being allowed. But it rests with the legislatures of the other states, whether they will admit a distinc. branch of any bank within their jurisdiction. If the lecal banks already chartered by a state think proper to reciprocate the redemption of notes issued by other banks wherever located, that is a matter exclusively within the cognisance and control of such banks: but to admit a branch of any distant or foreign bank to trade on its own responsibility and for its own advantages is not good policy on the part of any state; nor indeed is it justice to the local banking institutions which pay a bonus of some kind for their privileges. All th connected with banks already chartered should strenuously oppose the introduction in their neighborhood of a branch of any bank not specially chartered like their own; and subject to the same restrictions or requirements: for their profits and means of operations are necessarily diminished by competing with such banks. A bank may have branches in several towns or districts of the same state, as they have the same privileges; and are subject to the same jurisdiction; but it is very bad policy in any legislature to allow branches of any distant or foreign banking or insurance company to be located within their jurisdiction. If the banking or insurance companies chartered by a state are not adequate for the wants of its citizens, it is easy to augment them, according to its wonted system and acting with faith to those previously incorporated; but if they are adequate, then manifest injustice is done to them. On the broad basis of political economy, it is imprudent if not unsafe to permit the location of a mere branch of any banking or insurance company—to countenance mere agents where principals could and should be.

An ordinance relative to Foreigners coming to New Orleans, and other persons herein mentioned.—
The city council ordain as follows:
Art.1. It shall be the duty of all persons who may come to this city, and are not inhabitants of the same, to deliver at the office of the Mayoralty, within twenty-four hours after their arrival, an account of their names, age and profession, of the place from whence they come and whether they intend to make any stay in this city, or to leave it instantly.

Art. 2. All masters of vessels, flats, barges or other crafts, shall be obliged, on their arrival, personally to deliver into the Mayoralty office, a list, on oath, of their passengers, with those details which are preacible by the first article.

Art. 3. It shall be the duty of all citizens, but specially of every inn the town and suburbs, to deliver, every Monday, until otherwise directed, to the Mayor's office, a list upon osth of such foreigners as may either lodge, or board with them, and to specify therein with accuracy, those who may have come to their houses since the delivery of their proceding list.

Art. 4. All persons required by the foregoing articles, to make at the Mayoralty office, a declaration of their arrival in this city, shall pay in the said office twelve and a half cents, as a lee for registering the same; which unoney shall be levied on captains, for their passengers, and on inn-keepers, unasiers or mustresses of boarding houses, &c., for the persons entertained by them, at the time of delivering their lists; and a receipt for the same shall be delivered to them, as a voucher for their having fulfilled the formalities prescribed by the present ordinance.

Art. 5. Any person or persons neglecting to deliver any of the lists required by the foregoing articles, or delivering a false one, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding ninety-nino dollars; and if the offenders shall be inn prayern-keepers, or have a boarding-house, they shall, in case of a repitition of such off
