We have received by the bark London a Liverpool paper of the 26th of April. The following articles were the only ones that appear any way interesting:

**LONDON, April 21.**  
A French Paper, received this morning, states that despatches has been sent to General Guillemor, the French Ambassador, ordering his return to Constantinople. This is probably to accede concert with Mr. Gordon, our Ambassador extraordinary, for it is evident that prompt measures must now be adopted to bring the affairs of the East to a final settlement.

**PORTUGAL.**—The French Government has paid a public homage to Dona Maria's rights to the crown of Portugal. It declares that she is recognized as the legitimate heiress to the kingdom. And this declaration is grounded on a decree of the Emperor of Brazil, whose abdication was only made in favor of his daughter.

**THE MAILS.**—For a month or six weeks past the rains which have hindered the roads heavy, and so that the arrival of the mails. No final failure has occurred it is true, about here; but we doubt whether some have not taken place above us.

It has long been matter of surprise with us that the Post-Master General has not availed himself of the facilities afforded by steamboats for the Mails, at least on the lower Mississippi. Seventeen years have now nearly elapsed since the first steamboat arrived at New-Orleans, and we have seen no attempt made to profit by this most rapid of all carriers, except some almost abortive essays to convey the mails between New-Orleans and Mobile.

Under the new administration the people look for better things, and the Post-Master General of the present day possesses, as we are told, one of those master minds which can seize all the consequences of an improvement at a glance. It is to call for attention to the subject that we know our following notes.

Let two steamboats be constructed for carrying passengers and the mails. Their engines should be such as would propel them at least 10 miles per hour against the current. One should leave New-Orleans every other day, and arrive at Natchez in thirty-six hours; and their way up and down, these boats could stop over at any place on the river, and land and re-load the mails. One hour's delay might be allowed at Natchez, Baton Rouge, Donaldson, &c. while the quarter of an hour would suffice for stopping the mails at the minor places.

We fear, however, that the expense of running two first-rate boats would not all and of forty thousand dollars per annum. This, however, need not weigh entirely on the public treasury. When once it was reduced to a moral certainty that at such an hour, on such a day, people might be sure of finding a passage in these mail-boats, as they stopped at Baton Rouge, Natchez, Donaldson, &c., such would be the preference given, and the number of passengers, as to more than provide a sum sufficient to pay all expense, and leave that given by the post-office department clear profit. So far from the obligation to arrive at and depart from our towns, paying anxious, we feel convinced, in our minds, that the confidence it must inspire among travellers, would be the making of the fortune of those concerned in the firm.

**FRANCE.**—The French ministry on the 5th of February submitted to the Chamber two projects of law, for the organization of the administrations of the departments and departments, by which the Royal prerogatives was considerably abridged, and a species of Par-

liament given to each province, over which the Government could have little or no influence. Several alterations in the bills, making them still more democratical were proposed in the committee, and objected to by ministers, but both have been withdrawn, in consequence of a royal edict to that effect, in the Gazette de France of Friday last. The following is an extract of a letter from Paris, dated the 9th instant:— "The sittings of yesterday presented a spectacle unique in the history of representative governments. There was pronounced a majority for the King, in spite of the efforts of the ministry. Yesterday was a memorable day: the monarchy escaped great danger. The right side of the House mustered all their force, and the King did not suffer any attempt on his prerogative, and his rights are preserved, and the ministers' lot concession have been confounded."

**From the British Packet of the 24th 1829.**  
The Governor of Buenos Ayres has received a communication by way of San Nicolas, from the Governor (Sulay) of Entre Rios, dated Parana, January 15, 1829. It republishes the change effected on the 1st Dec. and the appointment of the author of that movement as Provisional Governor, as well as that of Admiral Brown as deputy Governor, and that by this act the Laws and institutions of the country have been scandalously violated; that the Province are bound to act against the late proceedings, which has gone to the point of extreme of shooting His excellency Don Manuel Dorado, to whom they had confided the chief authority, which solemn delegation ought to have rendered his person inviolable, instead of being seized by illegal, tumultuous authorities, like that of Lavalle and the party under his influence, who had compromised themselves to the commission of a horrible crime, bringing fatal consequences to the Argentine Republic,—suppressing its glories—regarding its degrading organization—interfering with the adjustment of the definitive treaty of peace with the Empire of Brazil—engendering civil war between brothers—putting the Province in a commotion—disturbing the harmony which ought to exist among members of the same family.

The communication, which is very long, then continues in the same vein, and concludes with comments upon the official notes sent by Lopez, the Governor of Santa Fe, which note is termed by Sulay, as energetic, worthy, and most convincing; and that he (Sulay) takes this opportunity of transmitting his sentiments to the Senior Minister, saluting him with the best cordiality as a private individual, disavowing utterly his public character, and only giving him that title nominally, and out of pure civility.
