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Fourth National Foreign Trade Convention.

The business interests of the United States, especially those interested in foreign trade, many of these being in Louisiana, have for some time been concerned in the question of what changes in the world's commerce will take place after the end of the European war. Already there are many signs that the most important changes are bound to come.

For the purpose of considering how these conditions will affect American foreign trade as well as other points concerning our overseas commerce, including the constructive encouragement of a sound national foreign trade policy, the Fourth National Trade Convention is to be held at Pittsburgh, January 25, 26 and 27. The foreign trade interests in this country have strong recollections of the excellent results that followed the Third National Foreign Trade Convention, held at New Orleans last January. Hundreds of delegates from various parts of the United States, representing the manufacturing, merchandizing, banking, transportation, mining, agriculture and lumber interests engaged in foreign trade, attended the last convention, and can testify to the benefits which resulted therefrom.

Mr. James A. Farwell, chairman of the National Foreign Trade Council, and president of the United States Steel Corporation, has invited the commercial and industrial organizations of Louisiana as well as a number of prominent business men interested in foreign trade to again cooperate in the nation-wide movement to prepare the United States for the keener competition which will take place after the war.

Individuals of concern throughout Louisiana, interested in foreign trade, who have not received invitations may obtain them by communicating with Robert H. Patchin, secretary National Foreign Trade Council, 4 Hanover Square, New York.

The National Lumber Export Association, interested so largely in foreign trade, as its name indicates, is to hold its annual convention at Pittsburgh, commencing January 24. Many of its members will be delegates to the National Foreign Trade Convention, as well as a number of members of the Southern Pine Association.

From many of the large cities throughout the country, special trains are to be run to Pittsburgh for the convention, to be known as "Foreign Trade Specials"; one of these going from the Pacific coast. It is thought that one to be known as the "Dixie Foreign Trade Special" will leave from New Orleans.
