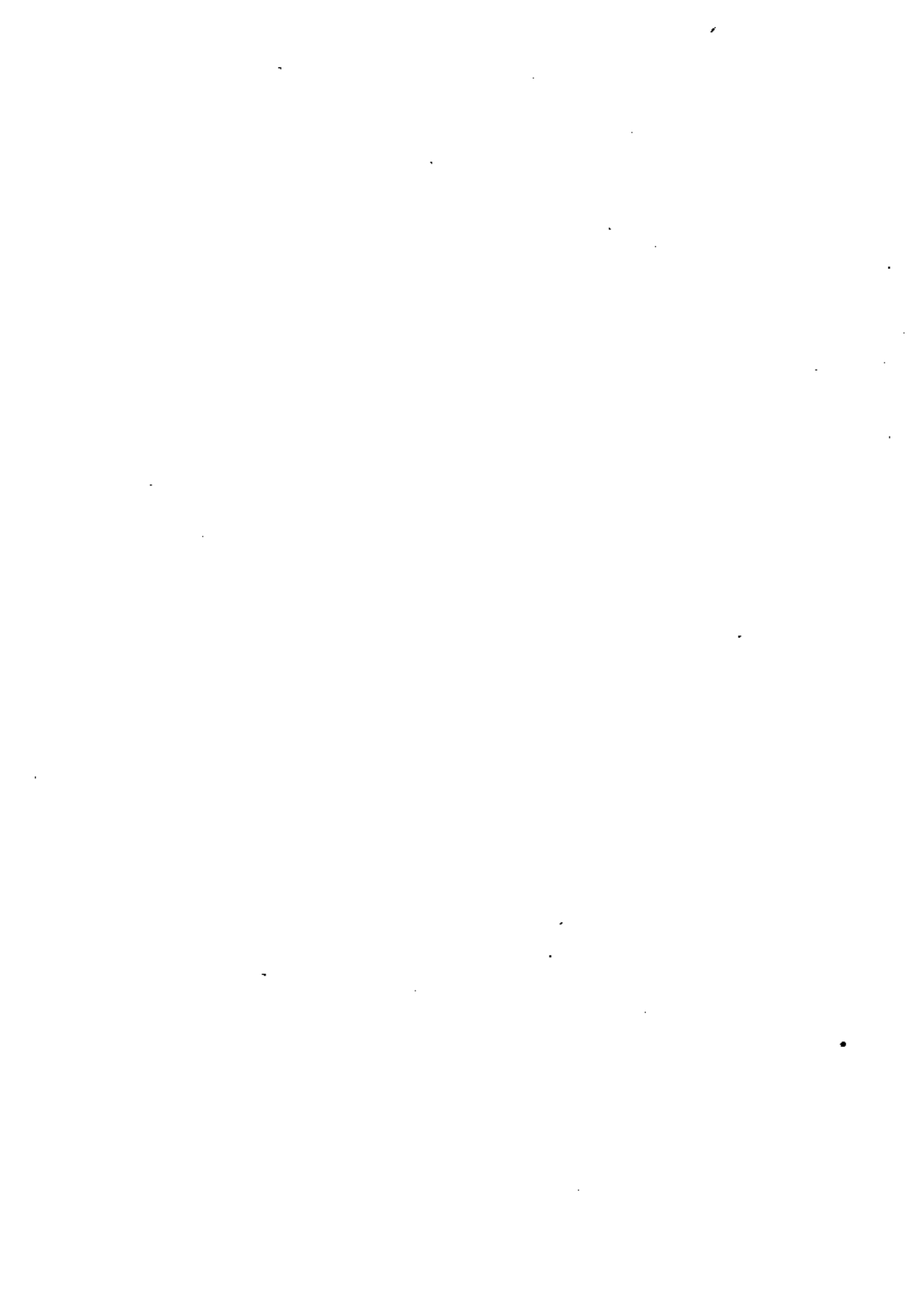

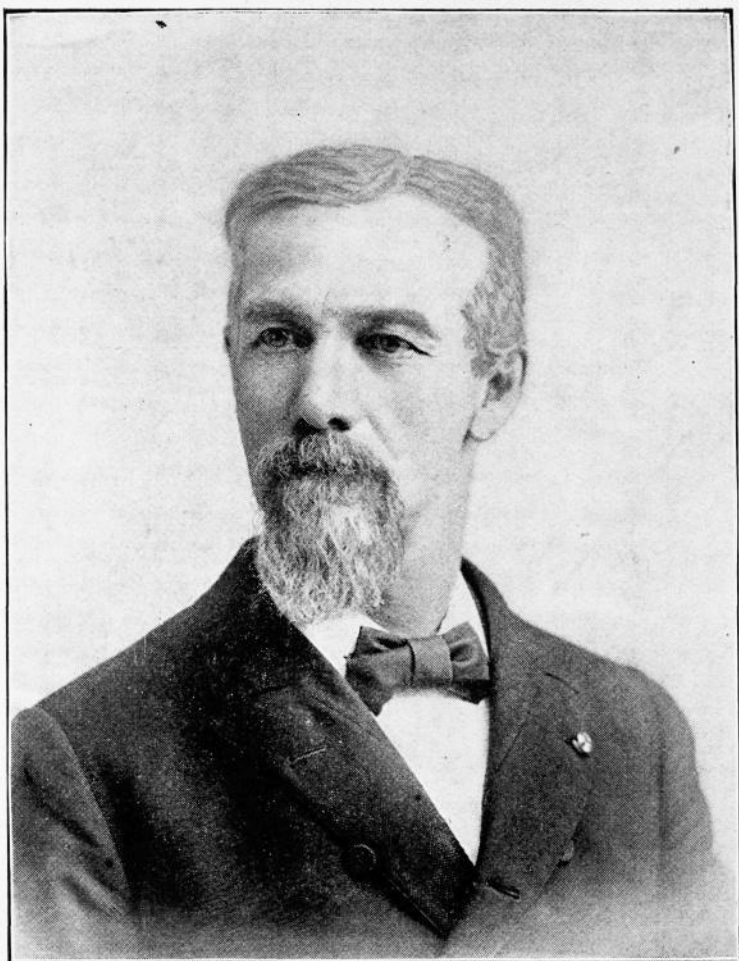

EARLY HISTORY

Giving the Various Jurisdictions over Iowa

[From the Annals of Iowa, July, 1893, compiled by Capt. Frank E Landers
Webster City, Iowa.]

The territory now known as the state of Iowa passed through a long succession of jurisdictions, or ownerships, prior to the 28th day of December, 1846, when it became one of the United States, the first to claim ownership being Pope Alexander VI.

GRANT TO THE KING AND QUEEN OF SPAIN.

1493. Pope Alexander VI granted to Ferdinand and Isabella, king and queen of Aragon and Castile, Spain, all the continents, inhabited by infidels, which they had discovered, extending the assignment to their heirs, and successors, the kings of Castile and Leon. The boundary between the grants to Spain and Portugal was fixed on a line drawn from pole to pole, 100 leagues west of the Azores. All countries east of that meridian not actually possessed by any Christian prince were to belong to Portugal; all to the west to Spain. Owing to the dissatisfaction of Portugal as to the boundary fixed in the grant to that country and Spain, a commission was appointed, which, on July 2, 1493, agreed on a line 270 leagues farther west. In the first assignment Portugal only secured the title to what was found to be a vast expanse of ocean, and the change of meridian was made in the belief that she would thereby acquire some portion of terra firma. But in this she was also doomed to disappointment.

THE CABOT PATENTS.

1496. Henry VII, king of England, granted to John Cabot and his sons, Lewis, Sebastian and Sancius, a patent of discovery, possession and trade. This was to include all the lands they might discover, of which they were to take possession in the name of the English crown. England laid claim in 1498 to all of North America, through the discoveries of John Cabot.

THE PLYMOUTH COMPANY'S CHARTER.

1620. James I, king of Great Britain, France and Ireland, granted to the council at Plymouth, England, all that part of America lying between the fortieth and forty-eighth degrees of north latitude, and extending from "sea to sea." This grant included within its limits the whole of Iowa, and challenged any rights Spain may have received from the pope.

THE MASSACHUSETTS COMPANY'S CHARTER.

1628. The "council established at Plymouth," England, granted to Sir Henry Roswell and others, all that part of New England in America extending along the Atlantic coast from three miles north of the Merrimac to three miles south of the Charles river, and westward between the latitude of 42 degrees, 2 minutes and a point three miles north of the most southerly bend of the Merrimac to the South Sea. This grant gave to the Massachusetts company that part of Iowa lying between parallels passing through the north edge of Clinton county and the south part of Clayton county. Charles I, king of England, granted, March 4, 1629, to Sir Henry Roswell and twenty others, a charter similar to that of 1628, with the exception that no part of the lands therein granted were, on the 3d day of November, 1620, inhabited by any other Christian prince, or within the limits of the Southern Colony of Virginia. The associates were made "one body corporate and politic in fact and name, by the name of the Governor and Company of Massachusetts Bay in New England."

THE WARWICK GRANT.

1630. The council at Plymouth granted to the earl of Warwick a tract of country south of Massachusetts. The earl on the 19th day of March, 1631, transferred the grant to Lords Say and Sele, Brooke and others. The country was defined in the transfer as lying south of Massachusetts and west of Narragansett river, extending westward 120 miles along the coast, and thence west to the Pacific. The Warwick grant embraced that part of Iowa lying between latitude 41 degrees and 42 degrees, 2 minutes, parallels passing through near the center of Henry county and the north edge of Clinton county.

THE PLYMOUTH COMPANY'S CHARTER.

1635. The charter of the Plymouth company was surrendered to the crown of England to obtain a confirmation of the respective

rights of the original members of the company. The grant was divided into twelve parts and distributed by lot. No territory was partitioned lying west of forty miles west of the Hudson. The province of Virginia, on the surrender of the charter of the Plymouth company, extended its jurisdiction to the forty-first parallel, the south line of the Warwick grant. The territory of Iowa was then claimed by Virginia, the assignees of the earl of Warwick, and Massachusetts, to the north line of Massachusetts, and from thence north by the crown of England.

THE MASSACHUSETTS BAY COMPANY.

1652. The general court of Massachusetts extended the northern boundary of the province to three miles north of the head of the Merrimac--latitude 43 degrees, 43 minutes, 12 seconds--and west to the Pacific. This extension of boundary placed all of northern Iowa under the claim of Massachusetts.

THE CONNECTICUT CHARTER.

1662. Charles II, king of England, Scotland and France, granted a charter to John Winthrop and other associates to the country included in the Warwick grant of 1630, the colonists having purchased the rights of the patentees in 1644.

THE MASSACHUSETTS BAY COMPANY.

1677. The crown of England ordered that the northern bounds of Massachusetts be restored to within three miles of the Merrimac, thereby leaving the jurisdiction of the north part of Iowa subject to the direct control of the king, as it was previous to 1652. The colony, however, still claimed to the northern limits.

LA SALLE'S PATENT.

1678. Louis XIV, king of France and Navarre, granted a patent to Robert de La Salle, permitting him to endeavor to discover the western part of New France. April 9, 1682, La Salle, having descended the Mississippi and explored the shores of the gulf of Mexico to the westward, took formal possession of the country in the name of the king of France, "from the mouth of the Ohio, also along the Mississippi and the rivers discharging themselves thereinto from its source beyond the country of the Nad onessioux as far as its mouth at the gulf of Mexico."

THE MASSACHUSETTS COMPANY'S CHARTER.

1684. The court of chancery at Westminster, England, decreed that the patent of Massachusetts should be brought into court and canceled.

THE MASSACHUSETTS BAY COMPANY'S CHARTER.

1691. William and Mary, king and queen of England, granted a charter uniting the colonies of Massachusetts, New Plymouth and others under the name of "Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England." This charter included the same territory in Iowa as did the charters of 1628 and 1629.

CROZAT'S PATENT.

1712. Louis XIV, king of France and Navarre, granted a patent to Anthony Crozat, for fifteen years, with the right to carry on a trade in the country between Carolina and New Mexico. The country was to retain the name of Louisiana, and be annexed as a dependent of New France. The laws of France were extended to the province.

THE WESTERN COMPANY'S PATENT.

1717. Crozat surrendered his patent to the crown of France, and King Louis XV granted to the Western company for twenty-five years the exclusive commerce of Louisiana, and the right of beaver trade with New France. The charter gave rights of civil and military jurisdiction. It was surrendered to the crown in 1730.

THE ACT OF FONTAINBLEAU.

1762. A preliminary treaty was signed between England, France and Spain, by which it was agreed that the boundary between the provinces of England and France should be irrevocably fixed by a line drawn in the middle of the Mississippi river, from its source to the Iberville, etc. Louis XV, king of France, ceded Louisiana to Spain. The province was formerly taken possession of August 18, 1769. By this treaty the territory comprised in the bounds of the state of Iowa was definitely placed in the province of Louisiana, and the rights of the English claimants terminated.

THE TREATY OF PARIS.

1763. A definite treaty was signed between England, France and Spain, confirming the boundary between the possessions of England and France as agreed upon by the act of Fontainbleau of 1762.

THE TREATY OF ILDEFONSO.

1800. A secret agreement was entered into by which the king of Spain was to cede the province of Louisiana to France, upon a fulfillment of certain considerations to be performed by the French republic.

The agreement of the treaty of Madrid, made the following year, provided that the retrocession of Louisiana as provided in the treaty of Ildefonso should be carried out.

THE TREATY OF PARIS.

1803. France ceded the province of Louisiana to the United States. The treaty was ratified and proclaimed October 1, 1803. The provinces comprised all west of the Mississippi river north and east of the Spanish possessions, with the island of Orleans.

DISTRICT OF LOUISIANA.

1804. That part of the province of Louisiana south of the thirty-third parallel was detached to form the territory of Orleans, by act of congress, and the residue named "District of Louisiana," and placed under the control of the governor and judges of Indiana territory.

TERRITORY OF LOUISIANA.

1805. A territorial government was established by congress in the District of Louisiana and the name changed to "Territory of Louisiana."

TERRITORY OF MISSOURI.

1812. The government of the Territory of Louisiana was reorganized and the name changed to "Territory of Missouri."

TERRITORY OF MISSOURI.

1821. Missouri was admitted as a state and the remaining portion of the territory, that part north and west of Missouri and Arkansas, left without any form of government.

MICHIGAN TERRITORY.

1834. The boundaries of Michigan Territory were extended by act of congress westward to the Missouri river. This act again placed Iowa among the governments east of the Mississippi river. Michigan territory extended from Lake Huron to the Missouri river, and from the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri north to the British possession.

WISCONSIN TERRITORY.

1836. Michigan Territory was divided by act of congress of April 20, 1836, and the western part established as "Wisconsin Territory."

IOWA TERRITORY.

1838. Wisconsin territory was divided by act of congress of June 12, 1838, and the western part given a territorial government and named "Iowa Territory." This territory embraced the territory of the present state of Iowa, North and South Dakota east of the Missouri and White Earth rivers, and Minnesota west of the Mississippi river and a line drawn from its source to the British possessions.

STATE OF IOWA.

1846. Application was made to congress February 12, 1844, for admission of Iowa as a state. On the 1st day of November of that year a constitution was adopted by a territorial convention, with the following boundaries:

"Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river opposite the mouth of the Des Moines river; thence up the said river Des Moines, in the middle of the main channel thereof, to a point where it is intersected by the old Indian boundary line, or line run by John C. Sullivan in the year 1816; thence westwardly along said line to the 'old northwest corner of Missouri;' thence due west to the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river; thence up in the middle of the main channel of the river last mentioned to the mouth of the Sioux or Calumet river; thence in a direct line to the middle of the main channel of the St. Peters river, where the Watonwan river (according to Nicollet's map) enters the same; thence down the middle of the main channel of said river to the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence down the middle of the main channel of said river to the place of beginning."

An act of admission was passed by congress March 3, 1845, but at the election held on the 4th of August following the people rejected it.

The boundaries provided in the act of congress were as follows: "Beginning at the mouth of the Des Moines river at the middle of the Mississippi; thence by the middle of the channel of that river to a parallel of latitude passing through the mouth of the Mankato, or Blue Earth river; thence west along said parallel of latitude to a point where it is intersected by a méridian line, 17 degrees and 30 minutes west of the meridian of Washington city; thence due south to the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri; thence eastwardly following that boundary to the point at which the same intersects the Des Moines river; thence by the middle of the channel of that river to the place of beginning."

On the 18th of May, 1846, another constitution was adopted by a second convention called for that purpose. This constitution proved acceptable to the people and was adopted at an election held August 3d, of the same year. On the following day, August 4, 1846, congress passed an act repealing the law of March 3, 1845, and accepting the boundaries of the state as defined in this last constitution and as they exist to-day. On the 28th day of December, 1846, congress passed the act admitting Iowa as a state in the Union. The boundaries were set forth in the act as follows: "Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river to a point on said river where the northern boundary of the state of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state, adopted June 12, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westerly along the said northern boundary line of the state of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollet's map; thence up the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of 43 degrees and 30 minutes, north latitude; thence east along said parallel of 43 degrees and 30 minutes, until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence down the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river to the place of beginning."

CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IOWA.

Adopted in convention March 5, 1857.

Adopted at general election August 3, 1857.

Proclaimed by the governor September 3, 1857.

Became operative on publication.

