In the House of Commons on the 30th of April the supply bill was under consideration, and the following grants were agreed to:—

For the corps of Sappers and Miners £82,045; for the Artillery for the Colonies 83,625; for Ireland 200,000; for the Royal Artillery 57,111; Director General of the Field Train 1,223; Medical Department 2,127; Civil Officers of the Royal Academy at Woolwich 3,402; Extraordinaries of the Ordnance 587,108; Office of Ordinance in Ireland 300,245; for compensation to superannuated and retired officers...

The Jews' Relief Bill was to be read a second time on the 3d May.

A meeting of the Governors and subscribers to the King's College was held in London on the 30th April. The report stated that the shell of the building, which will be closed before next winter, will cost 63,947, and that the College will be opened by October, 1831.

A London paper of 3d May says:—The Committee this morning decided that George Messer Dawson, Esq. has been duly elected to serve in Parliament for the county of Limerick...

Some of the Irish papers state that the suppression of the Society called the Friends of Ireland, by the Lord Lieutenant's proclamation, give very general satisfaction.

The Council of the London University, have determined to grant diplomas descriptive of the proficiency of the students in the various branches of medical science.

A sale took place at Liverpool on the 26th April, of three bags of cotton, brought by the Amethyst, from New South Wales, the first ever sent from thence to England.

Greece.—The Protocol of the conference between the Ministers of the three Powers, signed at London on the 4th February, relative to the throne of Greece, has been published in the French papers, and will be found below.

The Marquis of Londonderry rose to ask to the noble lord, the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, when he saw in his place, some questions concerning the state of our relations with Greece.

The Earl of Aberdeen said that he trusted he should be able, in a few days, to lay on their lordship's table all the papers connected with Greece.

The Marquis of Londonderry wished to know if the Prince Leopold has been nominated King of Greece, and if he had been asked to forego his naturalized position in this country?

The Earl of Aberdeen had no objection to state that the opposition of the noble marquis was correct with respect to Prince Leopold.

The Duke of Wellington said, with respect to one question put by the noble marquis, he begged leave distinctly to answer in the negative.

The Marquis of Londonderry gave notice, that if the papers respecting Greece were not produced very early in May, he would bring the subject before Parliament.

Prince Leopold arrived on the 30th of April, in London, from Paris. Preparations were making in Greece for his immediate reception...

The Russian negotiations at Constantinople, proceeded without interruption; those relative to Greece are gradually drawing to a close.

London, May 3.—The past week here, as well as at Liverpool, has produced but little of interest in the way of business; the serious indisposition of His Majesty having occasioned a great stagnation in trade throughout the country.

London, May 2.—The town continues full of anxiety and alarm upon the subject of His Majesty's health. The effect upon the public feeling has been, as it ought to be, universal and powerful.

St. James Palace was actually besieged with individuals anxious to see the bulletin, which was not exhibited till half past two o'clock.

From Galignani's Messengers. A letter from Rome announces that the Pope is in such a weak state of health that his life is considered in great danger.

Spain.—A private letter from Madrid, dated April 15th, states that the decree for the total disbandment of the Royal Volunteers was drawn up, the Government declaring that the sum necessary for their maintenance was wanted for other purposes.

The Toulon armament was making great progress; a squadron had arrived at Brest.

A review of both the military and naval forces was to take place at Brest, on the 4th or 5th of May.

M. de Bourmont, Clouet, and others, holding commands in the expedition, have passed Lyons on their way to Toulon.
