Yes, they have attacked us, and is a manner the most perfidious. After having besieged my palace, assaulted my person and shown the most audacious effrontery in the presence of the commandant general and the officers and treops; this band, jealous of my dignity, not yet satisfied, abused me with foul language and treated me with every indignity that malice could suggest. Don Manuel derjo transformed himself into a very demon, and discharged his venum and bile upon me, scarcely taking time to breathe. he accused me of the horrible crime of murder, of having and, with the consequent accusation of the commandar general, representing him se one dangerous to the peace of the state. Ohl fellow-citizens, your governor was menaced by this instrument of tyrants, who, armed, with a poignard, would have killed his unoffending victim had it not been for the timely interposition of the commandant. The scene that passed was never before witnessed in this

capital. And it took place in the presence of the soldierssoldiers who styled themselves defenders of the government and the people! Veterans, you were witnesses of this scandaleus outrage! Citizens, you beheld the indignities suffered by, the first functionary of your state! Will you suffer the criminals to go unpunished?-Shall the laws be despised?-That execrable conspirator, Evariette-Sanches, whose pres-cate in our city is a public calamity, is among your oppres-

What can be hoped when the execution of the law is treated with contempt and ridicule? If the disorders, the immorality of the mass were known, the debasement of the place would occasion no surprise.

Such are the commotions which I deem it to be my duty to communicate for the honor of my character and patriotism. Oh! that the wretches may fee! shame since they have excited the indignation of honorable men; and may naught result to their profit but confusion! The celebrated faction of Cipriralists boast of their pretended triumph; in other times they trampled under foot the laws. Nothing now remains but for them to pass over the bodies of freemen. Tyrants bearl I am propared! Strike your daggers into the hearts of him who now presides over the destinies of Tabasco, if you have any decire to wreak your vengeance so far, and given of the nomination of curature to varant surgewill find one willing and ready to pacrifice upon the alter of his gointry a victim inneent and guild at

I have been placed, citizens of Tabasco, in the exalted station of chief magistrate of this state, in accordance with the voice of the people, who called me to preside by acclamation. I resisted not to improper or vile methods to procure the honor conferred upon me, nor did I use fear or affection to procure for me the vote of a single citizen. To-day, I de seeled from the station I have necepted, charged with nothing more than having insulted a private individual who has not suffered, and whom they would have spaced even among the serfs of Turkey.

Several public functionaries who are to be arrested tonight have quitted the city like culprits; they are to be pursued like anarchists by real anarchists. The laws has no longer any force. Citizens of Tebasce, it has lost its sove-