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of THE STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state, adopted June 12, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the state of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollett's map thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes, until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence down the middle of the main channel of the said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I—BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates, for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office of public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person, not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life or liberty of an individual, the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him; to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony, and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses, where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended or refused when application is made as required by law, unless, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines

shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made, to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a military fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives, and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment, and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25: This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[SEC. 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage, any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.]

[*The foregoing amendment was adopted at a special election held on June 27, 1882. The supreme court, April 21, 1883, in the case of Koehler & Lange v. Hill, and reported in 60th Iowa, page 543, held that owing to certain irregularities, the same was not legally submitted to the electors, and did not become a part of the constitution.*]

ARTICLE II—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every [white] male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote, sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

[Amended by striking out the word "white" at the general election in 1868.]

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such elections, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[Amendment]. SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

[The foregoing amendment was adopted at the general election in 1884.]

ARTICLE III—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments: the legislative, the executive and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be:

"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years; and until their successors are elected and qualified.

[*By an amendment adopted at the general election in 1884, elections now occur uniformly in November.*]

SEC. 4. No person shall be member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of 21 years; be a [*free white*] male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county or district he may have been chosen to represent.

[*Amended by striking out the words "free white," at the general election in 1880.*]

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be 25 years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to

day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to or returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor, or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him (Sunday excepted), the same shall be a law

in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor trust, or profit, under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly. But offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster, whose compensation does not exceed \$100 per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder

of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No moneys shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the First General Assembly under this constitution shall receive \$3 per diem while in session; and the further sum of \$3 for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have the power to increase the compensation of its members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next, after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject-matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be), that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the [white] inhabitants of the state.

[Amended by striking out the word "white" at the general election in 1868.]

SEC. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties according to the number of [white] inhabitants in each.

[Amended by striking out the word "white" at the general election in 1868.]

SEC. 35. The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state according to the number of [white] inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law one-half that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.

[Amended by striking out the word "white" at the general election in 1868.]¹

SEC. 36. At its first session under this constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote *viva voce*; and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV - EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the state of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a lieutenant-governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant-governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant-governor. The returns of every election for governor and

lieutenant-governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes, for governor and lieutenant-governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal, and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant-governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant-governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant-governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of 30 years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power

to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant-governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of governor and lieutenant-governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant-governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve on the lieutenant-governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant-governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president *pro tempore*.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant-governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise

become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president *pro tempore* of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the state of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district court, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time, establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may by law prescribe; and shall have power to issue

all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be \$2,000 per annum; and that of each district judge \$1,600 per annum, until the year eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts, and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such reorganization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or any increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.

[Amendment.] At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized

and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

[*The foregoing amendment was adopted at the general election in 1884.*]

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney-general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

[SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.]

[*The foregoing section was stricken out and the following substituted therefor at the general election in 1884.*]

SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.

[Amendment:] SEC. 15. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of the grand jury.

[*The foregoing amendment was adopted at the general election in 1884.*]

ARTICLE VI—MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied [*white*] male citizens, between the ages of 18 and 45 years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the

laws of the United States, or of this state; and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.

[Amended by striking out the word "white," at the general election in 1868.]

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: provided that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII—STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues; or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of \$250,000; and the money arising from the creation of such debts shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement, or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund sustaining the loss, upon which not less than 6 per cent. annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state in war; but the money arising

from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII—CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto, shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest-paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at 10 per cent. below their average value in the city of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of such stocks, to the amount of 10 per cent. on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held, for all of its liabilities accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the

organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

1. *Education.*

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant-governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of 25 years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published, and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed, they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said board.

SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution, and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school, as aforesaid, may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the term of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the board of education of the state of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year 1863, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

[The board of education was abolished by the Tenth General Assembly, chapter 52.]

2. *School Funds and School Lands.*

SECTION 1. The educational and school fund and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the 500,000 acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent. as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent from exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied in the several counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly, as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the

improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same that, by law, receive and control the state and county revenue, for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of 5 and 21 years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next

session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

ARTICLE XI—MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise), where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$100, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding \$300.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than 432 square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding 5 per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant so exempted, shall not exceed 320 acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the State university at Iowa city, in the county of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII—SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force, and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law, and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial, and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under this constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year 1857, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant-governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year 1854, and members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December, 1856.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney-general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress, and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year 1857 (except the superintendent of public instruction), and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year 1856; except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, 1858: provided, That the time for which any

district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year 1858 shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election, in the year 1858.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year 1857, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year 1859.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year 1858, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year 1856, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year 1859, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution (except as in this constitution otherwise provided), shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall divide the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year 1857, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall

immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "white," from the article on the "right of suffrage," shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection, in the manner following, viz.: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box. And those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'white' be stricken out of the article on the 'right of suffrage?' Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'white' be stricken out of the article on the 'right of suffrage?' No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition, shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "white" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

SEC 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state.

Done in convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

Proclamation

Whereas an instrument known as the New Constitution of the State of Iowa adopted by the constitutional Convention of said State on the fifth day of March A.D. 1857 was submitted to the qualified electors of said State at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August 1857 for their approval or rejection and whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said Constitution and thirty eight thousand six hundred and eighty one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I James M. Harrison Governor of said State, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said New Constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the State of Iowa.



In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the Great Seal of the State of Iowa Done at Iowa City this third day of September A.D. 1857 of the Independence of the United States the eighty second and of the State of Iowa the Eleventh.

SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

By vote of the people, November 3, 1868, and proclamation of the governor, December 8, 1868:

First—Strike the word “white” from section one of article two thereof.

Second—Strike the word “white” from section thirty-three of article three thereof.

Third—Strike the word “white” from section thirty-four of article three thereof.

Fourth—Strike the word “white” from section thirty-five of article three thereof.

Fifth—Strike the word “white” from section one of article six thereof.

By vote of the people, November 2, 1880, and certificate of the board of state canvassers, December 3, 1880:

Strike out the words “free white” from the third line of section four [4] of article three [3] of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

By vote of the people, June 27, 1882, and certificate of the board of state canvassers, July 28, 1882:

SECTION 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage, any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

[The supreme court, April 21, 1883, in the case of *Koehler & Lange v. Hill*, reported in 60th Iowa, page 543, held that the amendment, section 26, as submitted to the electors did not become a part of the constitution.]

By vote of the people, November 4, 1884, and certificate of the board of state canvassers, December 10, 1884:

AMENDMENT 1. The general election for state, district, county and township officers, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

AMENDMENT 2. At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

AMENDMENT 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of the grand jury.

AMENDMENT 4. That section thirteen of article five of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section:

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and every two years thereafter, elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Every person practicing medicine or osteopathy in the state is required to procure a certificate from this board.

The board is authorized to issue two classes of certificates:

First, to *physicians*, under sections 2576 and 2582 of the code; and *second*, to *Osteopaths*, under chapter 69, laws Twenty-seventh General Assembly.

There is no provision in the law for issuing permits to practice midwifery.

Members of the board are appointed for a term of three years, one member each year. Every person who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must first be examined by said board and their names registered in a book kept by the board for that purpose, showing also his residence, together with the date of issuing certificate.

Fee for examination and certificate, \$5.

Graduates of recognized schools of pharmacy may be registered without examination. Fee for registration and certificate, without examination, \$2.

The following law relates to itinerant vendor's license:

SEC. 2594. Itinerant vendors of drugs.—Any itinerant vendor of any drug, nostrum, ointment, or appliance of any kind for the treatment of any disease or injury, and all those who by any method publicly profess to treat or cure diseases, injury or deformity, shall pay to the treasurer of the commission of pharmacy an annual fee of \$100, upon the receipt of which the secretary of the commission shall issue a license for one year from its date. Two thousand dollars annually of the money arising from the license fund, or so much as may be needed, shall be devoted to defraying the expenses of the commission, and any balance remaining shall be paid into the state treasury. Said commission shall on the first day of January of each year, make a verified and itemized statement in writing to the auditor of state, of all receipts and

*Governor Shaw has announced that Mr. Leland will be reappointed a expiration of present term,

expenditures of money coming into their hands by virtue of their office. Any violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor, and any person shall, upon conviction thereof, pay a fine of not less than \$100, nor more than \$200. In actions or prosecutions under this chapter, it need not be proven that the defendant has not a license, but such fact shall be a matter of defense.

Two members of the board, one of whom shall be a woman, are appointed by the Governor for terms of four years, and are not eligible for reappointment.

The board holds annually at least two public examinations of teachers, and a full record of their proceedings, as well as a complete register of all persons to whom certificates and diplomas are issued, is kept by the board.

The new code makes provision for a certificate to primary teachers of acknowledged ability and of successful experience. The holder of this certificate is authorized to teach in first, second and third grades in public schools in the state for a period of five years.

Persons holding a certificate from the board are authorized, for a term of five years, to teach in any public school of the state and those having a state diploma are authorized to teach during life.

Fee for state certificate, \$3, and for state diploma, \$5; fees when collected to be paid into the state treasury. If, however, an applicant shall fail in the examination, one-half of the fee is returned.

The Iowa State Library is an outgrowth of the Library of the territory of Iowa which was founded by congress in 1838. In 1846 the state assumed control, but not until 1872 was the State Library organized, as it is at present, with an *ex-officio* Board of Trustees and a State Librarian.

The entire library, with its two departments, law and miscellaneous, then aggregated 14,500 volumes. Since 1872, the growth has been rapid and steady.

In 1884, the library was removed from its former quarters in the old Capitol building to the spacious and beautiful quarters which it now occupies.

The library now includes 61,443 volumes, exclusive of the 3,650 volumes belonging to the Traveling Library department. The Iowa State Library ranks among the first in the United States. Its law section and periodical section has been greatly strengthened during the last biennial period; many broken sets of standard periodicals, reports, etc., have been completed and new sets have

been added. The appropriation of \$5,500, for the purchase of books, etc., was reduced to \$5,000, with the adoption of the new Code.

The Traveling Library department of the State Library was created by an act of the Twenty sixth General Assembly, appropriating \$4,000 to inaugurate the system under the management of the State Librarian and the control of the State Library Board. In 1898 an annual appropriation of \$2,000 was made for the use of this department. The growth of the Traveling Library system in Iowa has at all times been equal to the opportunities for growth afforded by the state, and could have been greatly accelerated had the means of growth been more plentifully supplied. But, under the reasonable limitations put upon it by the legislature, the growth has doubtless been more reliable than it would have been had larger means been placed at the disposal of the Board.

As now organized, this department dates from the first day of July, 1892. Its chief purpose is the collection of historical data relating to our own state and the territory of the middle west of which it originally formed a part. So far as literature is concerned special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time; works of state and general western and national history and genealogy; works on the slavery question and the war for the Union; histories of all our wars from the earliest times; reports upon the census of both state and nation; works relating to the North American Indians; county histories; earlier and later maps; Iowa pamphlets; biographies of our notable men and women, printed or in manuscript; written or printed documents relating to early settlers and settlements; reports, catalogues and broadsides relating to the churches, educational and benevolent institutions of the state; in short, every species of data which can throw light upon local, state or western history.

The department publishes *The Annals of Iowa*, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages, which will enter upon its eighth year with the number for April, 1900. This is made up of original contributions in history and biography. By direction of the trustees it is sent free to every organized library in our state. Its price to subscribers is \$1 per year.

A considerable collection of museum materials, military relics and mementoes, specimens in archæology, geology, mineralogy and natural history, has been made and placed on exhibition.

This department has secured thirty-six fine oil portraits of distinguished Iowans, most of which have been placed temporarily in other rooms of the capitol. As works of art, many of these rank very high. Several more are promised in the near future.

The historical department is supported by a permanent appropriation of \$6,000 per annum.

Also a large number of autograph letters, manuscripts and portraits of notable people in all parts of the world.

An act of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly authorized the executive council to procure a site for and proceed to the erection of a state historical building for these rapidly accumulating collections. That body, however, appropriated only \$25,000, stipulating that this sum should complete the structure. The council, deeming the appropriation inadequate for this purpose, procured a site but proceeded no further, referring the matter to the Twenty-seventh General Assembly (1898). This latter body increased the appropriation \$30,000. It also provided that the site, which had cost \$4,300, should be held as the site for the arsenal, and that the sum of \$15,000, to be realized from the sale to the city of the old arsenal property, should be devoted to the purchase of a new site for the historical building. The council, upon the approval of this act, proceeded to purchase a site on the northeast corner of Eleventh street and Grand avenue, and let the contract for the erection of the west wing of the proposed structure, which has just been completed.

The Board of Control of State Institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the Twenty-seventh General Assembly, with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

- The Iowa Soldiers' home, at Marshalltown.
- Hospital for the Insane, at Independence.
- Hospital for the Insane, at Mt. Pleasant.
- Hospital for the Insane, at Clarinda.
- Hospital for the Insane, at Cherokee (in course of construction).
- College for the Blind, at Vinton.
- School for the Deaf, at Council Bluffs.
- Institution for Feeble-Minded Children, at Glenwood.
- Iowa Soldiers' Orphans' home, at Davenport.
- Industrial Home for the Blind, at Knoxville.
- Industrial School for Boys, at Eldora.
- Industrial School for Girls, at Mitchellville.
- Penitentiary, at Anamosa.
- Penitentiary, at Ft. Madison.

The board is also required to investigate thoroughly the reports and doings of the regents of the State university, the trustees of the State Normal school, and the State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and the books and records of said institutions.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing institutions, except the penitentiaries, were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers, and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The Board of Control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institu-

The board publishes quarterly a bulletin of over a hundred pages, devoted to the scientific investigation of the treatment of insanity and epilepsy, and the feeble-minded, and information embodying the experience of soldiers' homes, charitable, reformatory and penal institutions in this and other countries, it being the intention of the board to keep in touch with the best thought and judgment of the age.

As provided by law, under the direction of the board, the institutions under its control are supplied with goods for their support on competitive bids, thus procuring proper supplies at the lowest market prices. An opportunity to bid is afforded anyone who indicates a desire to the board.

The board visits and inspects each institution under its control at least twice each year, and oftener if necessary. Some member of the board visits and thoroughly inspects each hospital for the insane once each month.

The government of the university is committed to the charge of a board of regents, consisting of the governor of the state and the superintendent of public instruction, *ex officio*, and one member from each congressional district, who are elected by the general assembly to serve six years.

The collegiate department embraces four courses of study: Classical, philosophical, scientific and engineering. Four years are required to graduate in either one of these courses, and on completion the appropriate Bachelor's degree is granted.

In the law department the course of study extends through two years, and on completion thereof the graduate is given the degree of LL. B., and admitted to practice before the state and United States courts.

The medical department and the homeopathic medical department require the student to pursue his studies during a four years' course of six months each, and on completion of such course the degree M. D. is granted.

The dental department requires three years of nine months each, to complete the course and obtain the degree D. D. S.

The course in pharmacy extends through two years of six months each, and the degree Ph. G. is granted on its completion.

6. The course in mining engineering, of four years, leads to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Mining Engineering.

8. The course in veterinary science leads to the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine.

The Iowa Experiment Station was established in accordance with an act of congress, approved March 2, 1887, for the purpose of aiding "in acquiring and diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects con-

nected with agriculture, and to promote scientific investigation and experiments respecting the principles and applications of agricultural science," under direction of the land grant colleges in each state and territory established by the act of 1862 creating such colleges. This act appropriated to each state and territory, for the purpose of agricultural investigation, the sum of \$15,000 annually, and the experiment stations were thus established as a department of the land grant colleges. They are subject to the regulations of the United States department of agriculture, and are regularly inspected by officers of that department. The results of these investigations and experiments in agriculture, including live stock and all related branches, are published in bulletins issued by the experiment stations quarterly or oftener, and distributed free to all residents of the respective states who apply for them. The work of the Iowa Experiment Station along these lines has proved extremely popular, and met with favor in all parts of the state and nation, and many foreign countries as well. The reports of some of its experiments have been republished entire by foreign governments, and the demand for bulletins is so large that applicants outside of the state can no longer be supplied. These bulletins are free to farmers and citizens of Iowa.

HISTORICAL.—The State Normal school was established in 1876. Its province is the special education and training of public school teachers. It opened its first session September 6, 1876, with a faculty of five members. It enrolled, the first year, 155 students.

At present the school has forty-two members in the faculty, and the year 1898-99 enrolled 1,617 teacher grade students and 315 pupils in the model or training school. During the twenty-three years it has graduated 1,603 persons, 842 of these belonging to the last six classes. The school is in no sense a duplicate of other educational institutions, as it devotes itself exclusively to educating teachers, and sends out annually 700 different persons to work in the state, 200 of them being graduates of some one of its several courses.

COURSES OF STUDY.—The courses of study are conformed to the statute requirements for state certificates and state diplomas, giving considerable choice of subjects in language and science, so far as the amount to be taken is required. These courses are named English, Latin or science, according to the attention given to these several lines. These courses are of such character as to enable students to continue courses in the colleges and the universities after graduation without loss of time, excepting such time as the professional work in teaching has required.

A course in primary teacher training, a course in physical culture, and a course in professional studies for college graduates are also provided. Every line of preparation essential to public school teaching is provided. Opportunities to get instruction in all varieties of musical study are abundantly provided, as glee clubs, a choral society, a band, an orchestra and a mandolin and guitar club are constantly maintained.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION—

1. Regular courses, the minimum scholarship required for a county certificate. High school graduate courses, completion of a four-year course.
2. Age, at least 16 years.
3. Intention to teach in Iowa.

