ITEMS OUT OF THE ORDINARY FROM THE DAY'S COURT GRIND

This is a story from the Dryades street district, where business competition is keen, and the quirk of trade are many.

Nine years ago Mrs. John Tuyes purchased some second-hand furniture from Loan J. Chambers, of Melchome street, near Dryades, to be paid for in installments.

Copies of this list, declares Mrs. Tuyes, were left at the houses at 818 and 823 Thalia street, although Chambers was aware that she did not reside at either address. This was done, she declares, for the purpose of letting other people know that Chambers claimed to be her creditor.

ALL JUDGES SIT ON CASE

Decision of Technical Nature Will be Rendered Tomorrow

The five district civil judges sitting on bench, will tomorrow morning, hand down a decision of a good deal of interest to lawyers. The issue involved is whether Act 531 of 1915 is retroactive, that is whether it applies to certain cases already in the courts at the time of its adoption.

Act 531 specifies that tutors to a minor may file bond with the court in preference to supplying a mortgage in favor of the tutor. Some attorneys think that in cases where a mortgage had already been filed before the act went into effect a change can now be made, while others believe that the law applies only to cases originating after its promulgation.

HOW 1 MUNITION PLANT WAS BUILT

London, June 19.—Leading Germans admit that England's industrial mobilization for war was quicker and more efficient than Germany's.

"Eighteen months ago the factory did not exist; today it employs more than 3,000 men and 9,000 women operatives and a staff of 700 men and nearly 500 women, while 10,000 men are still engaged in completing its construction."

"It comprises an area of twelve square miles and has an internal light railway system of nearly 100 miles. Two townships have been built up by the munitions department for the work people."

"More than 6,000 are housed in hotels; 1,300 more live in bungalows, and 550 families are accommodated in married quarters. A central kitchen provides over 14,000 cooked meals daily for the factory messroom, and a bakery produces 13,000 pounds of bread a day."

"All waste food from the hotels and messrooms is collected for pig-feeding. Each of the townships has its drapery and other shops run on co-operative lines. The factory laundry handles 6,000 articles daily. A hospital, a dental surgery, two large schools, two cinema theatres and two institutes are also provided."
