KING OF GREECE ABDICATES IN FAVOR OF SECOND SON

Washington Believes Prince George, Logical Successor, Also Will Quit Job--Details Are Unknown

Athens, June 12.—King Constanting of Greece, a brotherin-law to the Kaiser, abdicated his throne in favor of his second son, Prince Alexander, 23 years old.

It is understood that Constantine would leave the country on a British warship and proceed to Switzerland by way of Italy. Elassona is occupied by Allied troops. There will be no resistance. No disorders in Athens were reported.

Washington, June 12.—The abdication of Constantine in favor of Prince Alexander implies that Prince George, of Greece, also is abdicated, since he would be the logical successor to

Of Prince Alexander little is known except that he received part of his education in England. He has the reputation of being pro-English. Details and circunstances leading up to the abdication still are lacking.