EXPENSES.—A fee of \$5 for a term of twelve weeks. Graduation fee, \$2.

SUMMER TERM.—To meet the demands of a large class of teachers throughout the state who are unable to attend the regular terms of the normal school, a summer term has been established during the last biennial period.

The attendance at this term in 1898 was 339, and in 1899, 471. It is expected that this term will be made one of the regular terms of the school in the future. For the benefit of the six weeks term now in operation, a tuition fee of \$10 is charged.

The United States government pays to the state of Iowa the sum of \$100 per year for each inmate of the Soldiers' home, which amount is used as a part of the support fund of the institution. Members of the home who receive a pension in excess of \$6 per month are required to turn over such excess to the state. One-half of this excess is then deducted from the amount allowed by the United States government for the support of such inmate.

Persons who have property or means for their support, or who draw a pension sufficient therefor, will not be admitted to the home; and if, after admission, an inmate of the home shall receive a pension, or other means sufficient for his support, or shall recover his health so as to enable him to support himself, he will be discharged from the home.

Regular appropriation by the state is \$14 per month for each inmate.

There is in connection with this institution a school building, pleasant, commodious and well lighted, and it is the policy of the board to have the course of instruction of the highest standard. A kindergarten is operated in connection for the very young pupils.

The average number in the home the past year was 466. The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is 16 years for girls and 16 years for boys. Less than 20 per cent remain to the age limit.

A library of well-selected juvenile literature is a source of pleasure and profitable entertainment to the children, as from necessity the pastimes and pleasures of the children are otherwise somewhat circumscribed; we feel that they should be well supplied with good books and reading matter of suitable character for their improvement and enjoyment.

It is the aim to provide the children with plenty of good comfortable clothing, and to have them taught to take good care of the same. Their clothing is all manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food and a reasonable amount of luxuries, and when the funds of the different appropriations fail the support fund has to make up the deficiency, which necessarily causes a reduction of the luxuries from the table that are so much enjoyed by the children.

The home is supported by a regular appropriation of \$10 per month for each inmate, and the actual transportation charges of inmates to and from the institution. Each county is liable to the state for the support of its children, except soldiers' orphans, who are cared for at the expense of the state.

There is a regular annual appropriation for this institution of \$10,000 with which to pay teachers and meet contingent expenses, and a further appropriation for support of \$35 per quarter for each pupil.

The school term begins on the first Wednesday in September and ends about the third week in June. It is desirable that the students enter at the first and remain until the close. They may, however, be admitted at any time, and they are at liberty to go home whenever their parents send for them.

The department of music is supplied with twenty-nine pianos, one pipe organ, several cabinet organs and a sufficient number of violins, guitars, bass viols and brass instruments. Every student capable of receiving it is given a complete course in this branch.

In the industrial department the girls are required to learn knitting, crocheting, fancy work, hand and machine sewing; the boys, netting, mattress making and cane seating. Those of either sex who so desire may learn carpet weaving.

These advantages are free to every person, either blind or of defective vision, and of suitable school age and capacity, in the state. All that the friends are expected to do is to pay the traveling expenses and furnish clothing. If they are unable to clothe the pupil, the necessary clothing will be furnished here and the bill sent to the county from which the pupil comes.

INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR THE BLIND—KNOXVILLE.

The Industrial Home for the Blind was established by an act of the Twenty-third General Assembly. Under the provision of this act the governor appointed a board of commissioners to select a location and superintend the construction of the buildings. Knoxville, Marion county, was selected as the site for the home, and by January 1, 1892, it was open for the admission of inmates.

The object of the institution is for the instruction of the adult blind of the state in some suitable trade or vocation and to furnish a working home for such blind as have learned a trade or vocation and desire to remain or be employed therein. It is open to every such blind person who has a legal residence in the state and is physically and mentally able to perform such labor as may be required in the trade or vocation carried on therein; each inmate being subject to such reasonable rules and regulations as may be adopted by the board of trustees for the government of the same. Broom making is the principal industry. Hammocks and nets are also made. All assignments of duty and allotment of work are made upon a basis of adaptation. Each works at that for which he is

specially fitted, and is paid what he earns, a regular schedule of wages being paid for all labor done by the inmates.

There is a regular appropriation for this institution of \$18,000 for the payment of officers' and teachers' salaries, and \$35 per quarter for each pupil as a support fund.

This institution is free to all too deaf to be educated in the common schools, sound in mind and free from immoral habits and from contagious and offensive diseases. No charge for board or tuition.

The session of the school begins the 1st day of October and continues until the last day of June of each year. Pupils should come promptly at the beginning and remain until the end of the session.

The purposes or objects of the institution are to provide special methods of training for that class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties. The

object is to make each child as nearly self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as near as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

There is appropriated for the support of these schools the sum of \$9 monthly for each boy, and \$10 monthly for each girl inmate.

The object of the institution is the reformation of juvenile delinquents. It is not a prison. It is a compulsory educational institution. It is a school where wayward and criminal boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors, and taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life. It is a training school, where the moral, intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on, at one and the same time.

Any boy or girl, over 7 and under 16 years of age, who has become criminal, vagrant, or incorrigible, may be committed to this school by any court of record. Any boy or girl may be discharged, or paroled from the school, at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence of reformation.

TRANSACTIONS OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

FOR THE YEAR 1899.

BONDS APPROVED.

On January 2, 1899, council approved the official bond of A. H. Davison, secretary of the executive council, in the sum of \$5,000.

DEPOSITING BONDS.

HISTORICAL BUILDING.

January 5th Curator Charles Aldrich was appointed a committee of one to formulate program for ceremonies of laying the corner stone, and instructed to extend to Hon. John A. Kasson an invitation to deliver the dedicatory address.

January 24th council authorized modification of specifications authorizing use of Iowa granite for the base course instead of Le Grande stone, at additional cost of \$875, and the leaving the attic and attic stairs unfinished, at a saving of \$716 80.

March 25th council fixed May 17th as date of dedicatory exercises and corner stone laying. Also ordered corner stone be inscribed: "Iowa, A. D. 1899." March 30th Capt. F. S. Whiting was employed as superintendent of construction at \$5 per day.

On April 24th council approved corner stone laying program as follows, to wit:

CAPITOL REPAIRS AUTHORIZED.

March 4th, on application of judges of supreme court, council authorized better facilities in their apartments in the state house, as follows:

August 26th elevators ordered put in good repair so as to make absolutely safe.

OLD ARSENAL BUILDING.

January 31st the old arsenal building was sold to J. Gottstein, after advertising for bids, for \$224.25.

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI EXPOSITION COMMISSION.

May 16th, commission met in joint session with council, and presented report of doings as required by statute. Council approved the action of commission in setting aside \$800 of unexpended balance of appropriation for printing, binding and distributing report submitted.

July 1st council adopted resolutions commendatory of commission for their faithful and laborious services and conscientious discharge of the responsibility imposed.

On March 6th, Mutual telephones in the offices of governor, auditor of state, secretary of state, treasurer of state and clerk of supreme court, at rental of \$2 per month. July 27th Iowa telephone in board of control offices.

EXAMINATIONS AND ACCOUNTINGS.

March 20th, a system of vouchers, to accomplish the accounting required by code section 169, for state printer and state binder, was adopted.

On January 5th F. G. Gilson, of Knoxville, J. C. Crockett, of Eldora, and W. R. Moninger, of Galva, were appointed committee to examine and report, under section 1056 of code, upon the accounts of the State Agricultural society. Report filed and approved February 15th.

Council authorized appointment of two expert accountants to quarterly examine and report upon the institution's accounts of treasury department, one of said experts to be named by governor and one by auditor of state, for the present from their respective office forces.

H. T. Blackburn and P. H. Skinner, expert accountants, were employed to examine the accounts of state officers for the settlement required by section 161 of the code of Iowa. They reported in writing on the several departments.

PLATFORM.

Resolved, First.—The republicans of Iowa, in state convention assembled, reaffirm their devotion to the republican party and its principles. For forty years in the administration of state and nation, it has made its epoch in history the happiest for mankind known in the history of the world. The success of the past makes us confident for the future.

Second.—We approve the administration of Wm. McKinley. He came to the presidency with every American industry prostrated in city and on farm throughout the land, and with the American

people pervaded with discontent; while the evil shadow of the despotism of Spain rested upon neighboring lands. To-day the borders of the republic have enlarged the era of freedom in two oceans and the prosperity of the American people is beyond that of any time in our history. Wm. McKinley takes rank with the greatest of presidents.

Third.—We approve the administration of Governor Shaw. He has brought business wisdom and the spirit of the people into the conduct of state affairs, and we congratulate the people of Iowa upon the legislative and executive management of their affairs, which management has met honorably and successfully the responsibilities of organizing and equipping volunteers for the army, has provided adequately for the many and important state institutions, has wiped out the state debt, and has established a large and satisfactory balance in the state treasury.

Fourth.—We commend the action of the Iowa delegation in congress in its support of protection, of the Dingley tariff, of the maintenance of the gold standard, and in its faithful support of the administration of President McKinley in his policy in peace and war.

Fifth.—We rejoice in the prospective election of David B. Henderson to be speaker of the house of representatives, and endorse him as wholly worthy of that honor.

Sixth.—We readopt the following declaration from the Iowa republican platform of 1898:

“The monetary standard of this country and the commercial world is gold. The permanence of this standard must be assured by congressional legislation, giving to it the validity and vitality of public law. All other money must be kept at a parity with gold.”

And we urgently call upon our senators and representatives in congress to lend their best endeavors to enact these propositions into law.

Seventh.—We denounce the Chicago platform and its declaration in favor of free trade and free silver coinage at the ratio of 16 to 1, and its attack upon the courts, as threatening the American people with a departure from the policies of good government that would prove fraught with evil to the American people. The enormities of that platform call for the resistance of all good citizens.

Eighth.—As republicans, we make recognition of the loyalty and exalted patriotism of the sound money Democrats and men of all parties who put aside partisanship in order to maintain the

good faith of the nation, and in resistance to the Chicago platform and its candidate.

Ninth.—To maintain the welfare of the people is the object and end of all government. Industry and commerce should be left free to pursue their method according to the natural laws of the world, but when the business aggregations known as trusts prove hurtful to the people, then they must be restrained by adequate law, and if need be abolished.

Tenth.—We believe in the wisdom and high purpose of the president of the United States. We admire the skill and courage of our officers in the conflict with the misguided Filipinos. We glory in the valor, the constancy, the hereditary heroism of our soldier boys of the army and navy. Nothing of support, of sympathy, of moral and material aid and comfort, will we ever withhold from them. There shall be no division among us until all in arms against the flag shall confess its supreme right and power and shall know that even in the furthest east it is the sign and promise of equal law, of justice and liberty throughout the land and of all inhabitants thereof.

Eleventh.—That for the national defense, for the reinforcement of the navy, for the enlargement of our foreign markets, for the employment of American workingmen in the mines, forests, farms, mills, factories and shipyards, we favor the enactment of legislation which will retain for American ships the carrying of our foreign commerce.

PLATFORM.

We, the democrats of Iowa, in convention assembled, unqualifiedly and unreservedly endorse the Chicago platform of 1896 in whole and in detail, and declare our unwavering fidelity and adherence to the same, and we proclaim our admiration for, and loyalty to, that peerless exponent of democratic principles, W. J. Bryan, and favor his nomination in 1900.

Second.—We rejoice in the exalted sentiment and motive that prompted the government of the United States to take up arms in defense of the bitterly oppressed people of Cuba, in the successful termination of the war with Spain, and in patriotism and unsurpassed bravery displayed by our soldiers and sailors on land and sea. The war for the liberation of the tyranny-cursed island was worthy the greatest republic and the most civilization that has flourished in the tides of time; but for the same reason that we glory in the successful war against Spain, we deprecate and condemn the war against the Filipinos. One war was for the emancipation of the people; the other for the subjugation of the people;

and if the war against Spain was right—and it was—that against the natives of the Philippines, who have committed no offense save to love liberty and to be willing to fight and die for it, is wrong. The attempt, unauthorized by congress, to conquer the natives of the oriental islands is a repudiation of the American doctrine of consent, affirmed in the declaration of independence, and in conflict with the principle which George Washington and his fellow patriots of the revolution made sacrifices to establish. We also condemn the war against the Filipinos, believing it to have been inspired by Great Britain for the purpose of producing conditions that will force an Anglo-American alliance, and we not only protest against the war and demand its termination by extension to the Filipinos of the same assurance given to the Cubans, but we record our deep-seated antagonism to an alliance with Great Britain or any other European power, and express our detestation of the attempts made in British interests to disrupt the friendly relations which have uniformly obtained between the United States and Germany. We oppose conquests of the Philippines because imperialism means militarism, because militarism means government by force, and because government by force means the death of government by consent, the destruction of political and industrial freedom, and the obliteration of equality of rights and the assassination of democratic institutions.

Third --We view with alarm the multiplication of those combinations of capital commonly known as trusts, that are concentrating and monopolizing industry, crushing out independent producers of limited means, destroying competition, restricting the opportunities for labor, artificially limiting production and raising prices, and creating an industrial condition different from state socialism only in the respect that under socialism the benefits of production would go to all, while under the trust system they go to increase the fortunes of the few. These trusts and combines are the direct outgrowth of the policy of the republican party, which has not only favored these institutions but has accepted their support and solicited their contributions to aid that party in retaining power, which has placed the burden of taxation upon those who labor and produce in times of peace, and who fight our battles in time of war, while the wealth of the country is exempted from these burdens. We condemn this policy, and it is our solemn conviction that the trusts must be destroyed or they will destroy free government, and we demand that they be suppressed by repeal of the protective tariff and other privileges conferring legislation

responsible for them, by the enactment of such legislation, state and national, as will aid in their destruction.

Fourth.--We condemn the present system of letting convict labor by contract to private persons or corporations as now in vogue in the state of Iowa, and recommend that the same be abolished and that convict labor be employed solely and only in such work as will not bring it into competition with free labor.

Fifth.--We urge that the legislature of the state carefully consider the existing liquor laws, with a view of eliminating the objectionable features of the mulct law and of substituting therefor carefully guarded legislation, just and fair, and in the interest of true temperance.

Sixth.--We condemn the administration of Leslie M. Shaw and the republican party for weakness and inefficiency, and for subservience to the monied and corporate interests as opposed to the interests of the people.

To the support of the foregoing principles we cordially invite the active co-operation of all lovers of liberty and equality.

PLATFORM.

Preamble.—The prohibition party of Iowa in convention assembled in Des Moines May 23 24, 1899, acknowledging Almighty God as the dispenser of all good, the source of all power and authority, and Jesus Christ as the Son of God and Savior of the world, hereby set forth the following declaration of principles:

First.—We demand the entire suppression of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors as a beverage, the repeal of all laws favoring the traffic, and the enforcement of all laws tending to the suppression of the same.

Second.—We hereby commend the action of Secretary Long in suppressing the use of alcoholic liquors as rations in the navy, but we most emphatically denounce the army canteen which the four million civil war soldiers never knew, and we view with alarm the act of anarchy in Attorney-General Griggs' decision, which sets aside the will and intent of congress, and gives the canteen a legal existence; and we call upon the president to protect us from this outrage.

Third.—We believe that all who share the burdens of government should also share its privileges, and that intelligence instead of sex should be the basis of suffrage.

Fourth.—We demand an amendment to the federal constitution providing for the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

Fifth.—We heartily commend the efforts of the czar of Russia to promote the cause of peace on earth and good will among men.

Sixth.—We demand of corporations that they grant to all persons in their employ the right to one day of rest in seven.

PLATFORM.

First.—The people's party of the state of Iowa, in convention assembled at Des Moines, this 30th day of August, 1899, hereby reaffirms the national platform of the party as adopted at Omaha, A. D. 1892, and reaffirmed at St. Louis, A. D. 1896.

Second.—For the purpose of meeting the obligations of our contracts, the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 meets our approval, but for internal commerce the truly scientific money of the United States is a money not dependent upon intrinsic value or coin redemption, but a money issued solely by the government, without the intervention of corporations, thus nationalizing the money trust. Such a money should be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private, without any exception or limitation. It should be received by the government in payment of all dues. It should be issued in volume commensurate with the business demands of the country and increase of population.

Third.—We demand direct legislation and proportional representation by which the people shall be able to truly govern themselves, become their own legislators, judge of the constitutionality of their own law-making acts and forever keep for the common life the self-governing power which can never be rightly or safely delegated to representatives. Thus only, and for the first time since our fathers established the New England town meeting, will government be, for and of the people become a reality.

Fourth.—The rapid concentration of private industries into consolidated organizations, commonly called trusts, which is now awakening and alarming the American people is the result of economic law and the development of the age, and cannot be remedied by restrictive or penal anti-trust legislation, or outlawed in the courts, but such evils can only be remedied by the ownership of natural and economic monopolies by the whole people in their collective capacity as nation, state and municipality, in order that there may be equality of all men in the gifts of God to the common life, equality of economic opportunities and political power, equality in access to all the national and social resources needful for the living of free, righteous, happy and complete lives. We charge the republican and democratic parties that while recognizing the disease they have utterly failed to discover or prescribe the true remedy.

Fifth.—We believe that the declaration of congress, "the people of Cuba are and of right ought to be free and independent," should apply with equal force and effect to the Filipino and his native land, and that the same rights and liberties so guaranteed to one by the United States should also immediately be guaranteed the other and tendered to both.

