Timber Bamboo.

The plantings of the Oriental timber bamboo in northern Florida and Louisiana have grown to a height of 25 feet, and there is no longer any question about their producing in this country good canes comparable to those which they produce in China and Japan. A quick method of their propagation has been worked out so that it will be now possible to supply large enough quantities of the young plants to set out many small areas throughout the South, from the Carolinas to California wherever there is sufficient moisture and the land is not too high priced to admit of their cultivation.

Bird Act Still in Force.

The United States Department of Agriculture has received inquiries from sportsmen in various parts of the United States as to the effect of the ratification of the treaty between the United States and Great Britain in reference to migratory birds upon the migratory-bird act of 1913 and the regulations issued thereunder. In response the department has made the following public announcement: In the opinion of the department, the migratory-bird act and regulations are still in force; also these will continue in operation, and the department regards it as its duty to enforce them, pending the enactment by Congress of new legislation for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the treaty.

Louisiana Historical Society.

At the next meeting of the Louisiana Historical Society, Mr. W. O. Hart, a member of the executive committee thereof, will present to the Society, for its permanent records, several articles regarding the late Charles A. Maurin, one of Louisiana's great chess players, together with a newspaper portrait of Mr. Maurin which is said by his friends to be a striking likeness. His father was judge in this city for many years, and his picture hangs on the walls of the old Supreme Court room of the Cabildo, the permanent home of the Society.

Judicial Reform.

At the request of Mr. Thomas W. Shelton, of Norfolk, Va., chairman of the committee of the American Bar Association on Uniform Judicial Procedure, Mr. W. O. Hart, a member of the association, has written to the Senators and Representatives from Louisiana asking their support of a bill prepared by the association and reported favorably by the judiciary committee of the United States Senate, investing in the Supreme Court of the United States the same power to make rules of procedure on the law side as it has on the equity side. This is a reform which will be in the interest of certain and prompt procedure. Mr. Hart has also written at the request of Mr. Shelton to Senators Walsh, of Montana; Reed, of Missouri; Hope Smith, of Georgia, and Cummins, of Iowa, with whom he has some acquaintance, asking their support for the bill, and has also written on the subject to the president and to the attorney general.
