HAPPENINGS 69 YEARS AGO.

(By Count de G.—)

Mr. Clay's report on the California and slavery question is very long. On the 13th, he spoke two hours and a half in its support. Its recommendations are the admission of California as a State, the establishment of territorial governments for Utah and New Mexico, and the settlement of the Northern and Western boundary of Texas, are to comprise one bill. The abolition of the slave trade in the District of Columbia is to be provided for by a separate bill, and a section is presented as an amendment to the bill the more effectually to secure the surrender of fugitives from service who may have escaped into other States. The right of California to prohibit slavery within her limits is not proposed to be questioned; and, on the other hand, the Wilmot proviso is not to be applied to the two new territories.

A telegraphic dispatch received here announces that the president still adheres to his views in relation to California and the territories, as set forth in his message. The plan of settling the question, developed in the president's message to Congress, if carried into effect, would keep up the agitation until doomsday, and finally lead to revolution and dismemberment of the Union. We cannot imagine what motives can prompt General Taylor to entertain these views.

Something New—The Spectator states that the steamer "Creole" will ply as a daily packet to the third municipality to Carrollton, during the summer, touching here and at all intermediate points or landings for passengers. This appears to be a singular enterprise, when there is a fine railroad and an hourly train of cars attended by polite and gentlemanly conductors, between New Orleans and Carrollton. And it can only be accounted for on the presumption that many people, since the developments of the late trial, are a little doubtful of Mr. Hampson's steam boilers. If this whole steam apparatus and its equivocal boilers could be dispensed with, and horse-cars substituted, Carrollton would spring up like magic. The value of property would be materially enhanced, and Bayou Street would become one of the finest thoroughfares in the world. The only trouble is that the change would deprive a celebrated engineer of his vocation and salary, and of course, however, deeply the public may be interested, it cannot be thought for a moment.

New Steel Fish-Distributing Cars for the Bureau of Fisheries.

Washington, D. C., May 9.—In conference with the policy of "safety first" which the Department of Commerce has adopted, the Bureau of Fisheries is making an effort to replace its wooden cars with those of modern steel construction. One has just been placed in service and Congress has appropriated \$40,000 for the construction of two others.

The six cars in use traveled 149,551 miles during the past year and although they met with no accidents the danger which they are subjected when used with heavy up-to-date rolling stock makes it necessary that the Government should itself use the same improved equipment which it requires of others. These cars are used in carrying the little fish from the Bureau's hatcheries to the waters in which they are to be planted, a service which covers every state in the country.

Blockade Prevents Food from Entering Country.

The Blockade of the coast of Syria by the Allies and by Turkey is working great hardship on the inhabitants of Palestine and Mt. Lebanon. Syria depended on Egypt, France and Italy for most of its food. No food has been allowed to enter the country since Turkey entered the war.

The French Government is reported to be willing to allow food to be landed at Beirut, provided an American Commission is given charge of its distribution. Naturally the Allies must be careful that no food reach their enemies.

The State Department is expecting an early concession from Turkey allowing a Commission of Americans to take charge of Relief Work in the Lebanon and Palestine.