MANIFESTO.

We, the delegates of the socialist labor party of Iowa, in convention assembled, in the city of Clinton, wish to call the attention of the workers of this state to their miserable condition, and to the fact that in the midst of plenty, millions of willing workers are on the verge of starvation, compelled to tramp the roads and streets of this country in looking for work to obtain means to support themselves and families, but look in vain. Why is this?

Simply because, under our present capitalistic system, it is impossible for them to compete with improved machinery, owned

by private capitalists; and as long as the manufacturer finds it cheaper to use the power of machinery, he will not trouble himself about workmen.

We also wish to remind our fellow workers of the promises made by the republican party. All it was necessary for them to do was to elect William McKinley, and prosperity would come as never before. But what is the actual condition of to-day?

Gigantic corporations, under the name of trusts, are forming with a rapidity never before witnessed, and by their "economizing" and "simplifying" methods, are throwing tens of thousands of laborers out of work, while, on the other hand, by increasing prices to consumers, they are doubling their wrongful profits.

We also wish to warn the workers against the "Anti-Trust Cry" of the republican and democratic parties, a cry on which they are trying to conduct the coming political battle of 1900, as being insufficient for the restoration of the people's patrimony; seeing that the only solution is for the people at large to own and operate the trusts for the benefit of the whole people, and not have them owned and operated for the benefit of a favored few, as at present.

We also want to place ourselves on record as condemning the present administration for trying to enslave and subjugate the Filipinos and Cubans, who are now struggling for their liberty, as our forefathers did a century ago.

The war with Spain was begun under false pretenses, the administration asserting that it was its intention to put an end to the barbarous and inhuman struggle in Cuba in the "name of humanity," and the government had at that time the hearty support of the whole nation. Now that this "war for humanity" is transformed into a war for the "benevolent assimilation in the name of civilization" of Spain's former colonies, it is very different. The United States has merely taken the place of the former tyrants. It is not the intention of this government to fulfill its pledge, but simply to retain those countries as "colonies," to be exploited for the benefit of American capitalists, and at the same time get an excuse for a large standing army, which may afterwards be used very handily to bayonet wage-slaves into submission at home—Fellow workers, beware of military rule!

Toilers of Iowa! We again call upon you to break the chains of partyism which bind you to the chariot wheels of capitalism as slaves; think of the foolishness it is for a wealth-producer to elect a wealth-absorber to make laws for him. The time has

come when the worker will necessarily have to become class-conscious in politics as well as in economics, and join the party which guarantees him the full value of his labor.

Fellow workers! Such a party is the socialist labor party, which raises its voice against the wrong perpetrated on the working class. It has never faltered; it never did, and never will, sell out to any other party. Its foundation is knowledge and science; its motto is: "One for all, and all for one." Therefore, we ask you to join the socialist labor party, to study its principles, and to vote for your emancipation from wage-slavery.

STATE PLATFORM.

Recognizing the fact that our public roads and rivers are in bad condition, we demand that the legislature of Iowa take the necessary steps at the earliest moment to improve them, and thus give employment to the unemployed at fair wages.

Recognizing the evils which flow from child-labor and its companion, ignorance, we demand the enactment of a state law prohibiting the employment of children under 16 years of age in factories, stores, mills, etc., and also the enactment of a law requiring the attendance at school of all children, and public assistance in meals, clothing, etc., where necessary.

Believing that a shortening of the workday will put more people to work, we demand a law reducing the hours of labor in proportion to the progress of production.

Believing that life and health are more sacred than property, we demand their protection by an efficient employers' liability law.

Believing in the integrity and honesty of the people, we demand a direct vote and secret ballot in all elections, universal and equal right of suffrage without regard to color, creed or sex; the people to have the right to propose laws and to vote upon all measures of importance according to the referendum principle. The principle of proportional representation to be introduced. Election days to be legal holidays.

Repeal of all pauper, tramp, conspiracy laws.

Unabridged right of combination.

All wages to be paid in lawful money of the United States. Equalization of women's wages with those of men, where equal service is performed.

Abolition of the veto power wherever it exists.

All public officers to be subject to recall by their respective constituencies.

Administration of justice to be free of charge.

The fullest measure of self-government.

Abolition of capital punishment.

We demand a progressive income tax and tax on inheritances; the smaller incomes to be exempt, and that the poll tax be abolished.

ON CO-OPERATIVE COLONIES.

Resolved, That we are opposed to the tactics of all co-operative colonies and kindred schemes to obtain the co-operative commonwealth.

NO A LA GLASGOW MUNICIPALIZATION.

WHEREAS, The S. L. P. demands the public ownership of all railroads, telephones, telegraphs, and all other means of transportation and communication; and,

WHEREAS, Certain middle class politicians and capitalists are advocating government ownership of all so-called natural monopolies (a la Glasgow), to deceive the people; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the delegates of this convention declare themselves directly opposed to such middle-class movements, as not beneficial to the working class; and further be it

Resolved, That we urge the application of the fundamental principles of the co-operative commonwealth to all public services, and particularly insist upon the following demands:

Election by the employes of their respective foremen, superintendents and other officers, not elected by a general vote of the people. A minimum salary, supplemented by an equal distribution of a portion of the surplus which, produced by their joint labor, is now appropriated by the directors and stockholders of corporations.

Another portion of the surplus shall be set aside as a pension fund for the aged and a relief for the sick employes of the state; the remaining portion shall be applied to the maintenance and extension of said public service, the price of which shall be reduced to the extent of the saving permanently effected by mechanical and other improvements.

DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.

We, the united Christian party, in state convention assembled at Des Moines, Iowa, July 4, and 5, 1899, acknowledge Almighty God as the rightful sovereign of all men and women, and the Lord Jesus Christ as the ruler among the nations of the earth, and that He is entitled to all the honor and glory, and to whose laws all human enactments must conform to secure the blessings of peace and prosperity, do present the following declaration of principles:

That we, as a party, favor whatever tends to make men and women virtuous, intelligent and happy, and acknowledge that God gave us in His Word a foundation for law, and a standard for justice through Christ, for the government of all mankind.

We hold that all temporal governments derive their just powers from God, through Christ, and by the consent of the governed.

We recognize the fact that there are many important reforms needed, and that none of these can be accomplished until we acknowledge Christ and unite in His name, not a union of church and state, but a union of all Christian voters at the ballot box for the overthrow of the licensed saloon and all other legalized wrong.

Therefore we, the united Christian party, seeking the welfare of all the people, pledge our entire energies to the work of securing a system of government that will make reforms possible.

Believing that it will be impossible to secure direct legislation without a union of all Christians, we ask all His followers, regardless of nationality, creed or color, sex or previous politics, to cooperate with us at the ballot box in making this a government from God.

We do, therefore, declare for the adoption of the system of "direct legislation," known as the "initiative and referendum," together with proportionate representation, and the "imperative mandate," that the power of the people may be justly and effectually exercised; being governed in all things, law-making included, by the standard, "What would Jesus do?"

We therefore advocate this system of government, and present it to the people as the only practical method of securing state and national reforms.

PLATFORM.

The republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in national convention, appealing for the popular and

historical justification of their claims to the matchless achievements of thirty years of republican rule, earnestly and confidently address themselves to the awakened intelligence, experience and conscience of their countrymen in the following declaration of facts and principles:

Effects of Democratic Control.—For the first time since the civil war the American people have witnessed the calamitous consequences of full and unrestricted democratic control of the government. It has been a record of unparalleled incapacity, dishonor and disaster. In administrative management it has ruthlessly sacrificed indispensable revenue, entailed an unceasing deficit, eked out ordinary current expenses with borrowed money, piled up the public debt by \$262,000,000 in time of peace, forced an adverse balance of trade, kept a perpetual menace hanging over the redemption fund, pawned American credit to alien syndicates, and reversed all the measures and results of successful republican rule. In the broad effect of its policy it has precipitated panic, blighted industry and trade with prolonged depression, closed factories, reduced work and wages, halted enterprise and crippled American production while stimulating foreign production for the American market.

Administration of President Harrison.—Every consideration of public safety and individual interest demands that the government shall be rescued from the hands of those who have shown themselves incapable to conduct it without disaster at home and dishonor abroad, and shall be restored to the party which for thirty years administered it with unequalled success and prosperity, and in this connection we heartily indorse the wisdom, the patriotism, and the success of the administration of President Harrison.

Protection.—We renew and emphasize our allegiance to the policy of protection as the bulwark of American industrial independence and the foundation of American development and prosperity. This true American policy taxes foreign products and encourages home industry; it puts the burden of revenue on foreign goods; it secures the American market for the American producer; it upholds the American standard of wages for the American workingman; it puts the factory by the side of the farm, and makes the American farmer less dependent on foreign demand and price; it diffuses general thrift, and founds the strength of all on the strength of each. In its reasonable application it is just, fair and impartial, equally opposed to foreign control and domestic monopoly, to sectional discrimination and individual favoritism.

The Wilson Law—We denounce the present democratic tariff as sectional, injurious to the public credit, and destructive to business enterprise. We demand such an equitable tariff on foreign imports which come into competition with American products as will not only furnish adequate revenue for the necessary expenses of the government, but will protect American labor from degradation to the wage level of other lands.

We are not pledged to any particular schedules. The question of rates is a practical question, to be governed by the conditions of the time and of production; the ruling and uncompromising principle is the protection and development of American labor and industry. The country demands a right settlement and then it wants rest.

Reciprocity.—We believe the repeal of the reciprocity arrangements negotiated by the last republican administration was a national calamity, and we demand their renewal and extension on such terms as will equalize our trade with other nations, remove the restrictions which now obstruct the sale of American products in the ports of other countries, and secure enlarged markets for the products of our farms, forests and factories.

Protection and reciprocity are twin measures of republican policy, and go hand in hand. Democratic rule has recklessly struck down both, and both must be re-established. Protection for what we produce; free admission for the necessaries of life which we do not produce; reciprocal agreements of mutual interests which gain open markets for us in return for our open market to others. Protection builds up domestic industry and trade, and secures our own market for ourselves; reciprocity builds up foreign trade and finds an outlet for our surplus.

Production of Sugar.—We condemn the present administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar which the American people use, and for which they pay other countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

Wool and Woolens.—To all our products, to those of the mine and the field as well as to those of the shop and the factory—to hemp, to wool, the product of the great industry of sheep husbandry, as well as to the finished woolens of the mill—we promise the most ample protection.

Merchant Marine.—We favor restoring the early American policy of discriminating duties for the upbuilding of our merchant

PLATFORM.

The republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in national convention, appealing for the popular and

marine and the protection of our shipping in the foreign-carrying trade, so that American ships—the product of American labor, employed in American ship yards, sailing under the stars and stripes, and manned, officered and owned by Americans—may regain the carrying of our foreign commerce.

National Currency and Credit.—The republican party is unreservedly for sound money. It caused the enactment of the law providing for the resumption of specie payments in 1879; since then every dollar has been as good as gold.

We are unalterably opposed to every measure calculated to debase our currency or impair the credit of our country. We are therefore opposed to the free coinage of silver except by international agreement with the leading commercial nations of the world, which we pledge ourselves to promote, and until such agreement can be obtained the existing gold standard must be preserved.

All our silver and paper currency must be maintained at parity with gold, and we favor all measures designed to maintain inviolably the obligations of the United States and all our money, whether coin or paper, at the present standard, the standard of the most enlightened nations of the earth.

Pensions —The veterans of the Union army deserve, and should receive, fair treatment and generous recognition. Whenever practicable they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the enactment of such laws as are best calculated to secure the fulfillment of the pledges made to them in the dark days of the country's peril.

We denounce the practice in the pension bureau, so recklessly and unjustly carried on by the present administration, of reducing pensions and arbitrarily dropping names from the rolls, as deserving the severest condemnation of the American people.

Foreign Relations.—Our foreign policy should be at all times firm, vigorous, and dignified, and all our interests in the western hemisphere carefully watched and guarded.

The Hawaiian islands should be controlled by the United States, and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them.

The Nicaraguan canal should be built, owned and operated by the United States; and by the purchase of the Danish islands we should secure a proper and much-needed naval station in the West Indies.

Armenian Massacres.—The massacres in Armenia have aroused the deep sympathy and just indignation of the American people, and we believe that the United States should exercise all the influence it can properly exert to bring these atrocities to an end. In Turkey American residents have been exposed to the gravest dangers, and American property destroyed. There and everywhere American citizens and American property must be absolutely protected at all hazards and at any cost.

Monroe Doctrine.—We reassert the Monroe doctrine in its full extent, and we reaffirm the right of the United States to give the doctrine effect by responding to the appeals of any American state for friendly intervention in case of European encroachments. We have not interfered, and shall not interfere, with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not on any pretext be extended.

We hopefully look forward to the eventual withdrawal of the European powers from this hemisphere, and to the ultimate union of all the English-speaking part of the continent by the free consent of its inhabitants.

Cuba.—From the hour of achieving their own independence, the people of the United States have regarded with sympathy the struggles of other American peoples to free themselves from European domination. We watch with deep and abiding interest the heroic battle of the Cuban patriots against cruelty and oppression, and our best hopes go out to the full success of their determined contest for liberty.

The government of Spain, having lost control of Cuba, and being unable to protect the property or lives of resident American citizens, or to comply with its treaty obligations, we believe that the government of the United States should actively use its influence and good offices to restore peace and give independence to the island.

The Navy.—The peace and security of the republic, and the maintenance of its rightful influence among the nations of the earth, demand a naval power commensurate with its position and responsibility. We, therefore, favor the continued enlargement of the navy, and a complete system of harbor and sea coast defenses.

Foreign Immigration.—For the protection of the equality of our American citizenship and of the wages of our workingmen against the fatal competition of low-priced labor, we demand that the immigration laws be thoroughly enforced, and so extended as to

exclude from entrance to the United States those who can neither read nor write.

Civil Service.—The civil service law was placed on the statute book by the republican party, which has always sustained it, and we renew our repeated declarations that it shall be thoroughly and honestly enforced and extended wherever practicable.

Free Ballot and Honest Count.—We demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot, and that such ballot shall be counted and returned as cast.

Lynchings.—We proclaim our unqualified condemnation of the uncivilized and barbarous practice well known as lynching, or killing of human beings, suspected or charged with crime, without process of law.

National Board of Arbitration.—We favor the creation of a national board of arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employers and employed engaged in inter-state commerce.

Free Homesteads.—We believe in an immediate return to the free homestead policy of the republican party, and urge the passage by congress of the satisfactory free homestead measure which has already passed the house and is now pending in the senate.

Territories.—We favor the admission of the remaining territories at the earliest practical date, having due regard to the interests of the people of the territories and of the United States. All the federal officers appointed for the territories should be elected from *bona fide* residents thereof, and the rights of self-government should be accorded as far as practicable.

Alaska.—We believe the citizens of Alaska should have representation in the congress of the United States, to the end that needful legislation may be intelligently enacted.

Temperance.—We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

Rights of Women.—The republican party is mindful of the rights and interests of women. Protection of American industries include equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work, and protection to the home. We favor the admission of women to wider spheres of usefulness, and welcome their co-operation in rescuing the country from democratic and populist mismanagement and misrule.

Conclusion.—Such are the principles and policies of the republican party. By these principles we will abide, and these policies we will put into execution. We ask for them the considerate judgment of the American people. Confident alike in the history of our great party and in the justice of our cause, we present our platform and our candidates in the full assurance that the election will bring victory to the republican party and prosperity to the people of the United States.

PLATFORM.

We, the democrats of the United States in national convention assembled, do reaffirm our allegiance to those great essential principles of justice and liberty upon which our institutions are founded and which the democratic party has advocated from Jefferson's time to our own—freedom of speech, freedom of press, freedom of conscience, the preservation of personal rights, the equality of all citizens before the law and the faithful observance of constitutional limitations.

State Rights.—During all these years the democratic party has resisted the tendency of selfish interest toward the centralization of governmental power and steadfastly maintained the integrity of the dual scheme of government established by the founders of this Republic of republics. Under its guidance and teachings the great principle of local self-government has found its best expression in the maintenance of the rights of the states and in its assertion of the necessity of confining the general government to the exercise of powers granted by the constitution of the United States.

Civil and Religious Liberty.—The constitution of the United States guarantees to every citizen the rights of civil and religious liberty. The democratic party has always been the exponent of political liberty and religious freedom, and it renews its obligations and reaffirms its devotion to these fundamental principles of the constitution.

The Money Question.—Recognizing that the money question is paramount to all others at this time, we invite attention to the fact that the federal constitution names silver and gold together as the money metals of the United States, and that the first coinage law passed by congress under the constitution made the silver dollar the monetary unit and admitted gold to free coinage at a ratio based upon the silver dollar unit.

We declare that the act of 1873, demonetizing silver without the knowledge or approval of the American people, has resulted in the appreciation of gold and a corresponding fall in the prices of commodities produced by the people; a heavy increase in the burden of taxation and of all debts, public and private; the enrichment of the money-lending class at home and abroad, the prostration of industry and impoverishment of the people.

We are unalterably opposed to monometallism, which has locked fast the prosperity of an industrial people in the paralysis

of hard times. Gold monometallism is a British policy, and its adoption has brought other nations into financial servitude to London. It is not only un-American but anti-American, and it can be fastened on the United States only by the stifling of that spirit and love of liberty which proclaimed our political independence in 1776, and won it in the War of the Revolution.

