CENTRAL SCHOOLS.
THE Regents of the Central and
Primary schools having procured
healthy, commodious, and central posi-
tion for the upper primary school have
the pleasure of announcing to the pub-
lic, that it is, this day, responded since
the care of Doctor J. A. Kimmitt,

pupils unable to pay for their education
are admitted and taught gratis. Ap-
