LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Wednesday, the 27th Jan. 1830. Agreeably to notice previously given Mr. Ducros introduced a bill entitled...

Mr. Gannie gave notice that he would shortly introduce the bills entitled: "An act supplementary to the different acts to incorporate the town of New-Orleans." And—"An act relative to the Legion of Louisiana."

On motion, the bill entitled, "an act, to amend the second section of an act entitled, 'an act supplementary to an act for the punishment of crimes, and misdemeanors, and others supplementary acts, approved, March 20th, 1818,'" was read for the first time, and was taken into consideration, section by section.

CONGRESS SENATE. Thursday, January 21. Mr. Frelinghuysen submitted the following resolution: Resolved, that the Secretary of War be requested to furnish to the Senate any information in the possession of his department respecting the progress of civilization for the last eight years among the Cherokees, Creek, and Choctaw Nations of Indians...

The following resolution offered by Mr. Foot, as following was then taken up: Resolved, That the Committee on the Public Lands be instructed to inquire into the expediency of limiting for a certain period the sales of public lands to such lands only as have heretofore been offered for sale, and are subject to entry at the minimum price. And also whether the office of Surveyor General may not be abolished without detriment to the public interest.

The Morning Herald, of the 13th, contains a letter from Paris, from which the annexed is an extract.—Instead of relaxing in their proceedings, Ministers begin to display energy. The prosecutions of Journalists increase. The provincial Press is now pursued with as much activity as was that of Paris, until repeated convictions taught the metropolitan Editors the necessity for prudence. At these circumstances, proving the determination of the Ministry to brave the coming storm, have at length convinced the Opposition that it is full time that they should be reorganised, and arrange their plan for the ensuing campaign.

have attended to the persecution of the Press. A day or two since, it was reported that mildness and forbearance would be substituted for the rancour and perseverence with which the Liberal Journals have been attacked. It was even stated that Mr. Chatelet, one of the responsible editors of the Courier Francaise, and one of the ablest of the Opposition writers, would be allowed to succeed; but either the report was unfounded, or Ministers have had a new access of provocation, for the appeal of M. Chatelet will, when called on to-morrow, be resisted and his sentence of fine and three months' imprisonment affirmed. The reason for additional activity in prosecuting all offences of a seditious tendency is to be found in the increase of that species of crime. By activity and vigour the police have banished from the stalls of the Paris vendors the effigies of the Duke of Reichstadt, which every where, and composed of every description of materials, met the eye. A new mode of reviving the recollection of the Emperor has, in the provinces, been resorted to, as you will have observed in the Newspapers. At one place, an old soldier, dressed in "the grey surcoat and small cocked hat of the Emperor," incurred the vengeance of the law. In another, a wretched player, on the stage, not only assumed the same costume, in his character of a general officer, but had also the hardihood to "step" the walk and gestures of the Mar. of St. Helena—kept his hands behind his back while marching, except when he unclasped in order to thrust one of them into his waistcoat pocket, "in the manner of the Emperor," and drew thence a huge pinch of snuff. The actor was applauded to the echo. (Phi. Daily Chron.)

France.—Paris, Dec. 19. The utmost political violence exists in Paris. The asperity of the journals is astonishing. The people are rapidly taking sides with the revolutionists. The public functionaries out of Paris are influenced by the popular frenzy. The republican papers cry out that "a conspiracy exists against the press, the charter, and the liberty of France." It is confidently said that a strong majority exists in the Chamber of Deputies against the Minister. The Duke of Montebello, who embarked at Carthage, in the last English packet, has returned to Paris.

Paris, Dec. 15, 1830.—The council of yesterday was to decide upon important questions. It was not till about half past eleven at night that reports were circulated respecting what had passed in it. The following are those which we have collected:— That M. De Polignac opened the session with a report on the situation of France, in which have been repeated for these ten years in the counter-revolutionary speeches and writings, he endeavoured to prove that the monarchy was threatened—that its dangers claimed a speedy remedy—and that this remedy was the project, the principal points of which we have mentioned, that immediately afterwards M. Courvoisier spoke with much energy and warmth against the inimical projects which it was ventured to bring forward as means of salvation for the monarchy; and that in a vehement extemporaneous discourse he showed the incalculable consequences of a mad resolution, which would convulse France and perhaps Europe.

M. de Courvoisier, it is said, spoke to the same effect, but with less energy. He chiefly endeavoured to show that every measure of this description would be followed by the ruin of public credit. M. d'Haussez coincided in this opinion. The contrary opinion was maintained by Messrs. de Bourmont, and Guérin de Ranville. It is added, that the August Personages who were present at the Council did not hesitate a moment to declare their repugnance to every measure which should deviate from the Charter. It even seems that the Dauphin entered into some developments, remarkable for a just appreciation of the situation of France and its public spirit.