Free Silver.—We demand the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the aid or consent of any other nation. We demand that the standard silver dollar shall be a full legal tender, equally with gold, for all debts, public and private, and we favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

We are opposed to the policy and practice of surrendering to the holders of the obligations of the United States the option reserved by law to the government of redeeming such obligations in either silver coin or gold coin.

Opposed to Bond Issues.—We are opposed to the issuing of interest-bearing bonds of the United States in time of peace, and condemn the trafficking with banking syndicates which, in exchange for bonds and at an enormous profit to themselves, supply the federal treasury with gold to maintain the policy of gold monometallism.

Against National Banks.—Congress alone has the power to coin and issue money, and President Jackson declared that this power could not be delegated to corporations or individuals. We, therefore, denounce the issuance of notes intended to circulate as money by national banks as in derogation of the constitution, and we demand that all paper which is made a legal tender for public and private debts, or which is receivable for duties to the United States, shall be issued by the government of the United States and shall be redeemable in coin.

Tariff and Income Tax.—We hold that the tariff duties should be levied for purposes of revenue, such duties to be so adjusted as to operate equally throughout the country, and not discriminate between class or section, and that taxation should be limited by the needs of the government, honestly and economically administered. We denounce as disturbing to business the republican threat to restore the McKinley law, which has twice been condemned by the people in national elections, and which, enacted under the false plea of protection to home industry, proved a prolific breeder of trusts and monopolies, enriched the few at the

expense of the many, restricted trade and deprived the producers of the great American staples of access to their natural markets.

Income Tax.—Until the money question is settled we are opposed to any agitation for further changes in our tariff laws, except such as are necessary to meet the deficit in revenue caused by the adverse decision of the supreme court on the income tax. But for this decision by the supreme court there would be no deficit in the revenue under the law passed by a democratic congress in strict pursuance of the uniform decisions of that court for nearly 100 years, that court having in that decision sustained constitutional objections to its enactment which had previously been overruled by the ablest judges who have ever sat on that bench. We declare that it is the duty of congress to use all the constitutional powers which remain after that decision, or which may come from its reversal by the court as it may hereafter be constituted, so that the burden of taxation may be equally and impartially laid, to the end that wealth may bear its due proportion of the expenses of the government.

Protection of American Labor.—We hold that the most efficient way of protecting American labor is to prevent the importation of foreign pauper labor to compete with it in the home market, and that the value of the home market to our American farmers and artisans is greatly reduced by a vicious monetary system which depresses the prices of their product below the cost of production, and thus deprives them of the means of purchasing the products of our home manufactories; and as labor creates the wealth of the country, we demand the passage of such laws as may be necessary to protect it in all its rights.

We are in favor of the arbitration of differences between employers engaged in interstate commerce and their employes, and recommend such legislation as is necessary to carry out this principle.

Corporate Wealth.—The absorption of wealth by the few, the consolidation of our leading railway systems and the formation of trusts and pools require a stricter control by the federal government of those articles of commerce.

We demand the enlargement of the powers of the interstate commerce commission, and such restrictions and guarantees in the control of railroads as will protect the people from robbery and oppression.

Congressional Appropriations.—We denounce the profligate waste of money wrung from the people by oppressive taxation and

the lavish appropriations of recent republican congresses, which have kept taxes high while the labor that pays them is unemployed, and the products of the people's toil are depressed in price till they no longer repay the cost of production.

We demand a return to that simplicity and economy which befits a democratic government, and a reduction in the number of useless offices, the salaries of which drain the substance of the people.

Federal Interference in Local Affairs.—We denounce arbitrary interference by federal authorities in local affairs as a violation of the constitution of the United States and a crime against free institutions, and we especially object to government by injunction as a new and highly dangerous form of oppression, by which federal judges in contempt of the laws of the state and rights of citizens, become at once legislators, judges and executioners, and we approve the bill passed at the last session of the United States senate and now pending in the house of representatives relative to contempts in federal courts, and providing for trials by jury in certain cases of contempt.

Pacific Funding Bill.—No discrimination should be indulged by the government of the United States in favor of any of its debtors.

We approve of the refusal of the Fifty-third Congress to pass the Pacific railroad funding bill and denounce the efforts of the present republican congress to enact similar measures.

Pension Rule Indorsed.—Recognizing the just claims of deserving Union soldiers, we heartily indorse the rule of the present commissioner of pensions, that no name shall be arbitrarily dropped from the pension roll, and the fact of enlistment and service should be deemed conclusive evidence against disease and disability before enlistment.

Admission of Territories.—We favor the admission of the territories of New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma into the Union as states, and we favor the early admission of all the territories having the necessary population and resources to entitle them to statehood, and while they remain territories we hold that the officials appointed to administer the government to any territory, together with the District of Columbia and Alaska, should be *bona fide* residents of the territory or district in which their duties are to be performed. The democratic party believes in home rule, and that all public lands of the United States should be appropriated to the establishment of free homes for American citizens.

We recommend that the territory of Alaska be granted a delegate in congress, and that the general land and timber laws of the United States be extended to said territory.

Monroe Doctrine.—The Monroe doctrine, as originally declared and as interpreted by our succeeding presidents, is a permanent part of the foreign policy of the United States, and must at all times be maintained.

Sympathy for Cubans.—We extend our sympathy to the people of Cuba in their heroic struggle for liberty and independence.

Civil Service.—We are opposed to life tenure in the public service, except as provided in the constitution. We favor appointments based upon merits, fixed terms of office, and such an administration of the civil service laws as will afford equal opportunities to all citizens of ascertained fitness.

Third Term Condemned.—We declare it to be the unwritten law of this republic, established by custom and usage of 100 years, and sanctioned by the examples of the greatest and wisest of those who founded and have maintained our government, that no man should be eligible for a third term of the presidential office.

Improvements of Water Ways.—The federal government should care for and improve the Mississippi river and other great waterways of the republic, so as to secure for the interior states easy and cheap transportation to tide water. Whenever any waterway of the republic is of sufficient importance to demand aid of the government, such aid should be extended upon a definite plan of continuous work until a permanent improvement is secured.

Conclusion.—Confiding in the justice of our cause and the necessity of its success at the polls, we submit the foregoing declaration of principles and purposes to the considerate judgment of the American people. We invite the support of all citizens who approve them and who desire to have them made effective through legislation for the relief of the people and the restoration of the country's prosperity.

PLATFORM.

The people's party, assembled in national convention, reaffirms its allegiance to the principles declared by the founders of the republic, and also to the fundamental principles of just government as enunciated in the platform of the party in 1892. We rec-

ognize that through the connivance of the present and preceding administrations the country has reached a crisis in its national life, as predicted in our declarations four years ago, and that prompt and patriotic action is the supreme duty of the hour. We realize that while we have political independence our financial and industrial independence is yet to be attained by restoring to our country the constitutional control and exercise of the functions necessary to a people's government, which functions have been basely surrendered by our public servants to corporate monopolies.

The influence of European money changers has been more potent in shaping legislation than the voice of the American people. Executive power and patronage have been used to corrupt our legislatures, and defeat the will of the people, and plutocracy has thereby been dethroned upon the ruins of Democracy.

Declarations on Finance.—To restore the government intended by the fathers, and for the welfare and prosperity of this and future generations, we demand the establishment of an economic and financial system which shall make us masters of our own affairs and independent of European control by the adoption of the following declaration of principles:

1. We demand a national money, safe and sound, issued by the general government only, without the intervention of banks of issue, to be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private; a just, equitable and efficient means of distribution direct to the people and through the lawful disbursements of the government.

2. We demand the free and unrestricted coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of foreign nations.

3. We demand the volume of circulating medium be speedily increased to an amount sufficient to meet the demands of the business and population of this country and to restore the just level of prices of labor and production.

4. We denounce the sale of bonds and the increase of the public interest-bearing debt made by the present administration as unnecessary and without authority of law, and that no more bonds be issued except by specific act of congress.

5. We demand such legislation as will prevent the demonetization of the lawful money of the United States by private contract.

6. We demand that the government, in payment of its obligations, shall use its option as to the kind of lawful money in which

they are to be paid, and we denounce the present and preceding administrations for surrendering this option to the holders of government obligations.

7. We demand a graduated income tax, to the end that aggregated wealth shall bear its just proportion of taxation, and we regard the recent decision of the supreme court relative to the income tax law as a misinterpretation of the constitution and an invasion of the rightful powers of congress over the subject of taxation.

8. We demand that postal savings banks be established by the government for the safe deposit of the savings of the people and to facilitate exchange.

Government Ownership of Railroad and Telegraph.—Transportation being a means of exchange and a public necessity, the government should own and operate the railroads in the interest of the people and on a non-partisan basis, to the end that all may be accorded the same treatment in transportation, and that the tyranny and political power now exercised by the great railroad corporations, which result in the impairment, if not the destruction, of the political rights and personal liberties of the citizen may be destroyed. Such ownership is to be accomplished gradually in a manner consistent with sound public policy.

The interest of the United States in the public highways built with public moneys and the proceeds of extensive grants of land to the Pacific railroads should never be alienated, mortgaged or sold, but guarded and protected for the general welfare as provided by the laws organizing such railroads. The foreclosure of existing liens of the United States on these roads should at once follow default in the payment thereof of the debt of the companies, and at the foreclosure sales of said roads the government shall purchase the same if it becomes necessary to protect its interests therein or if it can be purchased at a reasonable price; and the government should operate said railroads as public highways for the benefit of the people and not in the interest of the few, under suitable provisions for protection of life and property, giving to all transportation interests equal privileges and equal rates for fares and freights.

We denounce the present infamous schemes for refunding these debts, and demand that the laws now applicable thereto be executed and administered according to their true intent and spirit.

The telegraph, like the postoffice system, being a necessity for

the transmission of news, should be owned and operated by the government in the interest of the people.

Reclamation of Land.—The true policy demands that national and state legislation shall be such as will ultimately enable every prudent and industrious citizen to secure a home, and therefore the land should not be monopolized for speculative purposes. All lands now held by the railroads and other corporations in excess of their actual needs, should, by lawful means, be reclaimed by the government and held for actual settlers only, and private land monopoly as well as alien ownership should be prohibited.

We condemn the frauds by which the land grants to the Pacific railroad companies have, through the connivance of the interior department, robbed multitudes of actual *bona fide* settlers of their homes and miners of their claims, and we demand legislation by congress which will enforce the exemption of mineral land from such grants after as well as before patent.

We demand that *bona fide* settlers on all public lands be granted free homes as provided in the national homestead law, and that no exception be made in the case of Indian reservations, when opened for settlement, and that all lands not now patented come under this demand.

Direct Legislation.—We favor a system of direct legislation through the initiative and referendum, under proper constitutional safeguards.

We demand the election of president, vice-president, and United States senators by a direct vote of the people.

For Cuban Independence.—We tender to the patriotic people of Cuba our deepest sympathy in their heroic struggle for political freedom and independence, and we believe the time has come when the United States, the great republic of the world, should recognize that Cuba is, and of right ought to be, a free and independent state.

We favor home rule in the territories and the District of Columbia, and the early admission of the territories as states.

All public salaries should be made to correspond to the price of labor and its products.

In time of great industrial depression idle labor should be employed on public works as far as practical.

The arbitrary course of the courts in assuming to imprison citizens for indirect contempt and ruling by injunction should be prevented by proper legislation.

We favor just pensions for our disabled Union soldiers.

Believing that the election franchise and untrammelled ballot are essential to a government of, for, and by the people, the people's party condemns the wholesale system of disfranchisement adopted in some of the states as unrepugnant and undemocratic, and we declare it to be the duty of the several state legislatures to take such action as will secure a full, free and fair ballot and an honest count.

While the foregoing propositions constitute the platform upon which our party stands and for the vindication of which its organization will be maintained, we recognize that the great and pressing issue of the pending campaign upon which the present presidential election will turn, is the financial question, and upon this great and specific issue between the parties we cordially invite the aid and co-operation of all organizations and citizens agreeing with us upon this vital question.

PLATFORM.

This convention has assembled to uphold the principles upon which depend the honor and welfare of the American people, in order that democrats throughout the Union may unite their patriotic efforts to avert disaster to their country and ruin from their party.

The democratic party is pledged to equal and exact justice to all men, of every creed and condition; to the largest freedom of the individual consistent with good government; to the preservation of the federal government in its constitutional vigor, and to the support of the states in all their just rights; to economy in the public expenditures; to the maintenance of the public credit and sound money, and is opposed to paternalism and all class legislation.

The declarations of the Chicago convention attack individual freedom, the right of private contract, the independence of the judiciary, and the authority of the president to enforce federal laws. They advocate a reckless attempt to increase the price of silver by legislation, to the debasement of our monetary standard, and threaten unlimited issues of paper money by the government; they abandon for republican allies the democratic cause of tariff reform to court the favor of protectionists to their fiscal heresy.

In view of these and other grave departures from democratic principles we cannot support the candidates of that convention nor be bound by its acts. The democratic party has survived many defeats, but could not survive a victory won in behalf of the doctrine and policy proclaimed in its name at Chicago.

The conditions, however, which make possible such utterances from a national convention are the direct results of class legislation by the republican party. It still proclaims, as it has for years, the power and duty of government to raise and maintain

prices by law, and it proposes no remedy for existing evils except oppressive and unjust taxation.

The national democracy here convened therefore renews its declaration of faith in democratic principles, especially as applicable to the conditions of the times.

Taxation and Tariff.—Taxation, tariff, excise or direct, is rightfully imposed only for public purposes, and not for private gain. Its amount is justly measured by public expenditures, which should be limited by scrupulous economy. The sum derived by the treasury from tariff and excise levies is affected by the state of trade and volume of consumption.

The amount required by the treasury is determined by the appropriations made by congress. The demand of the republican party for an increase in tariff taxation has its pretext in the deficiency of revenue, which has its causes in the stagnation of trade and reduced consumption, due entirely to the loss of confidence that has followed the populist threat of free coinage and depreciation of our money, and the republican practice of extravagant appropriations beyond the needs of good government. We arraign and condemn the populist conventions at Chicago and St. Louis for their co-operation with the republican party in creating these conditions, which are pleaded in justification of a heavy increase of the burdens of the people by a further resort to protection. We, therefore, denounce protection and its ally, free coinage of silver, as schemes for the personal profit of a few at the expense of the many, and oppose the two parties which stand for these schemes as hostile to the people of the republic, whose food and shelter, comfort and property, are attacked by higher taxes and depreciated money.

In fine, we reaffirm the historic democratic doctrine of tariff for revenue only.

Demands for American Commerce.—We demand that henceforth modern and liberal policies toward American shipping shall take the place of our imitation of the restricted statutes of the eighteenth century, which were long ago abandoned by every maritime power but the United States, and which to the nation's humiliation have driven American capital and enterprise to the use of alien flags and alien crews, have made the stars and stripes an almost unknown emblem in foreign countries, and have virtually extinguished the race of American seamen.

We oppose the pretense that discriminating duties will promote shipping, and that scheme is an invitation to commercial warfare

upon the United States, un-American in the light of our great commercial treaties, offering no gain whatever to American shipping, while greatly increasing ocean freights on our agricultural and manufactured products.

The experience of mankind has shown that by reason of their natural qualities gold is the necessary money of the large affairs of commerce and business, while silver is conveniently adapted to minor transactions, and the most beneficial use of both together can be insured only by the adoption of the former as a standard of monetary measure, and the maintenance of silver at a parity with gold by its limited coinage under suitable safeguards of law. Thus the largest possible enjoyment of both metals is gained with the value universally accepted throughout the world, which constitutes the only practical bimetallic currency, assuring the most stable standard, and especially the best and safest money for all who earn a livelihood by labor or the produce of husbandry. They cannot suffer when paid in the best money known to man, but are the peculiar and most defenseless victims of a debased and fluctuating currency, which offers continual profits to the money changer at their cost.

Realizing these truths, demonstrated by long public inconvenience and loss, the democratic party, in the interests of the masses, and of equal justice to all, practically established by the legislation of 1834 and 1853 the gold standard of monetary measurements and likewise entirely divorced the government from banking and currency issues. To this long established democratic policy we adhere and insist upon the maintenance of the gold standard and of the parity therewith of every dollar issued by the government, and are firmly opposed to the free and unlimited coinage of silver and to the compulsory purchase of silver bullion.

But we denounce, also, the further maintenance of the present costly patchwork system of national paper currency as a constant source of injury and peril.

We assert the necessity of such intelligent currency reform as will confine the government to its legitimate functions, completely separated from the banking business, and afford to all sections of our country a uniform, safe, and elastic bank currency under government supervision, measured in volume by the needs of business.

President Cleveland Praised.—The patriotism, fidelity and courage with which President Cleveland has fulfilled his great public trust, the high character of his administration, its wisdom and

energy in the maintenance of civil order, and the enforcement of the laws, its equal regard for the rights of every class and every section, its firm and dignified conduct of foreign affairs, and its sturdy persistence in upholding the credit and honor of the nation, are fully recognized by the democratic party and will secure him a place in history beside the fathers of the republic.

We also commend the administration for the great progress made in the reform of the public service, and we endorse its effort to extend the merit system still further.

We demand that no backward step be taken, but that the reform be supported and advanced until the undemocratic spoils system of appointments shall be eradicated.

Economy in Expenditures.—We demand strict economy in the appropriations and in the administration of the government.

