HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said resolution.

A message from the Senate by Mr. Davis, their Secretary, indicating this House that the Senate had concurred in said resolution, that the Black had been filled with the substance thereof, said that Messrs. Scott and Moreau, Leaser, had been appointed on the part of the Senate.

Messrs. Allard, gave notice, that to-morrow, or on future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act to repeal the act prohibiting the incorporation of slaves into other states of the Union to the state of Louisiana."

Mr. Murphy gave notice, that to-morrow, or on a future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act to authorize widows and unmarried women of age to become securities or trustees, and for other purposes."

Mr. Williamson gave notice, that to-morrow, or a future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act more effectually to prohibit free negroes and persons of colour, from immigrating into this state and for other purposes."

Mr. Mouton gave notice, that to-morrow, or a future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act to improve the navigation of Bayou Vermilion, in the parish of Lafayette."

Mr. McGuire gave notice, that to-morrow, or on a future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act to disqualify with the time prescribed by Law for attaining the age of majority, in favour of Thos. P. McFarland."

Mr. L. H. Moore, gave notice, that to-morrow, or on a future day, he would introduce a bill entitled "An act relative to the examination of the candidates for the election of the members of the general assembly."

Mr. Whistler, gave notice, that to-morrow, or on a future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act to disqualify with the time prescribed by Law for attaining the age of majority, in favour of Thos. P. McFarland."

Mr. Blinfree, gave notice, that to-morrow, or on a future day, he will introduce a bill entitled "An act to improve the navigation of the River Amite."

A message from the Senate, by Mr. Davis, their Secretary, respecting the concurrence of the House in the three resolutions.

Whigman, Landreaux and Morris, the same members that were already appointed by this House, as a committee on the letter of L. Moreau Lister.

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Had Iceland had poor rates, the landholders would have been compelled to look into and improve the condition of the people. The land ought unquestionably to be charged with the maintenance of those who have been called into being; for it is unjust that the owner of land should consume the fruits of it as exclusively his own. Had poor rates been established 200 years ago, we should have heard no complaints of redundant population. They would soon have put an end to Aborigines and savage estates. It was the duty of the government to have provided with a necessary corrective, and it is hard that the proprietors should in this day throw all the consequences of the neglect of their forefathers on the unfortunate peasantry. We maintain that the people of England, who have a large interest in improving the progress of the civil in Ireland, ought to contend for the abolition of rates in Ireland, to the benefit of the poor rates. The landowners have no right to tax the poor, and the consequences of the tax, which have been brought on the people, are by the misconduct of Government.

BURR'S PRACTICE.—It is stated by Sir John Malcolm, in his "Sketches in Persia," that "it is a frequent practice in crossing the deserts, where no water is to be found, to open a vein in the shoulder of the horse, and to drink a little blood, which, according to their opinion, benefits rather than injures the animal, while it refreshes the rider. On my appearing to doubt this fact, Rambur Beg shewed me several old horses, on which there were numerous marks of their having been bled; but he assured me that they never had recourse to phlebotomy, but on such occasions as have been stated."

COLOMBIA.—An account is received at Bogotá from Cumana stating that on the 13th Nov. official intelligence was received from the Department of Angostura, announcing that the people had risen en masse, and ejected from office Sr. Clanceo, the Intendant, & Gen. Olivarez, Military Comandant, and expelled them the country, in consequence of illiberal and unpatriotic principles exhibited by those individuals whenever any symptoms of affection were evinced by the people to the Constitution.

A vessel at Newfoundland had fallen in with the wreck of a brig, of whose crew they could make out but one, a negro slave. Arriving women were landed in the galleys and a dead body, bound to the shrouds, on which they had embarked. "The vessel which fell in with the wreck could not send a boat to their relief, but urged the sufferers to throw themselves overboard, in the hope that they might pick them up; but they said they were too weak, soon after the weather caused the vessel to disappear.

The ship *Faith*, which was spoken on the 22d of October, six days out from Rio de Janeiro, by the Gullane arrived, at Edinburgh, reported that the Brazilians, who were at war with the British, had blockaded the British effectively as the Brazilian fleet did the *La Pota*. The steam boat which had been dispatched after the *Faith*, an English Imperial frigate recently lost off Cape Pato, narrowly escaped capture by a privateer with an board, consisting of 600 men.
