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THE CONVENTION:

M. Chouteau gave notice that he would shortly present to the Convention, by which any individual fighting a duel or receiving a challenge, shall be ever disqualified from holding public office under the present Constitution.

M. O'Brien presented a resolution requiring the Convention to adjourn on Friday, 21st February, to assemble on the 11th March, at the Hall of the House of Representatives, and suspending the proceedings of the members during that interval.

Laid upon the table by a vote of 46 to 9.

M. Dunn presented a resolution requiring the Convention to meet every day, and that no other resolution be received during those two days.

M. Marshall would willingly assent to the resolution, but was unable to compel the members to conform to it without a formal clause, it seemed to him useless.

Mr. Anderson, however, moved that the bill be passed, for the same purpose.

Mr. Anderson's motion was carried, and the bill was passed.