Arbitration and Pensions.—We favor arbitration for the settlement of international disputes. We favor a liberal policy of pensions to deserving soldiers and sailors of the United States.

The Supreme Court.—The supreme court of the United States was wisely established by the framers of our constitution as one of the three co-ordinate branches of the government. Its independence and authority to interpret the law of the land without fear or favor must be maintained. We condemn all efforts to defame that tribunal or impair the confidence and respect which it has deservedly held.

The democratic party has ever maintained and ever will maintain the supremacy of law, the independence of its judicial administration, the inviolability of contract, and the obligations of all good citizens to resist every illegal trust, combination or attempt against the just rights of property and the good order of society, in which are bound up the peace and happiness of our people.

Believing these principles to be essential to the well being of the republic we submit them to the consideration of the American people.

PLATFORM.

The national party, recognizing God as the author of all just power in government, presents the following declaration of principles, which it pledges itself to enact into effective legislation when given the power to do so:

1. The suppression of the manufacture and sale, importation, exportation and transportation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes. We utterly reject all plans for regulating, or compromising with this traffic, whether such plans be called local option, taxation, license or public control. The sale of liquors for medicinal and other legitimate uses should be conducted by the state, without profit, and with such regulations as will prevent fraud or evasion.

2. No citizen should be denied the right to vote on account of sex.

3. All money should be issued by the general government only, and without the intervention of any private citizen, corporation or banking institution. It should be based upon the wealth, stability and integrity of the nation. It should be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private, and should be of sufficient volume to meet the demands of the legitimate business interests of the country. For the purpose of honestly liquidating our outstanding coin obligations, we favor the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold, at the ratio of 16 to 1, without consulting any other nation.

4. Land is the common heritage of the people, and should be preserved from monopoly and speculation. All unearned grants of land, subject to forfeiture, should be reclaimed by the government, and no portion of the public domain should hereafter be granted except to actual settlers, continuous use being essential to tenure.

5. Railroads, telegraphs and other natural monopolies should be owned and operated by the government, giving to the people the benefit of service at actual cost.

6. The national constitution should be so amended as to allow the national revenues to be raised by equitable adjustment of tax-

ation on the properties and incomes of the people, and import duties should be levied as a means of securing equitable commercial relations with other nations.

7. The contract convict labor system, through which speculators are enriched at the expense of the state, should be abolished.

8. All citizens should be protected by law in their right to one day of rest in seven, without oppressing any who conscientiously observe any other than the first day of the week.

9. The American public schools, taught in the English language, should be maintained, and no public funds should be appropriated for sectarian institutions.

10. The president, vice-president and United States senators should be elected by direct vote of the people.

11. Ex-soldiers and sailors of the United States army and navy, their widows and minor children, should receive liberal pensions, graded on disability and term of service, not merely as a debt of gratitude, but for services rendered in the preservation of the Union.

12. Our immigration laws should be so revised as to exclude paupers and criminals. None but citizens of the United States should be allowed to vote in any state, and naturalized citizens should not vote until one year after naturalization papers have been issued.

13. The initiative and referendum, and proportional representation, should be adopted.

14. Having herein presented our principles and purposes, we invite the co-operation and support of all citizens who are with us substantially agreed.

PLATFORM.

The national silver party, in convention assembled, hereby adopts the following declaration of principles.

The paramount issue at this time in the United States is indisputably the money question. It is between the gold standard, gold bonds and bank currency on one side, and the bimetallic standard, no bonds and government currency on the other. On this issue we declare ourselves to be in favor of a distinctively American financial system. We are unalterably opposed to the single gold standard and demand the immediate return to the constitutional standard of gold and silver by the restoration by this government, independently of any foreign power, of the unrestricted coinage of both gold and silver into standard money, at the ratio of 16 to 1, and upon terms of exact equality, as they existed prior to 1873; the silver coin to be a full legal tender equally with gold for all debts and dues, public and private, and we favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

We hold that the power to control and regulate a paper currency is inseparable from the power to coin money, and hence that all currency intended to circulate as money should be issued and its volume controlled by the general government only, and should be legal tender.

We are unalterably opposed to the issue by the United States of interest-bearing bonds in time of peace, and we denounce as a blunder worse than a crime the present treasury policy, concurred in by a republican house, of plunging the country into debt by hundreds of millions, in the vain attempt to maintain the gold standard by borrowing gold; and we demand the payment of all coin obligations of the United States, as provided by existing laws, in either gold or silver coin, at the option of the government, and not at the option of the creditor.

The demonetization of silver in 1873 enormously increased the demand for gold, enhancing its purchasing power and lowering all prices measured by that standard, and since that unjust and indefensible act the prices of American products have fallen upon an average nearly 50 per cent, carrying down with them proportion-

ately the money value of all other forms of property. Such fall of prices has destroyed the profits of legitimate industry, injuring the producer for the benefit of the non-producer, increasing the burden of the debtor, swelling the gains of the creditor, paralyzing the productive energies of the American people, relegating to idleness vast numbers of willing workers, sending the shadows of despair into the home of the honest toiler, filling the land with tramps and paupers and building up colossal fortunes at the money centers.

In the effort to maintain the gold standard the country has within the past few years, in a time of profound peace and plenty, been loaded down with \$262,000,000 of additional interest-bearing debt under such circumstances as to allow a syndicate of native and foreign bankers to realize a net profit of millions on a single deal. It stands confessed that the gold standard can only be upheld by so depleting our paper currency as to force the prices of our products below the European, and even below the Asiatic, level to enable us to sell in foreign markets, thus aggravating the very evils of which our people so bitterly complain, degrading American labor and striking at the foundations of our civilization itself. The advocates of the gold standard persistently claim that the cause of our distress is overproduction—that we have produced so much that it has made us poor—which implies that the true remedy is to close the factory, abandon the farm, and throw a multitude of people out of employment, a doctrine that leaves us unnerved and disheartened and absolutely without hope for the future. We affirm it to be unquestioned that there can be no such economic paradox as overproduction, and at the same time tens of thousands of our fellow citizens remaining half clothed and half fed, and who are piteously clamoring for the common necessities of life.

Over and above all other questions of policy, we are in favor of restoring to the people of the United States the time-honored money of the constitution—gold and silver; not one, but both—the money of Washington and Hamilton and Jefferson and Monroe and Jackson and Lincoln, to the end that the American people may receive honest pay for an honest product; that an American debtor may pay his just obligations in an honest standard and not in a standard that has appreciated 100 per cent above all the great staples of our country, and to the end, further, that silver standard countries may be deprived of the unjust advantage they now enjoy

in the difference in exchange between gold and silver—an advantage which tariff legislation alone cannot overcome.

We, therefore, appeal to the people of the United States to leave in abeyance for the moment all other questions, however important and even momentous they may appear, to surrender, if need be, all former party ties and affiliations, and unite in one supreme effort to free themselves and their children from the domination of the money power—a power more destructive than any which has ever been fastened upon the civilized men of any race or in any age. And upon the consummation of our desires and efforts we invoke the gracious favor of Divine Providence.

PLATFORM.

The socialist labor party of the United States, in convention assembled, reasserts the inalienable right of all men to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

With the founders of the American republic we hold that the purpose of government is to secure every citizen in the enjoyment of this right; but in the light of our social conditions we hold, furthermore, that no such right can be exercised under a system of economic inequality, essentially destructive of life, of liberty and of happiness.

With the founders of this republic we hold that the true theory of politics is that the machinery of government must be owned and controlled by the whole people; but in the light of our industrial development we hold, furthermore, that the true theory of economics is that the machinery of production must likewise belong to the people in common.

To the obvious fact that our despotic system of economics is the direct opposite of our democratic system of politics, can plainly be traced the existence of a privileged class, the corruption of government by that class, the alienation of public property, public franchises and public functions to that class, and the abject dependence of the mightiest of nations upon that class.

Again, through the perversion of democracy to the ends of plutocracy, labor is robbed of the wealth which it alone produces, is denied the means of self-employment, and by compulsory idleness in wage slavery, is even deprived of the necessaries of life.

Human power and natural forces are thus wasted, that the plutocracy may rule.

Ignorance and misery, with all their concomitant evils, are perpetuated, that the people may be kept in bondage.

Science and invention are diverted from their humane purpose to the enslavement of women and children.

Against such a system the socialist labor party once more enters its protest. Once more it reiterates its fundamental declaration that private property in the natural sources of production and in the instruments of labor is the obvious cause of all economic servitude and political dependence.

The time is fast coming when, in the natural course of social evolution, this system, through the destructive action of its failures and crises, on the one hand, and the constructive tendencies of its trusts and other capitalistic combinations on the other hand, shall have worked out its own downfall.

We, therefore, call upon the wage workers of the United States and upon all other honest citizens, to organize under the banner of the socialist labor party into a class-conscious body, aware of its rights and determined to conquer them by taking possession of the public powers, so that, held together by an indomitable spirit of solidarity under the most trying conditions of the present class struggle, we may put a summary end to that barbarous struggle by the abolition of classes, the restoration of the land and of all the means of production, transportation and distribution to the people as a collective body, and the substitution of the co-operative commonwealth for the present state of planless production, industrial war and social disorder; a commonwealth in which every worker shall have the free exercise and full benefit of his faculties multiplied by all the modern factors of civilization.

With a view to immediate improvement in the condition of labor we present the following demands:

1. Reduction of the hours of labor in proportion to the progress of production.

2. The United States to obtain possession of the mines, railroads, canals, telegraphs, telephones, and all other means of public transportation and communication; the employes to operate the same co-operatively under control of the federal government and to elect their own superior officers, but no employe shall be discharged for political reasons.

3. The municipalities to obtain possession of the local railroads, ferries, waterworks, gas works, electric plants, and all industries requiring municipal franchises; the employes to operate the same co-operatively under control of the municipal administration and to elect their own superior officers, but no employe shall be discharged for political reasons.

4. The public lands to be declared inalienable. Revocation of all land grants to corporations or individuals, the conditions of which have not been complied with.

5. The United States to have the exclusive right to issue money.

6. Congressional legislation providing for the scientific management of forests and waterways, and prohibiting the waste of the natural resources of the country.

7. Inventions to be free to all; the inventors to be remunerated by the nation.

8. Progressive income tax and tax on inheritances, the smaller incomes to be exempt.

9. School education of all children under fourteen years of age to be compulsory, gratuitous and accessible to all by public assistance in meals, clothing, books, etc., where necessary.

10. Repeal of all pauper, tramp, conspiracy and sumptuary laws. Unabridged right of combination.

11. Prohibition of the employment of children of school age and the employment of female labor in occupations detrimental to health or morality. Abolition of the convict labor contract system.

12. Employment of the unemployed by the public authorities (county, city, state and nation).

13. All wages to be paid in lawful money of the United States. Equalization of women's wages with those of men where equal service is performed.

14. Laws for the protection of life and limb in all occupations, and an efficient employers' liability law.

15. The people to have the right to propose laws and to vote upon all measures of importance, according to the referendum principle.

16. Abolition of the veto power of the executive (national, state and municipal), wherever it exists.

17. Abolition of the United States senate and all upper legislative chambers.

18. Municipal self-government.

19. Direct vote and secret ballot in all elections. Universal and equal right of suffrage without regard to color, creed or sex. Election days to be legal holidays. The principle of proportional representation to be introduced.

20. All public officers to be subject to recall by their respective constituencies.

21. Uniform civil and criminal law throughout the United States. Administration of justice to be free of charge. Abolition of capital punishment.

CHRONOLOGICAL RECORD OF THE WAR BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

January 1st-15th. The North Atlantic squadron of the United States navy was assembled near Dry Tortugas islands, Gulf of Mexico.

January 15th-20th. Demonstrations against Americans by Spanish volunteers in Havana. Guard of Spanish soldiers placed about the United States consulate.

January 25th. Battleship Maine arrived at Havana.

February 8th-9th. Letter from Spanish Minister De Lome, disparaging President McKinley, is published. De Lome resigns. United States discusses intervention in Cuba.

February 14th. Congress requests information from the president relative to conditions in Cuba. Senor Luis Polo y Bernabe appointed Spanish minister to succeed De Lome.

February 15th. Battleship Maine blown up in Havana harbor. Lives lost 260. Spain officially expresses regret for the "incident." President appoints a board of inquiry to examine into the cause of the destruction of the Maine.

February 18th. Spanish cruiser Viscaya visits New York harbor for a week.

February 20th. The court of inquiry begins work at Havana. Cruiser Montgomery ordered to proceed to Havana.

March 5th. The United States refuses to recall Consul-General Lee at the request of Spain.

March 7th-9th. Congress appropriates \$50,000,000 for the national defense.

March 11th-15th. Mobilization of the army commenced. Battleship Oregon sails from San Francisco for Key West. Spain offers an armistice to the Cuban insurgents. Spanish fleet sails from Cadiz for the Canary islands.

March 15th-30th. Report of the Maine board of inquiry delivered to the president, and by him transmitted to congress. Commodore Schley takes command of the Flying squadron. Spain grants permission to the president to relieve the Cuban reconcentrados.

April 1st-15th. Spanish fleet arrives at the Cape Verde islands. Pope intercedes with Spain for peace. Representatives of the great powers of Europe call on the president with a plea for peace. United States consuls recalled from Cuba.

April 15th-20th. Congress declares Cuba free and directs the president to use the United States forces to free Cuba from Spanish authority. The president cables an ultimatum to Spain to Minister Woodford at Madrid. The Spanish cortes received a war-like message from the queen regent.

April 20th-25th. Minister Woodford received his passports from the Spanish government. United States military establishment increased by act of congress. British government notifies Spain that coal is contraband of war. President issues a proclamation to the neutral powers, announcing war with Spain. The North Atlantic squadron, under Rear Admiral Sampson, sails from Key West and begins the blockade of Cuban ports. Spanish ship Buena Ventur captured by the gunboat Nashville, first prize of the war. President McKinley calls for 125,000 volunteers. The powers of Europe, except Germany, issue proclamations of neutrality. Spain formally declares war with the United States. Congress declares war with Spain.

April 25th-30th. Congress passes an act increasing the regular army to 61,000 men. Mantanzas bombarded. Spanish fleet under Admiral Cervera sails from Cape Verde islands for the West Indies.

May 1st. Battle of Manila bay. Spanish fleet totally destroyed by Commodore Dewey.

May 5th-15th. Riots in Spain follow the news of Dewey's victory. Dewey is promoted to rear admiral. Cienfuegos and Car

denas attacked. San Juan de Puerto Rico bombarded. Spanish fleet appears off Martinique island. American flying squadron sails for eastern Cuba.

May 15th-30th. A new Spanish minister comes into office with Senor Sagasta as premier. Cervera's fleet arrives at Santiago de Cuba. The cruiser Charleston sails from San Francisco for Manila. Battleship Oregon arrives at Jupiter inlet, Florida. A call for 75,000 additional volunteers is issued by the president. Admiral Sampson's fleet arrives at Santiago and bombards the forts at the entrance of the harbor.

June 3d. Lieutenant Hobson and crew sink the collier Merrimac in the entrance of Santiago harbor.

June 4th. Captain Gridley, of the Olympia, Admiral Dewey's flag ship, dies at Kobe, Japan, while on his way home to the United States.

June 5th-15th. The Spanish cruiser Reina Mercedes destroyed by the American war vessels at Santiago. War revenue bill passed by congress. The American army of invasion, 16,000 men, under General Shafter, leave Key West for Santiago. Marines land at Guantanamo and skirmish with Spanish soldiers. Fort at Caimanera bombarded by American war vessels.

June 20th-30th. General Shafter's army landed at Daiquiri. The Ladrone islands in the Pacific surrender to the American Philippine expedition. Auxiliary cruiser St. Paul repulses an attack by Spanish torpedo boats off San Juan, Puerto Rico. General Merritt sails for Manila to take command of American forces in the Philippines.

July 1st-2d. Battle of El Caney, Santiago. Spanish earth-works carried by assault.

July 3d. Admiral Cervera's fleet destroyed while attempting to escape from Santiago harbor. Surrender of Santiago demanded by American forces.

July 5th-15th. Hobson and the crew of the Merrimac exchanged. German gunboat Irene withdraws from Subig bay, Philippine islands, when Dewey's ships appear to take possession. General Miles arrives in Cuba. Admiral Cervera and Spanish prisoners arrive at Portsmouth, N. H.

July 17th. Santiago surrendered. More than 22,000 Spanish soldiers became prisoners of war.

July 20th-25th. Four United States war vessels bombard and capture Nipe, Cuba; the last naval engagement in Cuban waters.

July 25th-30th. United States army, under General Miles,

lands in Puerto Rico. General Merritt lands at Cavite, Manila harbor. Spain asks for terms of peace through Cambon, French ambassador to the United States. President replies, stating American terms.

July 31st. Battle of Malate, near Manila; Spanish repulsed.

August 9th. Spain accepts terms of peace offered by the president.

August 12th-13th. Peace protocol signed. An armistice proclaimed. Blockade of Cuba raised. Manila surrenders after some fighting.

October 1st. The peace commissioners of Spain and the United States meet in the French foreign office at Paris.

October 18th. American force take formal possession of Puerto Rico, at San Juan.

October 27th. The peace commissioners of Spain accept the views of the United States commissioners respecting the Cuban debt.

October 31st. The Philippine islands demanded by the peace commissioners of the United States with a proposition to assume such portion of the Philippine debt as was incurred for actual improvements.

November 21st. Request of Spanish peace commissioners for arbitration of the third article of the protocol declined by the commissioners of the United States, who make a formal offer of \$20,000,000 for the Philippine islands.

