" Europe contains about two hundred and fifteen millions of inhabitants, who are civilized spread out among fifty-eight states, large and small. The revenue of those states, taken together, amounts to nearly three thousand eight hundred millions of francs. Placing on one side France and England, uniting under their banners Belgium, Rhenish Prussia, Sweden, Italy, Greece, and nearly all the German confedera tion, excepting Austria and Prussia; on the other, Austria, Russia, Spain, Portugal, and, at resent, Prussia, with some few States of the German confederation, the progressive army is found to amount to 98,000,000 of men, and the retrograde army to 102,000,000. The former at a revenue of 2,700,000,000 francs; the latter only 900,000;005 francs. The navy of civilization amounts to 1 660 ships of war, and that of absolutism to 540. The surplus of European forces, in population, money, and vessels, belong to the neutral army. After this statement, the result of the struggle cannot appear doubtful.
