For the first time in the police
department an eight-hour system
was inaugurated Sunday. Men on
beat duty along the business section
of Canal street will work eight
hours hereafter instead of twelve.

Many of the young white men in
the New Orleans draft army have
but a day or two more in their
homes, mobilization orders requiring
them to enjoin Wednesday for
Port Pike, Ark. They will leave the
city on special trains Wednesday
morning and Wednesday evening.

Final preparations are now being
made for the holding of the big annual
fair at Donaldsonville October
1, 5, 6 and 7. This year's event
promises to eclipse the four which
have preceded it both in the number
of exhibits and in point of attendance.

Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Hart, after an
absence of two months, returned
Saturday from a tour in the East.

The First Battalion of the Louisi-
ana Infantry, which has been sta-
tioned at Camp Nicholls, New Or-
leans, composed of Companies A, B,
C and D, Homer, Crowley, De Ridder
and Monroe, as well as the machine
gun company, Hospital Corps and
the First Regiment Band were dis-
missed at Alexandria Saturday, and
were stationed at Camp Beaugard.

New Orleans property values have
been raised \$11,875,026 over 1916, ac-
cording to figures given out Satur-
day by C. Taylor Gatche, president
of the Parish Board of Assessors.

J. T. Gibbons of New Orleans,
made almost a complete sweep in
the bids opened by Major John Staf-
ford of the quartermaster depart-
ment in New Orleans last Wednes-
day, obtaining orders for feedstuffs
approximating \$300,000. Mr. Gib-
bons has been quite successful in
the last year in bidding for govern-
ment feedstuffs, and though com-
peting with many concerns in St.
Louis, Chicago, Kansas City and
other points supposed to have the
advantage in feedstuff bidding has
underbid them on nearly 98 per
cent of the business.

After an illness of a month, Wal-
ter J. Austin, member of the New
Orleans fire department for twenty-
three years, and captain of Chemi-
cal Company No. 3, Dauphine and
Poland streets, for ten years, died in
his home, 1033 Piety street, Satur-
day afternoon. Captain Austin was
born 55 years ago and lived his en-
tire life in the lower section of the
city. Before the fire department was
organized he served with the volun-
teers. In his long service
Captain Austin made many friends.
He was injured several times fighting
fires.

Mrs. Ignazio Palmisano, the young
Italian woman who shot and seri-
ously wounded Silvia G. Cirelli,
Italian professor of languages, on
January 1, 1917, is expected to stand
trial on the charge of shooting and
wounding with intent to kill in
Judge Chretien's court Tuesday.

Mrs. Reine Peterson, who shot and
killed her husband on the night of
June 27, at 7735 Dumaine street, was
discharged by Judge Alex. O'Donnell
of the second city criminal court
Monday morning, after the case was
abandoned by Assistant District At-
torney J. Arthur Charbonnet. After
hearing the state witnesses whose
testimony showed that Peterson had
come to the house with the full in-
tention of murdering his wife from
whom he was separated.

The army needs two hundred doc-
tors for the Medical Reserve Corps,
and examinations will be held in
Louisiana next week for those doc-
tors who desire to apply for the
places. Major Isadore Dyer and
Lieutenant William M. Perkins, of
the Medical Reserve Corps, will
cover the territory in the health
car of the State Board of Health,
and will conduct the examinations
in the car.

An automobile running on the
sidewalk at Frenchmen and Brugun-
dy street Saturday night struck a
mother and her two children, all of
whom received injuries which nec-
essitated their removal to the
Charity Hospital. They are Mrs.
August Indovino, 25 years old, 829
Frenchmen street; Anthony Indovino,
5 years old, and August Indovino,
2 years old. The automobile be-
longs to Michael Sims, 518 South
Solomon street. According to Pa-
trickman Hart, of the Fifth Precinct,
Sims was driving his automobile on
Frenchmen street. When in trying
to avoid striking a truck he drove
the automobile on to the sidewalk.

New Orleans banks are arranging
a meeting for this week to consider
ways and means of disposing of
about \$12,000,000 of the second Lib-
erty bond issue, to be sold next
month. Louisiana's allotment for
the second issue, if made on the
same basis as in the first issue, will
be \$20,250,000. The new issue, it is
nearly certain, will bear 4 per cent
interest, and subscribers to the first
issue will receive 1 per cent bonds
instead of 3 1/2 per cent bonds they
purchased.

Labor disturbances on the river
front practically all are settled or
near settled, and it is almost cer-
tain there will be no strike of long-
shoremen or screwmen. Long-
shoremen accepted the proposal of
the stevedores Sunday at a special
meeting and Monday morning notifi-
ed the stevedores of their accept-
ance.

The Lafayette board of exemption
in recognition of the heroism of Mrs.
Henry M. Hebert, who has surren-
dered three of her sons to the ser-
vice of the nation as soldiers of the
army and has three more registered
and drafted without claiming ex-
emption, has ordered two flags to
be presented her; one flag bearing
three stars, denoting her three sons
in service, and the other bearing six
stars representing her six sons who
registered June 5 and made no claim
for exemption.