November 28th. Spanish government accepts terms proposed by the peace commissioners of the United States.

December 10th. Treaty of peace signed at Paris, France.

December 24th. Iloilo, on the island of Panay, evacuated by the Spanish General Rios.

January 1, 1899. Spanish sovereignty in Cuba formally ceded to the United States at Havana.

February 6th-10th. Treaty of peace ratified by the United States senate. Treaty of peace signed by President McKinley.

February 20th. The Spanish cortes meet in Madrid to consider treaty of peace.

March 15th-17th. Spanish cabinet decides on ratification of treaty. Queen regent of Spain signs treaty of peace.

April 11th. Official exchange of ratifications of the treaty of peace takes place, and President McKinley issues proclamation of peace.

August 14, 1898, to February 3, 1899. Relations strained between the forces and leaders of the Philippine insurgents and those of the United States.

September 2d, 1898. Philippine insurgents invade southern Philippine islands.

December 26th. Insurgents take possession of Iloilo after evacuation by the Spanish and before the arrival of the United States troops.

December 29th. General Lawton ordered to duty in the Philippines as second in command to General Otis.

January 7, 1899. Aguinaldo, leader of the insurgents, issues a proclamation in Manila, protesting against the occupation of the Philippines by the United States, alleging that promises of independence had been violated and calling on the insurgents to continue the struggle for liberty.

January 16th. President McKinley announces appointment of Philippine commission: President Schurman, of Cornell University, Admiral Dewey, General Otis, Prof. Dean C. Worcester and Col. Charles Denby.

February 4th. Insurgents make a night attack on the American lines near Manila, and are driven back with great loss; American loss, 49 killed and 148 wounded.

February 5th. Positions of insurgents about Manila shelled by Admiral Dewey; insurgent casualties very heavy; 2,000 probably killed, many more wounded, and 4,000 made prisoners.

February 7th-8th. Insurgents reported to be in full retreat; American lines extended nine miles beyond the city of Manila. Aguinaldo asks for a truce and conference with American commanders.

February 10th. Town of Calocan, a stronghold of the insurgents near Manila, bombarded and taken.

February 11th. City of Iloilo, Panay island, taken by American forces under General Miller. Insurgent forces around Manila attacked and driven into the interior.

February 12th to March 25th. Several minor engagements in which insurgents suffer heavy losses. Six regiments of U. S. regulars ordered to Manila.

March 26th-27th. Town of Malinta taken by brigade under General Wheaton: Col. H. C. Egbert, of Twenty-second infantry, killed. Forces under General MacArthur capture Marilao; the South Dakota volunteers, led by Colonel Frost, charge insurgents commanded by Aguinaldo in person, inflicting great slaughter.

April 4th. American Philippine commissioners issue proclamation, stating intention of the United States in dealing with the islands.

April 18th-19th. Lieutenant Gilmore and fourteen men from gunboat Yorktown ambushed and captured by insurgents while trying to rescue the besieged Spanish garrison near the town of Baler. Authorities at Washington decide to send 14,000 regulars as re-enforcements to General Otis.

April 23d. Col. John Stotsenburg and Lieut. Lester E. Sisson, of Nebraska regiment, killed in an engagement with insurgents near Malolos. Several men of Iowa and Utah regiments also wounded in same engagement.

April 26th. Calumpit, new headquarters of the insurgent forces, captured after severe fighting. Fifty-first Iowa took part in this engagement. Col. Frederick Funston and volunteers from his regiment rendered effective service.

April 28th. Insurgents ask for cessation of hostilities until their congress can act on terms of peace; General Otis declines to recognize Philippine government.

April 29th. General Otis demands unconditional surrender of insurgents. Philippine insurgent commissioners return to their lines.

May 5th-18th. Desultory fighting; usual American victories.

May 20th. Admiral Dewey sailed from Manila on his way to the United States.

May 23d. The Kansas and Montana volunteer infantries and Utah battery, under Generals MacArthur and Funston, disperse 800 insurgents intrenched on railroad near Santa Anita, Luzon; insurgent loss heavy; many prisoners taken. General Lawton's expedition arrives at Malolos, having marched 120 miles in 20 days, had 22 fights, captured 28 towns, destroyed 300,000 bushels of rice, killed 400 insurgents, wounded double that number, and only lost 6 men killed and 31 wounded.

June 3d-11th. General advance of American troops east and southeast of Manila; insurgents retreat southward.

June 13th. Troops under General Lawton fight liveliest engagement of the war south of Los Pinas; insurgents retreat to fortified town of Imus; insurgent loss, 100 killed, 300 wounded.

June 15th-16th. Town of Imus taken by troops under General Lawton. Insurgents attack American lines near San Fernando in force, but are repulsed with heavy loss, by brigades under Generals Funston and Hale.

June 20th. General Wheaton's troops take Perez das Marinas without opposition. Rear Admiral Watson arrives at Manila and takes command of the American naval forces.

June 30th. Insurgent attack on American outposts at San Fernando repulsed by Seventeenth and Twelfth infantry and the Iowa volunteers.

July 6th. Gen. Joseph Wheeler is ordered to report to General Otis for duty in the Philippines.

July 17th. Censorship at Manila protested against by American newspaper correspondents.

July 22d-24th. Transports with re-enforcements arrive at Manila.

July 25th-26th. General Otis proclaims a provisional government for the island of Negros. Town of Calamba is taken by detachment of General Hall's troops after short battle.

July 30th. General Hall's troops suffer a loss of 7 killed and 23 wounded in an engagement with insurgents in the vicinity of Calamba.

August 9th. Intrenchments of insurgents near San Fernando attacked and captured after severe battle, by forces under General MacArthur. Fifty-first Iowa rendered effective service.

August 10th-12th. Several towns taken by American forces, after slight resistance.

August 17th. Enlistment of ten new regiments of volunteers ordered by war department, and colonels of these regiments appointed.

August 31st. The Sixth infantry under Lieutenant-Colonel Byrne captures Argogula, a stronghold of the insurgents in Negros; a large quantity of stores taken.

September 2d-14th. Insurgents attack several towns held by American troops, but are repulsed, without American loss.

September 19th. Insurgents in Luzon ask for a conference with Otis, and offer to release American prisoners of war.

September 23d. Olangapo on Subig bay bombarded by the Charleston, Monterey, Concord and Zafiro; men land under heavy insurgent fire, and destroy insurgent cannon. Strong insurgent positions west of Cebu attacked by forces under General Snyder, seven forts taken, with mounted cannon, and fourteen intrenched and fortified places taken.

October 1st-5th Insurgent commissioners hold a fruitless interview with General Otis at Manila. Armored cruisers Brooklyn, New Orleans, Nashville and Badger, and gunboats Marietta and Machias ordered to Manila.

October 9th-20th. Insurgent attack on American line on outskirts of Manila repulsed. General Young's advance guard of General Lawton's column occupies San Isidro.

October 30th. General Young's column enters Cabanatuan, north of San Isidro.

November 1st-6th. Several Philippine towns taken after slight resistance. Expedition of 2,500 men under General Wheaton leaves Manila on transports for Dagupan on western coast of Luzon.

November 7th. Forces under General Wheaton land under fire at San Fabian near Dagupan. Cruiser Charleston wrecked on a reef on the northwestern coast of Luzon.

November 12th. Colonel Bell takes possession of Tarlac, the insurgent capital, without opposition, Aguinaldo having escaped. Maj. John A. Logan of the Thirty-third Volunteer infantry, and six enlisted men are killed near San Jacinto in an engagement with the insurgents.

November 18th. General MacArthur continues to advance northward in Luzon, taking possession of several towns.

November 24th. Bautista, president of the Filipino congress, surrenders himself to General MacArthur.

December 3d. General Pilar, one of the insurgent leaders, killed in an engagement with American troops near Cervantes in northern Luzon. The insurgent attack on town of Vigan repulsed.

December 18th. General Lawton is shot and instantly killed near San Mateo, in Luzon.

December 20th, 1899 to March 10th, 1900. Insurgent troops scattered in bands, wage guerrilla warfare; Aguinaldo is in constant retreat, his army scattered, his congress dispersed and the people in many islands acknowledging the sovereignty of the United States.

THE TREATY OF PEACE WITH SPAIN.

The treaty of peace between the United States and Spain was signed by the members of the joint commission at Paris, December 10, 1898. The full text of the treaty is as follows:

The United States of America and her majesty, the queen regent of Spain, in the name of her august son, Don Alfonso XIII, desiring to end the state of war now existing between the two countries, have for that purpose appointed as plenipotentiaries:

The president of the United States:

William R. Day, Cushman K. Davis, William P. Frye, George Gray and Whitelaw Reid, citizens of the United States.

And her majesty, the queen regent of Spain:

Don Eugenio Montero Rios, president of the senate; Don Buenaventura de Abarzuza, senator of the kingdom and ex-minister of the crown; Don Jose de Garnica, deputy to the cortes and associate justice of the supreme court; Don Wenceslao Ramirez de Villa Urrutia, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary at Brussels, and Don Rafael Cerero, general of division.

Who, having assembled in Paris and having exchanged their full powers, which were found to be in due and proper form, have, after discussion of the matters before them, agreed upon the following articles:

ARTICLE I.

Spain relinquishes all claim of sovereignty over and title to Cuba.

And as the island is, upon its evacuation by Spain, to be occupied by the United States, the United States will, so long as such occupation shall last, assume and discharge the obligations that may under international law result from the fact of its occupation for the protection of life and property.

ARTICLE II.

Spain cedes to the United States the island of Puerto Rico and other islands now under Spanish sovereignty in the West Indies, and the island of Guam, in the Mariannes or Ladrones.

ARTICLE III.

Spain cedes to the United States the archipelago known as the Philippine Islands, and comprehending the islands lying within the following lines:

A line running from west to east along or near the twentieth parallel of north latitude, and through the middle of the navigable channel of Bachtí, from the one hundred and eighteenth to the one hundred and twenty-seventh degree meridian of longitude east of Greenwich, thence along the one hundred and twenty-seventh degree meridian of longitude east of Greenwich to the parallel of four degrees and forty-five minutes north latitude, thence along the parallel of four degrees and forty-five minutes north latitude to its intersection with the meridian of longitude one hundred and nineteen degrees and thirty-five minutes east of Greenwich thence along the meridian of longitude one hundred and nineteen degrees and thirty-five minutes east of Greenwich to the parallel of latitude seven degrees and forty minutes north, thence along the parallel of latitude seven degrees and forty minutes north to its intersection with the one hundred and sixteenth degree meridian of longitude east of Greenwich, thence by a direct line to the intersection of the tenth degree parallel of north latitude with the one hundred and eighteenth degree meridian of longitude east of Greenwich, and thence along the one hundred and eighteenth degree meridian of longitude east of Greenwich to the point of beginning.

The United States will pay to Spain the sum of \$20,000,000 within three months after the exchange of the ratifications of the present treaty.

ARTICLE IV.

The United States will, for ten years from the date of exchange of ratifications of the present treaty, admit Spanish ships and merchandise to the ports of the Philippine Islands on the same terms as ships and merchandise of the United States.

ARTICLE V.

The United States will, upon the signature of the present treaty, send back to Spain, at its own cost, the Spanish soldiers taken as prisoners of war on the capture of Manila by the American forces. The arms of the soldiers in question shall be restored to them.

Spain will, upon the exchange of the ratifications of the present treaty, proceed to evacuate the Philippines, as well as the island of Guam, on terms similar to those agreed upon by the commissioners appointed to arrange for the evacuation of Puerto Rico and other islands in the West Indies under the protocol of August 12, 1898, which is to continue in force till its provisions are completely executed.

The time within which the evacuation of the Philippine Islands and Guam shall be completed shall be fixed by the two governments. Stands of colors, uncaptured war vessels, small arms, guns of all calibres, with their carriages and accessories, powder, ammunition, live stock, and materials and supplies of all kinds belonging to the land and naval forces of Spain in the Philippines and Guam remain the property of Spain. Pieces of heavy ordnance, exclusive of field artillery, in the fortifications and coast defences shall remain in their emplacements for the term of six months, to be reckoned from the exchange of ratifications of the treaty; and the United States may in the meantime purchase such material from Spain if a satisfactory agreement between the two governments on the subject shall be reached.

ARTICLE VI.

Spain will, upon the signature of the present treaty, release all prisoners of war and all persons detained or imprisoned for political offenses in connection with the insurrections in Cuba and the Philippines and the war with the United States.

Reciprocally the United States will release all persons made prisoners of war by the American forces, and will undertake to obtain the release of all Spanish prisoners in the hands of the insurgents in Cuba and the Philippines.

The government of the United States will at its own cost return to Spain, and the government of Spain will at its own cost return to the United States, Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippines, according to the situation of their respective homes, prisoners released or caused to be released by them, respectively, under this article.

ARTICLE VII.

The United States and Spain mutually relinquish all claims for indemnity, national and individual, of every kind, of either government, or of its citizens or subjects, against the other government which may have arisen since the beginning of the late

insurrection in Cuba and prior to the exchange of ratifications of the present treaty, including all claims for indemnity for the cost of the war. The United States will adjudicate and settle the claims of its citizens against Spain relinquished in this article.

ARTICLE VIII.

In conformity with the provisions of articles 1, 2 and 3 of this treaty, Spain relinquishes in Cuba and cedes in Puerto Rico and other islands in the West Indies, in the island of Guam, and in the Philippine archipelago all the buildings, wharves, barracks, forts, structures, public highways, and other immovable property which in conformity with law belong to the public domain and as such belong to the crown of Spain.

And it is hereby declared that the relinquishment or cession, as the case may be, to which the preceding paragraph refers, cannot in any respect impair the property or rights which by law belong to the peaceful possession of property of all kinds of provinces, municipalities, public or private establishments, ecclesiastical or civic bodies, or any other associations having legal capacity to acquire and possess property in the aforesaid territories, renounced or ceded, or of private individuals, of whatsoever nationality such individuals may be.

The aforesaid relinquishment or cession, as the case may be, includes all documents exclusively referring to the sovereignty relinquished or ceded that may exist in the archives of the peninsula. Where any document in such archives only in part relates to said sovereignty a copy of such part will be furnished whenever it shall be requested. Like rules shall be reciprocally observed in favor of Spain in respect of documents in the archives of the islands above referred to.

In the aforesaid relinquishment or cession, as the case may be, are also included such rights as the crown of Spain and its authorities possess in respect of the official archives and records, executive as well as judicial, in the islands above referred to, which relate to said islands or the rights and property of their inhabitants. Such archives and records shall be carefully preserved, and private persons shall, without distinction, have the right to require, in accordance with the law, authenticated copies of the contracts, wills, and other instruments forming part of notarial protocols or files, or which may be contained in the executive or judicial archives, be the latter in Spain or in the islands aforesaid.

ARTICLE IX.

Spanish subjects, natives of the peninsula, residing in the territory over which Spain by the present treaty relinquishes or cedes her sovereignty, may remain in such territory or may remove therefrom, retaining in either event all their rights of property, including the right to sell or dispose of such property or of its proceeds; and they shall also have the right to carry on their industry, commerce and professions, being subject in respect thereof to such laws as are applicable to other foreigners. In case they remain in the territory they may preserve their allegiance to the crown of Spain by making, before a court of record, within a year from the date of the exchange of ratifications of this treaty, a declaration of their decision to preserve such allegiance; in default of which declaration they shall be held to have renounced it and to have adopted the nationality of the territory in which they may reside.

The civil rights and political status of the native inhabitants of the territories hereby ceded to the United States shall be determined by congress.

ARTICLE X.

The inhabitants of the territories over which Spain relinquishes or cedes her sovereignty shall be secured in the free exercise of their religion.

ARTICLE XI.

The Spaniards residing in the territories over which Spain by this treaty cedes or relinquishes her sovereignty shall be subject in matters civil as well as criminal to the jurisdiction of the courts of the country wherein they reside, pursuant to the ordinary laws governing the same; and they shall have the right to appear before such courts and to pursue the same course as citizens of the country to which the courts belong.

ARTICLE XII.

Judicial proceedings pending at the time of the exchange of ratifications of this treaty in the territories over which Spain relinquishes or cedes her sovereignty shall be determined according to the following rules:

First.—Judgments rendered either in civil suits between private individuals, or in criminal matters, before the date mentioned, and with respect to which there is no recourse or right of review under

the Spanish law, shall be deemed to be final, and shall be executed in due form by competent authority in the territory within which such judgments should be carried out.

Second.—Civil suits between private individuals which may on the date mentioned be undetermined shall be prosecuted to judgment before the court in which they may then be pending, or in the court that may be substituted therefor.

Third.—Criminal actions pending on the date mentioned before the supreme court of Spain against citizens of the territory which by this treaty ceases to be Spanish shall continue under its jurisdiction until final judgment; but, such judgment having been rendered, the execution thereof shall be committed to the competent authority of the place in which the case arose.

ARTICLE XIII.

The rights of property secured by copyrights and patents acquired by Spaniards in the island of Cuba, and in Porto Rico, the Philippines, and other ceded territories, at the time of the exchange of the ratifications of this treaty, shall continue to be respected. Spanish scientific, literary and artistic works not subversive of public order in the territories in question shall continue to be admitted free of duty into such territories for the period of ten years, to be reckoned from the date of the exchange of the ratifications of this treaty.

ARTICLE XIV.

