CITY COUNCIL OF NEW-ORLEANS. An ordinance prescribing certain measures to hinder the introduction of slaves into the city and liberties of New-Orleans.

The City Council has decreed, and does decree as follows .

ART. 1. All persons who shall introduce into the city or liberties, either by land or sea; any 12 passengers. Several way and 5 or deck. ries of the Union, shall within 24 hours, the with 363 bales cotton to sundries consignees, said slaves, and the place from where they came imported, and where they resided, before they were introduced or brok to the State; the said declaration shall be made under oath of the person who has introduced or brought the said slaves; or his agent : in default of making the said declaration within the above delay; the person so introducing or bringing said slaves, shall pay a fine of one hundred dollars, for each slave who shall be so introduced or bro't : the half of the said penalty shall go to the informer, and the other half shall be paid to the City Treasury.

ART. II. And it is further decreed, that the Mayor or the person by him appointed for the purpose, shall keep a particular register of all such declarations, and shall have them signed by the deponent, to whom he shall deliver a certificate, for which he will have the right to demand of said person the sum of one dollar. ART. III. It is further decreed, That any

person or persons who shall know that any slave has been introduced or brought into this city or the liberties, or who are intended in future to be introduced who has been accused of belonging to or been convicted of any conspiration or insurrection, which have broken out, or which have been discovered this year in any part of the United States, or who shall have resided in any county of a State or Territory of the United-States, at the time of the existance or discovery of any conspiration or insurrection in the said county, is required in the name of the public good to denounce this fact, as well as the peron who shall have introduced or brought the said slave in the state either to the Mayor of to one of the city Judges; in such case the City Council engages itself in the name of the Corporation to exert all its influence with the Legislature of the State, to obtain for the said indivi dual or individuals, a just reward, in case the person so denounced, shall be convicted of having introduced into the state any slaves who shall have been connected, or who have been accused of having been connected with any insurrection or conspiracy in any part of the United States, or who shall have resided at the time of the existence of any conspiracy or insurrection in any county of any state or Territory of the United States as above mentioned.

ART. IV. It is further decreed, That the Mayor is hereby authorised, in case that any slave or slaves concerned in or connected with any of the above mentioned cases of insurrections or conspiracy, or whether they were residing in any county of any State or Territory in the United States at the time of the existance or discovery of insurrection or conspiracy shall be denounced to him, under onth, as having been introduced into this city or liberties without being able to tell by whom, to have the said slave ar rested and confined in the parish prison, until the Legislature shall have met at their special meeting, and shall have made such dispositions of the matter as to them shall seem proper.

ART. VI. It is further decreed, That the Mayor is invited to have the present ordinance pub ished in the French and English languages. three times in each paper published in the city of New-Orleans.
