In Conformity with the request of Major General Gaines of the United States Army, commanding the western department, a Regiment of Eight Companies, composed of Riffemen or Infantry or of both, will be held in readiness to assemble at a moments warming and march to the assistance of the troops now engaged at Florida, in subduing the Seminole Indians.

The commander-in-chief confidently relies upon the zeal and patriotism of the citizens of Louisians, for the voluntary enrolment of the requisite number. In H aton Rouge a company of gallant men have anticipated the call, and offered their services; and their example will now, no doubt, be followed in different parts of the State.

As soon as the requisite number is completed, their organization will be announced, and it will be held in readiness to assemble at New Orleans at a moment's warning, to be mustered and emberked for Florida.

In order to ensure the prompt compliance with this call, every officer of the militia is required to complete immediately the organization of the corps he commands, to order musters, whether of company or batallion at the earliest period allowed by law, and to transmit this order to those under him with all possible designated.

The waters were at that time all high, and travelling consequently very difficults and the company was therefore filled from a cir cumscoibed district. Many men who had families and imperious affirs to prevent their aerving their country, having only three days' netice upon the occasion, were obliged to hire substitutes at whatever price they could get them.

By what law can Mr Smith hold the two offices of Adjutant and Inspector-general, and Colonel of the Legion, at the same time? It is improper and illegal. But Governor White, not satisfied with the violation of every correct democratic principle, or a multiplication of offices in one man, will persist in going still farther, and appoints him to the command of the volunteers—thus going directly in the face of all principle and all law: For first, Mr Smith should not and cannot hold two military commissions at the same time—2d, one law in relation to raising the volunteers, requires that a General officer should be appointed to the command of the volunteers.

But Governor White has acted altogether in this business through favoritisms, or without due reflection. Without the semblance of law, he has commissioned by him.

For my own part. I have applied to him and to the Adjutant General, for three months past, to have my staff continusiones; nay, I have called upon them personally for this purpose—but they have failed to cemply with my demands.

Those who know me, will never for a moment suspect in these remarks, that I am at all actuated by any personal feeling against Governor White. I have sense enough to know that in onr relative positions, it behowers me to be extremely circumspect in whatever my feelings may dictate me to say—and I am pains I, mortified most exceedingly, that the opinions I have hitherto had of him are changed—that, in a word, I am compelled to come out against him in this mare, but I feel that I have been treated with indignity, that an attempt has been made to take from me my fust rights, as the Senior Major General of the State of Louisians.