Spain shall have the power to establish consular officers in the ports and places of the territories the sovereignty over which has either been relinquished or ceded by the present treaty.

ARTICLE XV.

The government of each country will, for the term of ten years, accord to the merchant vessels of the other country the same treatment in respect to all port charges, including entrance and clearance dues, light dues, and tonnage duties, as it accords to its own merchant vessels not engaged in the coastwise trade.

This article may at any time be terminated on six months' notice given by either government to the other.

ARTICLE XVI.

It is understood that any obligations assumed in this treaty by the United States, with respect to Cuba, are limited to the time

of its occupancy thereof; but it will, upon the termination of such occupancy, advise any government established in the island to assume the same obligations.

ARTICLE XVII.

The present treaty shall be ratified by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the senate thereof, and by Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain; and the ratification shall be exchanged at Washington within six months from the date hereof, or earlier if possible.

In faith whereof we, the respective plenipotentiaries, have signed this treaty and have hereunto affixed our seals.

Done in duplicate at Paris, the tenth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

The treaty was transmitted to the senate, by the president, January 4, 1899. February 6th, after over four weeks' discussion, the senate ratified the treaty by a vote of 57 to 27. The treaty was signed by President McKinley, February 10th, and by the Queen Regent of Spain, March 17th. The official exchange of treaties took place April 11th, and on the same day the president issued his proclamation of peace, which was as follows:

WHEREAS, A treaty of peace between the United States of America and Her Majesty Queen Regent of Spain, in the name of her august son, Don Alfonso XIII, was concluded and signed by their respective plenipotentiaries at Paris on the 10th day of December, 1898, the original of which, in the Spanish language, is word for word as follows:

(Here text of treaty is included).

And WHEREAS, The said convention has been duly ratified on both parts, and the ratifications of the two governments were exchanged in the city of Washington, on the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.

Now, therefore be it known, that I, William McKinley, President of the United States of America, have caused the said convention to be made public, to the end that the same and every article and clause thereof may be observed and fulfilled with good faith by the United States and the citizens thereof.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand, caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this eleventh day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-third.

THE NEW POSSESSIONS OF THE UNITED STATES.

THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

The Philippines consist of a group of nearly 2,000 islands of more or less extent, situated between longitude 120 and 130, and latitude 5 and 20, approximately, the land and sea area being 1,200 miles of latitude and 2,400 miles of longitude. They will be found on the maps lying off the southern coast of Asia. The total land area is estimated to be 140,000 square miles. Of this group, Luzon is the largest island, and Manila, the capital, is situated upon it. To give some conception of the magnitude of the Philippine group the latest estimates of areas of the largest islands are appended: Luzon, 44,400 square miles; Mindanao, 34,000; Samar, 4,800; Panay, 4,700; Mindoro, 4,000; Leyte, 3,800; Negros, 3,300; Cebu, 2,400. The population of the entire group is somewhat problematical, no census having ever been taken, although the country has been in the possession of Spain since 1565. Conservative estimates place it at 8,000,000, principally Malays, but there are thirty different races all speaking a different dialect.

The following memoranda was prepared by Major-General F. V. Greene for the government:

CLIMATE.

“The climate is one of the best known in the tropics. The islands extend from 5 degrees to 21 degrees north latitude, and Manila is

in 14 degrees 35 minutes. The thermometer during July and August rarely goes below 79 degrees or above 85 degrees. The extreme ranges in a year are said to be 61 degrees and 97 degrees, and the annual mean 81 degrees. There are three well-marked seasons, temperate and dry from November to February, hot and dry from March to May, and temperate and wet from June to October. The rainy season reaches its maximum in July and August, when the rains are constant and very heavy. The total rainfall has been as high as 114 inches in one year.

"Yellow fever appears to be unknown. The diseases most fatal among the natives are cholera and smallpox, both of which are brought from China. Low malarial fever is brought on by sleeping on the ground or being chilled by remaining without exercise in wet clothes; and diarrhoea is produced by drinking bad water or eating excessive quantities of fruit. Almost all of these diseases are preventable by proper precautions even by troops in campaign. The sickness in our troops was very small, much less than in the cold fogs at camp in San Francisco.

MINERAL WEALTH.

"Very little is known concerning the mineral wealth of the islands. It is stated that there are deposits of coal, petroleum, iron, lead, sulphur, copper, and gold in the various islands, but little or nothing has been done to develop them. A few concessions have been granted for working mines, but the output is not large. Gold is reported on Luzon, coal and petroleum on Cebu and Iloilo, and sulphur on Leyte.

AGRICULTURE.

"Although agriculture is the chief occupation of the Filipinos, yet only one-ninth of the surface is under cultivation. The soil is very fertile, and even after deducting the mountainous areas it is probable that the area of cultivation can be very largely extended and that the islands can support a population equal to that of Japan (42,000,000).

"The chief products are rice, corn, hemp, sugar, tobacco, coconuts and cacao. Coffee and cotton were formerly produced in large quantities—the former for export and the latter for home consumption; but the coffee plant has been almost exterminated by insects and the home-made cotton cloths have been driven out by the competition of those imported from England. The rice and corn are principally produced in Luzon and Mindoro and are con-

sumed in the islands. The rice crop is about 765,000 tons. It is insufficient for the demand, and 45,000 tons of rice were imported in 1894, the greater portion from Saigon, and the rest from Hong Kong and Singapore; also 8,669 tons (say 60,000 barrels) of flour, of which more than two-thirds came from China and less than one-third from the United States. The cacao is raised in the southern islands, the best quality of it at Mindanao. The sugar cane is raised in the Visayas. The crop yielded in 1894 about 235,000 tons of raw sugar, of which one-tenth was consumed in the islands and the balance, or 210,000 tons, valued at \$11,000,000, was exported, the greater part to China, Great Britain and Australia. Hemp is produced in Southern Luzon, Mindoro, the Visayas, and Mindanao. It is nearly all exported in bale. In 1894 the amount was 96,000 tons, valued at \$12,000,000. Tobacco is raised in all the islands, but the best quality and greatest amounts in Luzon. A large amount is consumed in the islands, smoking being universal among women as well as the men, but the best quality is exported. The amount in 1894 was 7,000 tons of leaf tobacco, valued at \$1,750,000. Coconuts are grown in Southern Luzon and are used in various ways.'

THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

July 6, 1898, the Hawaiian Islands were annexed to the United States by joint resolution of congress. The act of annexation became complete August 13, 1898, when the United States flag was raised over the government buildings at Honolulu. A bill is now pending before congress to create a territory of the United

States out of the islands. The provisional government which was in existence at the time the islands were annexed to the Union will continue to exercise authority until congress settles the question of government.

This group of islands is situated in the North Pacific Ocean, between 18 degrees 54 minutes and 22 degrees 15 minutes north latitude, and 154 degrees 50 minutes and 160 degrees 30 minutes west longitude. The islands of any prominence number eight, and these in order of size are, Hawaii, 4,210 square miles; Maui, 760; Oahu, 600; Kauai, 590; Molokai, 270; Lanai, 150; Niihau, 97; Kahoolawe, 63; total 6,740 square miles. All of the islands are of volcanic origin. Honolulu, the capital city, is distant from San Francisco 2,100 miles, from Yokohama, 3,445, Hong Kong, 4,961, and Sidney, Australia, via the Caroline Islands, 5,152.

There are nine or ten uninhabited islets, lying beyond the boundaries given above, which belong to, and come under the jurisdiction of, the Hawaiian government. Only five islands of the group proper are populated to any considerable extent--Hawaii, Maui, Oahu, Kauai and Molokai. Hawaii, the largest island, gives its name to the entire group and its government. This island is an aggregation of vast volcanic mountains. Hawaii leads the other islands in production, having many large sugar plantations, by far the greater portion of the coffee raising industry, and a number of expensive stock ranges.

Maui, the second in size, is composed of two mountainous formations of unequal size. Deep and fertile valleys lie between these two spurs, and produce a great variety of tropical fruits. Haleakelo, the largest extinct volcano in the world, is situated on the island.

Oahu, third in size, has more than one-third of the population of the entire group. Honolulu, the capital city, is located on this island. Honolulu harbor is the only improved harbor in the entire group. Oahu is also the greatest producer, and leads in manufacture.

Kauai is the oldest island in geological formation of the group. It is called the "Garden Isle" on account of general fertility.

Molokai, which lies about twenty-eight miles southeast of Oahu, is a long, narrow island, stretching due east and west. The island is devoted almost exclusively to the pasture of cattle and sheep.

The native population at the time of the discovery of the islands by Captain Cook in 1778 was about 200,000, but this had dwindled

to 31,019 in 1896, according to census taken that year. The total population in 1896 was 109,020, distributed according to race as follows:

There are about seventy-one miles of railroad in the islands, distributed as follows: Oahu, 38.5 miles; Maui, 13 miles; Hawaii, 20 miles. There are nearly 250 miles of telegraph. Telephone has been introduced into Honolulu and is in general use there. The capital city has a population of 29,920 and is lighted by electricity.

During the year 1897 the aggregate commerce of the islands was, in valuation, \$24,859,978; exports, \$16,021,775, and imports, \$8,838,203. The principal items of export in 1897 were: sugar, \$15,390,422; rice, \$225,575; coffee, \$99,696; hides, \$87,545; bananas, \$75,412. Exports from Hawaii to the United States amounted to \$15,962,029, or 99.62 per cent. Imports to Hawaii from the United States amounted to \$6,800,024 or 76.93 per cent.

THE ISLAND OF PUERTO RICO.

The island of Puerto Rico was discovered by Columbus November 16, 1493, on his second voyage to America, and was taken possession of in the name of Spain just three days later. The island remained Spanish territory until October 18, 1898, when it became a possession of the United States.

Puerto Rico is the most eastern of the Greater Antilles in the West Indies, lying about 500 miles east of Cuba. It is separated on the east from the Danish island of St. Thomas by a distance of fifty miles, and from the large island of Hayti on the west by the seventy-mile-wide ocean channel known as Mona Passage. It lies between 17 degrees 50 minutes and 18 degrees 30 minutes north latitude and its east and west boundaries are respectively 65 degrees 35 minutes and 67 degrees 10 minutes west longitude. The island is in form a parallelogram, being 108 miles long and thirty-seven miles wide. It has a coast line of 360 miles and an estimated area of 3,668 square miles. It has one-twelfth the dimensions of Cuba but has six times its density of population.

San Juan, the capital city, is distant from important points as follows: New York, 1,420 miles; Charleston, S. C., 1,200 miles; Key West, Fla., 1,050; Havana, 1,000 miles. The highest temperature is 99 degrees, Fahrenheit, and the lowest, 57.2 degrees; average, 78.9. The average annual rainfall is 59.5 inches.

The construction of railway has fairly commenced, there being 137 miles of railway already completed and in operation, and 170 miles in process of construction. The length of telegraph in operation is in the neighborhood of 470 miles. The telephone is in general use in the cities. The population of the island according to the census taken in 1887, was 806,708; of which 800,963 are of Spanish descent and only 5,745 are foreigners. An official census which was taken by the United States authorities and completed in January, 1900, gives the island a total population of 957,000. This census gives San Juan, the capital city, a population of 32,500, and Ponce, the largest city on the island, 56,000. There are 260 inhabitants to the square mile. The population is so dense that Mr. Phil Hanna, American consul in Puerto Rico, has advised intending immigrants from the United States to stay away, particularizing "such persons as clerks, carpenters, mechanics and laborers of all grades," there being "several hundred thousand Puerto Ricans ready to fill vacant jobs and at a low price."

Puerto Rico is known for its great fertility. Agriculture and lumbering are its principal industries. Over 500 varieties of trees are found in the forests. The leading crops are sugar, cof-

fee, tobacco, cotton and maize. The principal fruits are bananas and pineapples. Coffee is the largest article of export, being 63 per cent of the whole, while sugar comes next with 28 per cent.

Gold, carbonates and sulphides of copper, and magnetic oxide of iron are the principal minerals found. Marble, limestone and other building stones are found, but these resources have not been developed to any great extent.

Three smaller islands, Mona, on the west, and Culebra and Vieques, on the east, belong to the political organization of Puerto Rico. Mona gives its name to the wide ocean passage between Puerto Rico and Hayti. Vieques and Culebra are known as the *Islas De Paseje*. Culebra is 6 miles long, 3 miles wide, and has a population of 500. Vieques or Crab Island is 21 miles long, 13 miles wide, and has 6,000 inhabitants. These islands also came into possession of the United States.

THE ISLAND OF GUAM.

The island of Guam is the largest of the Marianne or Ladrone Islands. This group of islands lies in the Pacific ocean on a direct line between San Francisco and Manila. Honolulu lies to the southward of this line, and yet a direct line from Honolulu to Manila also passes through the Ladrone archipelago. The group extends from north to south in a row between 400 and 500 miles long, and is composed of about twenty islands. Guam is about thirty-two miles long and something over 100 miles in circumference. The population of Guam is not over 9,000 and fully 6,000 of these are located in Agana, the capital city. The original race of the Ladrone is extinct, and the present inhabitants are mostly "immigrants, or descendants from immigrants, from the Philippines." It is said that nine-tenths of the inhabitants of Guam can read and write. Spanish is the prevailing language. The island not only possesses a good harbor, but is well wooded, has plenty of water, and great fertility.

The island of Guam was ceded to the United States by Spain by article 2 of the treaty of peace. The stars and stripes were raised over the island by Commander Taussig, of the gunboat *Bennington*, February 1, 1899. Capt. Richard P. Leary, United States navy, was appointed governor of Guam by the president and assumed the duties of his office in July, 1899. He immediately issued a proclamation to the inhabitants, announcing the establishment of the authority of the United States, which would be exerted for the security of life and property and the confirmation of their rights.

THE ISLAND OF WAKE.

Commander Taussig took possession and raised the United States flag over the island of Wake, in January, 1899, while on the way to the island of Guam. Wake is a small island in the Pacific ocean on the direct route from the Hawaiian islands to Hong Kong, about 2,000 miles from the former, and 3,000 from the latter point.

THE ISLAND OF TUTUILA.

The announcement in November, 1899, that an agreement, subject to the approval of the United States, had been concluded between Great Britian and Germany, relative to the disposition of the Samoan islands, came in the nature of a surprise. This agreement as given to the public, provides for the repeal of the Samoan act, signed by Great Britian, Germany and the United States in

1889, whereby these three powers were to act as protectors of the island, while recognizing the independence of the Samoan government, the right of the natives to elect their own king or chief, and to choose a form of government suitable to their own laws and customs. The agreement further provides that the islands of Upolu and Sabaii and the small adjacent islands were to go to Germany as free property, and the island of Tutuila, with its subsidiary islands, to the United States, while Great Britian was to renounce all claim to the Samoan islands, and Germany in turn was to renounce all claim to Tongo islands and to Savage island, in favor of Great Britian, and also to cede Choiseul and San Isabel, the two eastern islands of the Solomon group, to Great Britian. The agreement further provides that compensation of claims for damages during the late conflict in Samoa is to be submitted to an imperial court of arbitration. King Oscar of Sweden and Norway is to be selected as arbitrator. The agreement or treaty was ratified by the United States senate January 16, 1900, and the island of Tutuila became a possession of the United States.

For several years there had been serious trouble in Samoa, caused largely by the claims of rival candidates among the chieftains for the position of king, and to some extent by the trade rivalry among the foreigners. In 1898 the king of Samoa, Malieta Laupepa, died, and two chieftains, Mataafa and Malieta Tanu, the latter being the son of the former king, laid claim to the throne. In the war which followed, Mataafa was successful. He was favored by the German officials and residents, while the British and Americans supported Malieta Tanu. In June, 1899, a com-

mission was appointed by the three powers to proceed to Samoa and adjust difficulties there. This commission signed a treaty, abolishing the kingship and establishing a government composed of an administrator who would be assisted by a council, composed of delegates from the three powers. But while this treaty was pending the agreement above mentioned was concluded by Great Britain, Germany and the United States.

The Samoan Islands are fourteen in number and are situated in the southern Pacific ocean. Only three islands are of any size, these being Upolu, Sabaii and Tutuila. The island of Tutuila is the smallest of the Samoan group, having an area of only fifty-four square miles. The island, however, possesses the most valuable island harbor, Pago-Pago, in the southern Pacific ocean. There are only about 4,000 inhabitants, and at the present time the island possesses but very little commercial value. But lying as it does on a direct line between San Francisco and Auckland, New Zealand, 4,000 miles from the former and 1,900 miles from the latter point, it will be valuable commercially to any nation desiring to develop southern commerce, owing to its wonderful harbor. Mr. Goward, commissioner of the United States to arrange for a treaty for the harbor of Pago-Pago, says:

The capacity of this harbor is sufficient for the accommodation of large fleets; landlocked, it is safe from hurricanes and storms, and could easily be defended from land or sea attack at a small expense. In a naval point of view it is the key position to the Samoan group, and likewise to Central Polynesia, and is especially located for protection of American commerce. The Samoan archipelago is, by reason of its geographical position in Central Polynesia, lying in the course of vessels from San Francisco to Auckland, from Panama to Sidney, and from Valparaiso to China and Japan, and from being outside the hurricane track, the most valuable group in the south Pacific. Situated half way between Honolulu and Auckland, Pago-Pago would be a most convenient stopping place or coaling station for vessels or steamers, either for supplies or the exchange of commodities. With the Pacific mail steamers making it a port for coaling, it would necessarily become the controlling commercial place in that part of Polynesia.
