For the first time in the police department an eight-hour system was inaugurated Sunday. Men on beat duty along the business section of Canal street will work eight hours hereafter instead of twelve. The traffic squad, however, will continue on duty for ten hours and a half, at the crossings.

Many of the young white men in the New Orleans draft army have but a day or two more in their homes, mobilization orders requiring them to entrain Wednesday for Fort Pike, Ark. They will leave the city on special trains Wednesday morning and Wednesday evening.

Governor Pleasant Saturday gave out proclamation, requiring that every woman above 16 years register for service on Wednesday, October 17, 1917.
