one instance of the kind, and we have heard of another, Mr. Ed. Potts, on the highlands 8 or 9 miles north of Baton Rouge, a 3 miles east of the Mississippi. The latter is particularly remarkable as tending to support the theory of some, that the presence of a thick forest, with adds to and not diminishes, the warmth of the atmosphere.

The Pittsburg Gazette of Friday says—The amount of travelling through our city, and the number of stranger visiting it on business, have been unusual since the opening of the spring.—The registers of our hotels, although imperfectly kept, clearly prove this. Those of the mansion House Hotel, and the Pittsburg Hotel, for the last seventeen days, exhibit an aggregate of considerably above six hundred names—each arrival only being entered.

Letters received in Charleston from Augusta state, that the amount of insurance in the South Carolina Insurance Company, on the property recently destroyed in that place, is between 7 and 10,000 dollars. In the Hartford, (Conn.) Insurance company \$45,000, and in the Augusta and Georgia Insurance companies about \$60,000.

We learn from the Augusta Chronicle that a place of shelter has been offered by a benevolent citizen to those who have been rendered houseless by the fire.

Malte Burn's Universal Geography.—The seventh posthumous volume of the Précis de la Géographie Universelle, par M. Malte Brun was brought out in the course of last year. The person who has undertaken the task of editing this great work, has been

praise of M. Bory de St. Vincent, in an article inserted in a recent number of the Revue Encyclopédique. The volume contains the description of Germany, Switzerland, and Italy. The author is pronounced by M. Bory de St. Vincent to have, in many respects, risen to a level with the style of Malte Burn, and to have produced a work astonishing by the variety of interesting recitals, by the superiority with which the different questions of Natural History connected with Geography, and even subjects of high, moral, and political importance, are treated. In the latter, the author exhibits an independence, and a philosophy which have nothing offensive in them, because they are confined to conveying instruction.

A New State in North America.—A Paris paper of February 17, says "By an Act of the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, a new State has been formed in that part of North America; it bears the name of Macpo."

On the death of the famous Ex-Director, Barras, in France, in January last, a Justice of the peace of the neighborhood immediately attached and sealed up all his papers, by virtue of an order which he had received in 1825, nearly four years before, from one of the Cabinet of Paris. Barras had been thirty years in retirement, as a private citizen. His widow applied to the courts for the restoration of the papers, and the case was discussed in them on the 27th February. The King's attorney general asked and obtained a postponement. We are struck with the whole history of the proceeding, as exemplifying the continuance of arbitrary ideas and practice under a free constitution. Liberty does not yet appear to be understood, in the detail, in France. This evil prevails in a greater degree in the new Spanish American States. Monstrous abuses of right, the most tyrannical oppressions, are committed with impunity and submitted to as a matter of course, in the subordinate departments of political and municipal Government.

In the Kingdom of the Netherlands, from 1815 to 1825, there were 430,000 marriages, and 605 legal divorces. In the northern provinces, the proportion was as one to every 327; in the southern as one to every 3317.

A singular instance of the visitation of crime occurred Paris in the fourth week of February. A merchant tailor, of Nantz, named Deshaquères, a married man, formed there an illicit connection with one of the young females employed for his establishment. His wife, the mother of five children, committed suicide from jealousy and despair.
