Méjico 11 de setiembre. Ha muchos dias que se habla de un proyecto de coalicion entre varios Estados de la confederacion mejicana poniendose a la cabeza de ella el Estado de Jalisco. Los comisionados con mas juicio acaso que los autores del proyecto, han reusado partir a dar cumplimiento a su mision, ya porque la estimen anti-constitucional, y subservirva del orden y sistema federal, ya tambien porque temian y conazon ir a un castillo a comer galletas de coalicion. Como hubiera sostenido Jalisco la dignidad de sus enviados? ¿Con que caracter los hubiera enviado? ¿Que lugar hubieran ocupado en el orden diplomático?

Con todo, con el ridiculo proyecto no se ha llegado a poner en planta, no podemos decir que no ha tenido acogida en ninguno de ellos (los estados) antes ni tememos que la marcha de cierto Sr. comisionado sea con el fin de... nosotros lo ignoramos todo, ni queremos adivinar nuestras conjeturas. ¿El tiempo todo descubre aun los enigmas muy secretos! ¿Se romperá la federacion con la federacion misma? (El Sol.)

Méjico 12 de setiembre.

La nacion mejicana constantemente se ha conducido con un juicio, que no espantan ciertos Sres. que han aspirado al renombre de profundos políticos. En vano se le quize estrechar a que recibiera un principe extranjero, que en clase de soberano viniese a regenerar sus destinos: en vano se combinó un plan que llegó a establecer en Tulancingo: ella penetró la malicia de los que lo dirigieron y supo continuar su marcha constitucional. En vano se intentó desacreditar al heroe del Sur; los mejicanos todos se presentaron a vindicarlo y a dar las mas relevantes pruebas de la estimacion que saben hacer del verdadero mérito.—Si hoy ha habido alguno que piense en prevaler de las circunstancias para desmembrar la federacion, estamos muy seguros de que sus ideas no tendrán acogida, y menos en los momentos en que todos los hijos de la república, se están manifestando perfectamente unidos para rechazar al enemigo comun.

Los supremos poderes se han conducido respecto de los Estados, del mejor modo que se pudiera pedir: no hay uno solo que se pueda quejar de haber sido sacrificado a los demás, y cada uno de ellos, siempre que ha sido necesario ha experimentado la proteccion de las autoridades supremas. El tiempo pondrá muy en claro las miras de los que han proyectado sostener nuestra federacion, rompiendo los lazos que la constituyen y entónces se verán equivocaciones de mucho tamaño: la idea ha sido generalmente desaprobada, y solo ha servido de manifestar lo imposible que es dividir a los mejicanos en lo que respecta a su independencia y federacion. NEW ORLEANS: TUESDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1829.

It appears that the Russians are triumphant both in Europe and Asia, their success is clouded by an enemy that may prove more formidable than the Turks—the plague. This scourge had made its appearance in the vicinity of Odessa, and as it is thence that the invading Russian armies are chiefly provisioned, if this desolating pestilence should fix itself there, an instant interruption would be given to their all-important supplies. Meantime, the system and vigor with which the passage of the Balkan, and the advance upon Constantinople, is conducting, evince skill and determination, that it will be difficult to resist.—Nothing, it would seem, can now save the Turkish capital but the positive intervention of France, Austria, and England—and even that might not—for a Russian army once in sight of the minarets of the long covered city of Constantine, would with difficulty be induced to retire, and abandon a conquest all but complete.

The new French ministry excites the bitterest diatribes from the liberal press. It is supposed to be entirely a cabinet composed through foreign intrigues and interference. The deserter Bourmont, now Secretary of War, is especially odious—as he should be. It was reported that the censorship was about to be re-established by a royal ordinance. The Journal des Débats had been ordered to be prosecuted for an article in that paper of Aug. 10, which was charged to be an offence against the person of the King, and an attack on the royal dignity, but this order was countermanded.

The Manchester Mercury, of Aug. 19, says.—Considerable sensation was produced here yesterday, by a statement that one of the leading companies in London, for effecting marine insurances, had transmitted instructions to their Agent in this town, not to grant any policies on vessels for Russia, with security against capture by the king's enemies. The general inference, of course, was, that we are about further with to go to war with the Emperor Nicholas.

Prince Chosrew Mirza, the new Persian Ambassador, arrived at Moscow 25th July, and was received with the greatest honors.

The Emperor and Empress of Russia returned to St. Petersburg on the 28th ult. both in perfect health. The Courier of the 17th says, we have just received the following communication from Paris. It asserts that Admiral de Rigny has refused to join the new Ministry, and assigns an extraordinary reason for his refusal. The French Papers, however, state that he had come to Paris with the other Ministers, who were absent at the time of their nomination, which he would scarcely have taken the trouble of doing merely to signify his rejection of office. If we are to judge of the future conduct of the Administration by the tenor of Mr. De la Bourdonnaye's Circular to the Perfects of Departments, it will be consistent with due respect for public liberties, and the security of the Charter.

SPAIN.—The Memorial Bordelais contains a proclamation of the Count d'Espagna, dated Barcelona, 30th July, in which he announces that nine persons, some of them of note, have been condemned to death for high treason.

PORTUGAL.—Lisbon letters of a late date state that great uneasiness prevailed in the Miguelite cabinet, on account of his Highness not being officially recognized by G. Britain as King of Portugal. According to reports in the French papers, Miguel will not long have to complain of a similar neglect on the part of the French Ministry, as the head of it. Prince Polignac, has been heard to speak in favour of the Usurper.

