NEW ORLEANS: TUESDAY, MARCH 13, 1830.

The following bill has been adopted by both Houses of the Legislature, and Sanctioned by the Acting Governor.

AN ACT TO AMEND THE BLACK CODE.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the State of Louisiana, in general assembly convened, That it shall not be lawful for any slave in this state, to sell, barter, exchange, give or deposit, or offer to sell, barter, exchange, give or deposit to any free person, any species of property whatever, without the written authority of his, her, or their owner or owners, specially setting forth the articles to be sold, or in the absence of the owners, without the written authority of the overseer, or other person having charge of such slave or slaves...

Section 2. Be it further enacted, That if any free person in this state, shall purchase from any slave or slaves, any species of property whatever, or receive in exchange, or acquire by barter or gift, or receive on deposit, any species of property whatever, from a slave or slaves not being specially authorized in writing as provided for in the first section of this act, to sell, barter, exchange, give or deposit the articles purchased or received in exchange or acquired by barter, gift or deposit, such free person or persons shall for every such offence, incur the penalty of fifty dollars, to be recovered before any justice of the peace or other court of competent jurisdiction, one half for the benefit of the owner or owners of the slave or slaves, and the other half for the benefit of the informer, not being owner; then the whole penalty shall inure to his, her or their benefit, and on the trial of any such free person for acquiring by purchase, barter, gift or deposit, any species of property from a slave, such slave not being authorized as required by the first section of this act, to sell, barter, exchange, give or deposit certain species of property, the fact of purchasing, bartering, exchanging, giving or depositing being proved, it shall be presumed that such sale, barter, exchange, gift or deposit was made without the written authority contemplated in the first section of this act, unless the defendant produce in open court, in his defence, such written authority as is herein before contemplated, setting authorized to be sold, bartered, exchanged, given or deposited.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, That it shall not be lawful for any free person in this state to sell, barter or exchange to any slave of slaves, any species of ardent spirits, or with the view to defeat the provisions of this section, to treat or give to any slave or slaves, any quantity of ardent spirits, more than one slave at a time, under the penalty of fifty dollars for every such offence, to be recovered before any justice of the peace or other court of competent jurisdiction, one half to the use of the owner, and the other half to the use of the informer, not being owner; and if owner, then the whole penalty for the benefit of the informer and owner.

Section 4. Be it further enacted, That upon the trial of any free person for a violation of any of the provisions of this act, that it shall and may be permitted the informer to require such persons to answer on oath in open court, interrogatories tending to establish the charge against such person or persons under this act, and that it shall be the duty of such person or persons defendant, to answer such interrogatories on oath, in open court, within the delay granted by the court; and in case of refusal to answer such interrogatories, or if the answer should be insufficient, the interrogatories not answered, shall be taken as confessed, and the provisions of any previous law to the contrary notwithstanding; and should the defendant refuse to pay the fine above mentioned, he shall be proceeded against as in ordinary civil cases, be compelled by execution of capias ad satisfaciendum.

Section 5. Be it further enacted, That nothing contained in first section of this act, shall be so construed as to forbid the selling or exchanging, or depositing by slaves employed by their owners or employers as regular market persons, of articles in the regular market place, or other place authorized by the police regulations of the parish or town, in the case may be; provided such slaves be furnished with a general permit by such owners or employers, in which the article, or several species of articles in which they are allowed to deal, are mentioned.

Section 6. Be it further enacted, That no person in this state shall be permitted to obtain a licence to retail spirituous liquors, or to keep a tipping house, or other house of public entertainment, without previously giving bond with good and sufficient security, in the sum of five hundred dollars, payable to the governor of this state, and his successors in office, which bond shall be executed before the parish judge, and be deposited in his office, and be conditioned in substance as follows: That the same shall be forfeited, and the amount thereof be recovered before any court of competent jurisdiction in this state, one half to the use of the person who shall sue thereon, and the other half to the use of the parish in which, it shall be executed; should the principal in said bond contravene any one of the provisions of this act, in relation to slaves, or should such principal keep a disorderly tipping house; or other house of public entertainment; or such principal permit an assemblage of more than three slaves, (not belonging to himself or in his employment) at the tipping house, or other house of public entertainment, kept by him, or at such other place as he may be in the act of retailing spirituous liquors at.

Section 7. Be it further enacted, That no free persons of this state shall be licenced in retail spirituous liquors, or to keep a tipping shop, or other house of public entertainment in this state, without complying with the provisions of the foregoing section, and without previously obtaining the sanction of the police jury of the parish in which he or they shall desire to obtain a licence to retail spirituous liquors, or to keep a tipping house, or other house of public entertainment, or the sanction of the corporation where one exists, and within which it is designed to retail spirits, or keep a tipping house, or other of public entertainment.

Section 8. And be it further enacted, That all offences, not capital, committed by slaves, shall be tried by the nearest justice of the peace of the parish where the offence has been committed, with the assistance of two freeholders, one of whom shall be selected by the complainant, and the other by the master of the slave; and should either party fail to select a freeholder and make him known to the justice of the peace within twenty-four hours of the time at which the slave has been apprehended, the said freeholders shall be designated by the justice of the peace, before whom the complaint has been made.

The Collectors appointed by the meeting of the Coffee-House, Cabaret, &c. Keepers, will commence on Wednesday morning to go through the squares, included between Canal E-planade and Rampart streets, agreeably to the resolve of that body.
