It will be perceived by the report of the Board of Health of New-York, that on the 17th September there were only 5 deaths by cholera.

The northern mail of this day duly came to hand. Later European intelligence will be found below.

From England there is nothing new, and the only political intelligence from the continent of Europe of any interest is in relation to Spain. Of this we translate all that is important.

We are much astonished to find the Captain-General Palafox connected with the conspiracy. It is hoped that he has only been guilty of some imprudence, of which his admitted incapacity did not permit him to see the consequences.

The elections in Maine have been most decisive. The Bank has been defeated, and its forces utterly overwhelmed. Returns have been received from 274 towns, giving 34918 for Dunlap, the Republican candidate, and 31922 for Sprague, the Federal candidate.

The returns of representatives whose names are given in "The Age," show 65 Democratic Representatives, 51 Wigs or Feds. The remaining counties will increase the majority of Democrats a greater ratio.

There have been two very destructive fires in Boston. The Presbyterian church in Wall street, and the turpentine distillery, belonging to Messrs. Kntridge & Wyman of South Boston, were both entirely consumed.

LATER FROM EUROPE. The ship Isaac Hicks, from Liverpool, brings papers to the 2d, and the Mary Jane, from Rochelle, Paris papers to the 5th.

Two thousand Carlists were three days since at Montdragon, and three thousand at Arranmayone. The Carlists have attacked Eybar, but two hundred men from Bergara caused them to fall back.

Government has received despatches from St. Jean de Luz of 30th July. On the 25th an action took place at Acharo Aranes, between Gen. Rodil himself at the head of 2500 infantry, and Zuzala-Carregui, with three battalions of Navarre, and some other battalions of Alva.

We have received by express very important news from Spain. The Cholera has entirely ceased its ravages, from the 26th, inclusive to the evening of the 27th, there had not been more than two decided cases.

We learn that Gen Rodil had two successful encounters with the insurgents on the 25th and 27th, one at Raciquin and Urdaitz, and the other between Lantz and Arantz, in consequence of which, the rebels have retired towards the frontiers of France.

Yesterday the pretender hastily left Leraca, and some say took the direction of Arantz. It is thought that the results of the affair of the 27th will have made him change his route.

Although Gen Rodil has not succeeded in defeating the rebels en masse, he brings them into action in detail, by the combined movement of his columns.

It is said that a person arrived in town from Bilbao, brings intelligence of an engagement between a detachment of the Queen's troops under Gen. Ariste, and a body of Carlist commanded by Simon Torre of their principal chiefs.

It cannot be denied that a good many people, from the age of 17 to 40, either through fear or from attachment to the party, are proceeding to the places assigned them, by the decree of Don Carlos.

One correspondence from Bayonne, to-day conforms what we have already stated, viz that an action took place on the 25th and 27th, between the troops of Rodil and the hands of Zumalacarrqui. Relative to the engagement on the 25th, we have the annexed official bulletin, published by direction of the Spanish Consul.

Head Quarters at Corda, 25th July. About 5000 insurgents, under command of Zumalacarrqui, Uranga, Cusillas, and others, having the advantage of a favorable position, assayed to attack me in flank, on my march to-day upon Olazagoina.

St. Sebastian, July 30. News has been received here, that three battalions of infantry and all the cavalry of the insurgents has been destroyed. The Pretender, who was at Euzondo, was obliged to quit that town on the 27th, on account of the approach of the Queen's troops.

St. Jean de Luz, Aug. 2. By a private letter we learn some particulars of the engagement which has taken place in the neighbourhood of Arantz. A band of insurgents, commanded by Zumalacarrqui in person, was attacked by a regiment of the Queen's troops; the insurgents immediately sounded a retreat, leaving on the field of battle, 70 killed, and a number wounded.

The greatest discouragement prevails in the ranks of the insurgents. They are subjected to every species of privation, both for want of provisions, and ammunition of war. Desertions are numerous.

The British government, by agreement with our Consul, has directed the departure of several vessels of war to cruise on the coast of Spain, belonging to the disturbed provinces, and His Majesty's Government, in consequence of these vessels will exert a moral influence upon our troops, by plainly demonstrating the friendship which happily exists between the two governments, has, by means of a circular, directed all the maritime authorities to regard them with all that confidence and respect which a loyal intercourse (correspondence) may require.
