About Our School: Worthington Elementary, a 4th, 5th, and 6th grade school serves the communities of Raceland and Worthington, Kentucky, within the Raceland-Worthington School District. Currently 210 students are enrolled in ten homerooms. Approximately 40% of your students are out of district. We have a full range of educational services in addtion to our regular core curricular studies, including Special Education, Gifted and Talented, School Wide Title I Reading and Math, Keybaording, and a 6th grade instrumental band. We offer courseling services, library access, music and physical education. Our school has established partnerships with the USS Kentucky. USS sailors have visited Worthington, Kentucky providing tutoring, mentoring, encouragement and improvements to the school.

How We Ensure Educational Equity: The staff at Worthington Elementary is focused on teaching to each student's potential. They are committed to providing equitable opportunities so that all students may achieve at high levels. All students are challenged daily to indentify their individual talents and interests through a range of learning activities. Students that need special assistance to master concepts are targeted in small groups or individually through programs such as Title I, the ESS after-school program, and Special Education. Teachers work with students individually or in small groups before, during and after school. All students have internet access through the computer lab.

NCLB Consequences (Title I)

- School Improvement Yr 1 (2 years not making AYP): Notify parents, implement school choice, and write or revise school plan.
- **School Improvement Yr 2** (3 years not making AYP): Notify parents, continue school choice, revise school plan, and offer supplemental services.
- **Corrective Action Yr 1** (4 years not making AYP): Notify parents, continue school choice, revise school plan, continue supplemental services, and implement corrective action.
- **Corrective Action Yr 2** (5 years not making AYP): Notify parents, continue school choice, revise school plan, continue supplemental services, continue corrective action and write a plan for Alternative Governance.
- **Restructuring** (6 years not making AYP): Notify parents, continue school choice, revise school plan, continue supplemental services, continue corrective action and implement Alternative Governance Plan.

State Assistance (Non-Title I)

Senate Bill I, signed into law in March 2009, requires state accountability for Non-Title I schools. If a non-Title I school does not make AYP in the same content area for two consecutive years, the school will be eligible for state assistance. The description "Eligible for State Assistance" will appear in the Consequences, School Status column, followed by the number "1" or "2" indicating the number of years eligible.

How We Are Doing

Kentucky's Interim School Testing and Accountability System has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests (KCCT); readiness tests by grade level; and other measures of a school's performance, including attendance, retention and dropout rates. This interim system will be replaced in the 2011-12 school year by a new testing and accountability system structured as required by statute. The goal is that, by 2014, nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished in every subject area tested.

Other Important Information About Our School

State Contest Results: Our school's Student Technology Leadership Program advanced to and competed at the state level. They presented findings and data based on their project involving GPS units and a map they made of fire hydrants in our community. They also gathered and presented historical information on the "Raceland Race Track," a local track that was functional during the 1920s.

Extracurricular Activities: Worthington Elementary has academic teams for all three grades in the building, and they all compete with local schools and on the district/regional levels. Our 6th grade boys and girls have traveling basketball teams, and we have a Youth League that offers intramural competition to all students in the school. We have several students participating in archery programs, violin instruction, student technology groups, and band.

Awards & Recognitions: Worthington had several students win area awards for spelling and essay writing. Our 4th and 5th grade academic team won the district championship and finished 1st in Quick Recall at the regional competition. We again had a student advance to the state tournament in tennis, while our archery team qualified for the state archery tournament.

What We Are Doing To Improve: Examining test scores/student work to identify strengths and weaknesses. We have developed new core extension classes at all grade levels to address gaps and areas of need in a more concentrated effort. We continue to implement the following programs: Accelerated Reading/Math, PD in research-based instruction, implementation of new content and standards, technical support from KEDC for training and gap analysis, and ESS and Para-educator assistance.
