THE NEW YORKERS by the northward, and others,

are at the evening of the last sat., Philadel-

phia of the 2d and Washington of the 3d.

The ship *Erica* Dravon had arrived at New York, from Liverpool, with London papers of the 27th of August, and Liverpool to the 25th. Not having our regular files, we give the summary, extracts, and market news of the Courier & Co's.

**SHIPWRECK.**—The French ship *Trinity*, captain BERTHIER, from Brest, whence she sailed on the 12th of August, was wrecked, on the 15th inst., in the vicinity of Tyre Hammock. On account of continued stress of weather, accompanied by dense fog, the captain could take no observation for several days, in an attempt to make the passage of the Suez Canal, the vessel struck in three fathoms water. The weather then being calm, and a strong current setting towards the land, became impossible to extricate the ship, which finally sank, the sea washing over her deck. The cabin, after remaining a day on the wreck, fit a part of it had in the long boat, (the jolly boat being stored up,) pieced the land; but the danger to the crew and passengers becoming hourly more imminent, he resolved to trust to his fallow officers to the chances of a raft, on which they reached the land, being sixty miles from the wreck, in the space of twenty-four hours. The crew, consisting of nineteen men, together with thirty-four passengers, among whom were two women and eleven children, were all safe; but they lost all their property. They entered the western part of the state through the lake of New Iberville (Atakapas,) and a part of them had reached the city. The ship and the principal part of the cargo were consigned to P. & E. SCOTT of this city. The cargo consisted of wines, brandy, &c., &c., a portion of it is expected, may yet be saved. The vessel was partially insured.

The *Mercure Belge* has just arrived in New York, to the arrival and departure of general MANUEL GOZ PEPEZ.

The gentle deporter of the brig, was *Bella Vista*, which was to have awaited him, in this port, his doublets, been the origin of so unfeigned a report.

The *Bella* indeed, formerly belonged to the Eastman to party; but the lieutenant and crew, while the captain was abroad at Campobello, raised the standard of SANTA ANA, and effected their escape, with the vessel, to Vera Cruz. A representation of the transaction, having been made by the Eastman minister, to the Mexican Charge d'Affairs at Washington, has directed the Mexican consul in this city to seize the vessel, upon the charge of piracy.

Upon a closer perusal of our Mexican files we meet with further particulars of Bustamante's defeat. The *Censor* of the 1st instant, contains an article from Mexico, quoting a letter from a gallant and worthy officer, dated Tula, 26th of September. The annexed extract:

"Long live freedom! my friend had promised to inform you of passing events and now fulfil my promise. It is 4 P.M., and I feel great satisfaction in transmitting to you the news of Bustamante's total rout at St. Louis de la Paz, on the 21st September. The triumph of the liberals has been celebrated here, though with the bitter conviction that it was obtained over brother Mexicans, who have devoted themselves to the ambitious views of aristocratic wreches, misguided by a sinister spirit of domination over the inhabitants of this fair climate."

The writer of the above is attached to the division of Col. Palao who is stationed in the vicinity of Tula, with a body of 1200 troops.

Advice from Orizaba, under the date of the 1st of October, state that the liberator has already taken up his line of march, in consequence of the news of Facio's preparation to fall back on Perote.

In effect, he would soon reach Perote.

Indeed general Santa Anna left his headquarters at Queretaro on the 23d issuing an energetic proclamation to his troops, in which he confidently looks forward to the justice of his cause.

The same files convey the intelligence that general Valenzuela, who in Huachinango, in the state of Mexico, had come out with a declaration of neutrality, between both parties, has since recalled his declaration and declared, his adherence to Bustamante's tota, route at St. Louis de la Paz, on the 21st September.
