STUPENDOUS PROJECT.

A Pamphlet has been issued from the press of Messrs. Carvill, in which the author proposes to unite the Atlantic seaboard with the Mississippi valley.

The following extract from the N. Y. Herald, may give our readers a tolerable idea of the route projected.

It is thence to continue along the western margin of the river, as far up perhaps as to New Jersey line, or until an opportunity offers for leaving the river by the moderate inclination of some large stream flowing in from the west.

From this point its direction is to be a little south of west, until it reaches nearly the east line of Ohio, and thence almost due west to the Mississippi.

CONGRESS.

In the House of Representatives on Tuesday, the subject of the reference of the following resolutions, submitted by Mr. Childs, on Tuesday, the 9th instant...

Resolved, That all legislation should be directed to the promotion of the general good, and that the public funds, which are the common property of the American people, should, upon some just and equal principle, be distributed for the use and benefit of all.

Resolved, That in time of peace, it is inexpedient to make appropriations of money for the purpose of promoting the prosperity of one section of the Union, without due regard to the corresponding interests of the others.

Resolved, That, to avoid the necessity which may exist for a resort to a system of direct taxation, for the payment of the public debt, and to keep the Government in healthful operation, it is inexpedient to make any further appropriations in money for "internal improvements," until said debt be paid.

Resolved further, That it is more equitable and expedient to reduce the duties on those articles which enter of necessity, into the consumption of each family of the community, rich and poor, than to possess a redundant Treasury, the benefits of which are often unequally divided, though replenished by a common contribution.

FRANCE.—On the occasion of the new year, the King of France received, according to custom, several public bodies, as well as a number of Functionaries, civil and military; but the Addresses, such as are given, which were presented on this occasion, and the answers, throw no new light on the great question which now agitates all minds in that country.

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was from the Tribunal of Commerce; and the answers of the King were, on this particular topic, as evasive as the addresses were guarded.

The Address to the King by the Tribunal of Commerce says, amongst other things.

"Our maritime commerce requires encouragement, our relations with South America need protection; we must be indebted to both for the powerful will of your Majesty. The maintenance and consolidation of our civil and political institutions constitute our safety; placed under the palladium of your high wisdom they will be invulnerable."

In answer to this address the King said, he was now engaged in measures to secure the happiness of commerce, and especially of that of Paris. He hoped that these measures would make his people more happy and more contented.

A ship canal is projected between Paris and Rouen.

The following information is from a respectable source. It discloses an extraordinary state of things in Colombia. Either the people are forcing Paéz to act against Bolívar, or he is preparing to second the projects, whatever they may be, of the Liberator.

Every thing goes on very well. General Bermudez and Monagas have joined in the Venezuelan cause, and proceeded immediately to the army on the frontiers. There never was a change effected with such an unanimous wish; few, very few are the dissenting voices, and those to be found only among the relations and servile friends of Bolívar.

Snyrna, Dec. 9.—An attempt has been made to poison the Archbishop Mousigneu Cardelli; a dose of corrosive sublimate was mixed not only with wine in the cup used in celebrating mass, but even in that contained in the chalice. The Archbishop perceived that the wine had an extraordinary taste; however, he swallowed it. A few moments afterwards he was seized with a violent cholera and vomiting, to which his escape is doubtless to be attributed.

The Hatti Scheriff of the Sultan, which reincorporates the six districts of Servia, was yesterday read publicly at Belgrad. This article of the treaty, may, therefore, be considered as executed.

Prince Milosch has given orders to M. Danidvitz to go to the head quarters of General Diebitsch and to express to him officially the gratitude of the Emperor, for the benefit he has conferred upon it.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—King Ferdinand, on the occasion of his marriage, has granted permission to return to their country to 15 persons, who were all members of the Municipality of Madrid under the Constitutional Government.

PARIS, Jan. 3.—At eleven o'clock last night, it was announced as certain that the ministry would be modified, by removing from the council Messrs. Courvoisier, Chabrol and D'Haussez. M. de Bérthier, it is said is appointed Minister of the Interior, M. Duden of the Marine, M. de Peyronnet of the Seals, M. de Montbel to take the Department of the Finances.

During the last week near 400 more families, containing more than 1000 souls, have been visited and relieved, making an appealing aggregate already of upwards of 4,000 persons, whose daily income is somewhat short of one penny.