Letters from Oporto, state that two more of the unhappy Constitutionals had been ordered for execution.

SEAT OF WAR.

CAPTURE OF ERZEROU.—According to some of the German and French papers Erzeroum has fallen into the hands of the Russians, with immense spoil, and numerous prisoners amongst whom are the Séraskier and four Pachas.

[This news has been received officially at St. Petersburg. The event took place on the 27th June. One hundred and fifty cannon were taken by the Russians, 29 of them at Hassan-Kal. Erzeroum is the capital of Turcomania in Asiatic Turkey, with a population of 430,000. Its capture opens all Asiatic Turkey to the Russians.]

The following is an extract from a letter dated Odessa, July 27th:—“ We learn by a letter from Varna that our army completed on the 24th the passage of the Balkan. Count Diebitsch had pushed forward his advanced posts as far as Cape Fimin, near Burgos. Gen. Roth had established his headquarters at Aidos. The Turks have lost in the different engagements which have taken place 30 pieces of cannon. In several villages of the environs symptoms of the pest have shown themselves, but the authorities have taken all necessary measures to prevent its spreading.”

Extract of a letter from Paris. PARIS, Aug. 15.—“ I understand that the Russian Ambassador has not been unwell, as was stated, in consequence of the change of Ministry; but it is generally asserted amongst those who are well informed, that he is furious at what has taken place; and it is even said that he has uttered some threats in his interviews with Polignac. It is possible that the menacing part of the article of the Gazette, ‘‘ They who thwart them (our interests) shall be our enemies whether they be English or Russian, &c.’’ may be an answer and a public answer, to the private menace of Pozzo.”

Admiral de Rigny has refused the Ministry of the Marine. This I can state with certainty, independently of any thing that is said by the Courier or the Gazette. The Royalists say this act of de Rigny is a proof of great weakness, inasmuch as it is notorious that the present Ministers are men of his opinion and sentiments. When de Rigny came back from the Levant, he was particularly loud in condemning the saloons of Paris, the conduct of the late Ministry in several respects. He did not in any way approve of their policy in supporting the pretensions of Russia; and he disapproved of the extension of the limits of the Greek State to Arta and Volo.

He has yielded in this case to the threats of his uncle, the Baron Louis, who declares that he shall not have one centime of his immense fortune, estimated by some at 10,000,000 francs per annum (40,000L) if he accept office under the new Administration. Previously to his appointment, he had declared that he was ready to accept the post subsequently conferred on him and refused. The facts are notorious to all Paris. The Liberals praise him to the skies for his refusal, and say that it would have rendered him immortal if the battle of Navarino had not already conferred immortality on his name. The Royalists say that it will never be forgotten that he has preferred money to honor—the caprices of his uncle to the wish and service of his Sovereign.

We have translated the annexed paragraph from the Paris Journal des Débats, of the 9th ult.

“ A French painter, M. Charton, recently on a visit at the villa of Lucien Bonaparte, near Rome, was seized and carried off, from under the very roof by robbers, who mistook him for Lucien. They knocked him down on the floor, with the butt-end of a musket, and bore him away insensible. He remained three days in their hands, without being able to convince them that he was not Lucien Bonaparte. The latter paid five hundred dollars for his ransom.”

We suggested that the question of the purchase or annexation of Texas—(to be then written Texas, says an anagrammatist,) would excite peculiar objections among the politicians of the northern and middle States. We now find, in the New York American some of those to which we alluded. The editor of that paper holds the following language:—

“ With the immense benefit to be derived from the acquisition of Louisiana, we should be cautious in pronouncing against the expediency of endeavouring to obtain, for a fair equivalent, so fine a province as Texas, and which runs in various parts, upon what may, perhaps, be not improperly called our national boundaries. Yet, on the other hand, when the great preponderance of the slave states in that existing confederacy, is considered, it may well cause the inhabitants of the free states to pause, and maturely consider the effect upon our institutions and Union, of the increase, by the half dozen, of these states—bound together by one common bond of peril, of profit, and of political power. The moral considerations, too, which belong to this subject, connected with the new and vast market that this province would open to the domestic slave trade—not less atrocious in principle, if somewhat milder in practice, than that which, on the coast of Africa, is pronounced piracy, and punished with death—will not fail to present themselves with force to the minds of all considerate men.”

The reports from Cumberland in relation to the deluded and ill-fated Swea-

ringed, are numerous and contradictory. One rumour ascribes to him a confession in which he has made Rachel Cunningham, the murderer of his wife, and that this rumour is founded on fact we believe there is no doubt. Another makes him acknowledge the righteousness of the verdict, and that he deserves death—we are unable to say to what degree of credit this one is entitled. Another represents him as a hardened and indifferent sinner, callous to his own fate and regardless of the opinions of mankind—this we think is exaggerated. And another represents him as having commenced the study of his bible and the work of preparation for the awful realities of another world. We know not which of these last reports is entitled to the most weight but we sincerely hope and we are induced to believe the latter.

There is a proneness among mankind, whether deriving its origin from a hatred of crime or a secret feeling of satisfaction at the misfortunes of others, we will not say, to aggravate and heighten the darkest spots in the picture of guilty man's life, which has been exercised with unsparring harshness in this miserable being's case. Deeply guilty we believe him to be, but yet we do not like to see, as it were, all the sympathies of our nature for him, dried up and all the sterner feelings thrown into the scale that is already too heavy for man's endurance. He will soon have to pay the forfeit of exaggerated law, and we would rather be disposed to smooth than to place thorns in his path to the grave.
