Dear Sir—We are at present posted at the plantation of genoral Hernandes. Our company, with captain Henry's Irish volunteers, consisting of the same number as ours, constitute an advance party of the Carolina regiment. This regiment is the left wing, and destined to operate on a line south of St Augustine—ear line of operations will be confined, as I understand it, to the Atlantic casast, or between that coast and the St John's river. The first enemy we shall probably encounter will be Philip, who is chief of a tribe, and why acts independently of the Powell party. He is said to be no despicable enemy—savage and cruel—Our present position is 30 miles due south from St Augustine—a few miles from the Atlantic—so near that we can easily hear the beating and roar of the surf. The sugar mails have been all burnt in this section of the country, and many rich and valuable sugar plantations entirely broken up.

We shall probably have a travelling road as far as Smyrna, 50 miles from this point; beyond that, we shall have to cut our way or leave our baggage, and pursue the indian trails.

Mr Ewing, from the committee on public lands, to whom was reterred a bill to appropriate, for a limited time, the proceeds of the sales of the public lands of the United States, and for granting lands to certain states, reported the same, to the senate of the United States, on the 27th ultimo, with amendments, and recommended its passage. The report concludes as follows:

From the above data, your committee estimate the average receipts from the sales of the public lands for the next ten years, if the country continue in peace, if the land system be faithfully preserved, and if the sales be guarded from combination and fraud, at an average of something more than ten millions of deliars per annum. There is already in hand, to be disided by the terms of this bill, \$20,671,125.75; of this, the several states will be editted to receive the same shown by the annexed table, and of the receipts of each succeeding year, until the next census, in nearly the same proportions.
