The following extracted from the above mentioned letter deserves particular attention.

"At Zepatilan every case of cholera that occurred was cured by the use only of the root of a plant called by the matives coquelicat sauvage* [amepole Sylvestre] and with which the country abounds. The mice is extracted and the patient takes it internally. It has invariably been found efficacious, and none have yet taken it but with the most decided success.
