Cities Owe Eight Times as Much as U. S. Government

Washington, June 26.—The net indebtedness of the 213 American cities of more than 30,000 population is nearly eight times the debt of the federal government.

This statement is made in a comprehensive financial report on American cities issued today by the bureau of census of the department of commerce, which adds, however, that cities are not living beyond their incomes quite as much as in the past.

The aggregate population of the 213 cities investigated by the census bureau was estimated at 32,276,000, or nearly 32 per cent of the total population of the country.

Between 1790 and 1916 the population in cities of over 30,000 increased nearly a thousandfold, whereas that of the entire country increased only about twenty-fivefold.

Another important source of revenue consisted of special assessments and special charges—the bulk of which were for outlays aggregating \$74,008,766.

The highest per capita property taxes, \$18.91, are shown for Brookline, Mass., and the lowest, \$5.28, for Portsmouth, Va.

GUARDSMEN WILL TRAIN IN FRANCE

Washington, June 26.—While it has been known for several weeks that the War department contemplated sending at least 100,000 national guardsmen to France before December 1, new plans that are being considered and probably will be carried through contemplate sending practically all the guard to Europe by about the first of next year, so that they can complete their training behind the trenches and be ready for the spring offensive.

Do Not Need Permanent Camps. The fact that the guard will train in the South does not necessitate permanent camps for them, even if they were to be in camp through the winter.

Will Be Drawn by Number. After puzzling for weeks to find an equitable method, the system of signing out the "honor men" is settled. Each registration card is numbered. On a day to be fixed by President Wilson the lottery in Washington will draw out the numbers.
