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HAPPENINGS 69 YEARS AGO.

Buffalo—Immense herds of buffalo have recently congregated on the frontiers of Texas, between the Brazos and the Colorado. Several small herds have been seen below Bastrop, in places that have not been visited by these animals for years. Their presence in such large numbers on the frontier is attributed to the great severity of the winter in the Northern prairies.

The first American who ever crossed the plains to Santa Fe was Mr. James Pursey, in 1805.

The famine of 1846-47, in parts of Great Britain and Ireland, has already destroyed 2,000,000 of human beings. There is no exaggeration in this statement. The London Spectator asserts the number to be full two millions, and the statement is corroborated by relief committees, and British statesmen.

September 18, 1847.—The French citizens of New York, celebrated the birthday of Lafayette on the 6th inst., with much spirit.

A private letter from the seat of war contains the following paragraph, by which it will be seen how difficult and costly it is for any officers to get a letter sent home. "The only way of sending letters is to hire Mexican express and pay him one hundred dollars. Fifty officers club together, and each only are allowed to write half a sheet of thin letter paper, so that the express rider can secrete them, to avoid detection, which would be certain death, in case he should fall into the hands of the guerrillas." I send the present wrapped round the whip-handle of a muleteer and have bargained with a robber to carry my next letter in his boot. He is at present, no doubt, pursuing his gentlemanly occupation, but is to call upon me in a few days."

Deutsche Spiegel à l'Abeille.

Chicago, 11 août. — M. Maurice Bernhardt, cousin germain de la grande tragédienne, vit à Chicago dans une petite maison meublée. C'est un vieillard de quatre-vingt-deux ans; il est le fils d'un ouvrier qui exerce autrefois à Paris, il a pris part à la guerre de Sécession. Il arriva aux Etats-Unis en 1855, comme courrier de l'ambassadeur de France. Quelques années plus tard, M. Maurice Bernhardt, qui parle neuf langues, l'anglais, le français, l'allemand, l'espagnol, l'italien, le flamand, le yiddish, le portugais et le hollandais, fut nommé interprète officiel par le président Lincoln.

Après avoir servi six ans dans la Marine des Etats-Unis, M. Maurice Bernhardt s'essaie dans les affaires,

mais il perd une fortune assez ronde. Il quitta alors New-York pour s'établir à Chicago, où il exerce la profession de placier en parfumerie. Le Gouvernement américain lui ait actuellement une pension de 1825 francs par an avec laquelle il subvient aux besoins de trois enfants qu'il laisse son fils et qui ont été recueillis par un orphelinat de Chicago.

In the order of their importance, from a percentage standpoint, the increases for the several items rank as follows: Salaries, 37.2 per cent; capital, 23.7 per cent; salaried employees, 22 per cent; primary horsepower, 20.7 per cent; wages, 19 per cent; materials, 18.3 per cent; value added by manufacture, 15.8 per cent; wage earners, 6.1 per cent, and number of establishments, 2.7 per cent.

The capital invested, as reported in 1914, was \$22,790,880,000, a gain of \$12,610,000, or 23.7 per cent, over \$18,282,700,000 in 1909. The average capital per establishment was approximately \$83,000 in 1914 and \$89,000 in 1909.

VALUE OF PRODUCTS.

The value of products was \$24,216,323,000 in 1914 and \$20,672,052,000 in 1909, the increase being \$3,574,271,000, or 17.2 per cent. The average per establishment was approximately \$88,000 in 1914 and \$77,000 in 1909.

The value of products represents their selling value or price at the plants as actually turned out by the factories during the census year and does not necessarily have any relation to the amount of sales for that year. The values under this head also include amounts received for work done on materials furnished by others.

Statistics of Manufactures in the United States, Census of 1914.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 11.—A preliminary statement of the general results of the census of manufactures for the United States has been issued by Director Sam L. Rogers of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. It consists of a summary comparing the figures for 1909 and 1914, by totals, prepared under the direction of Mr. William M. Stewart, chief statistician for manufactures.

The figures are preliminary and subject to such change and correction as may be found necessary from a further examination of the original reports.

PERCENTAGES OF INCREASE.

The population of the United States at the census of 1910 was 91,972,266, and it is estimated that it was 98,781,000 on July 1, 1914.

The summary shows increases at the census of 1914, as compared with that of 1909, for all items except proprietors and firm members, for which a slight decrease is shown.
