HAPPENINGS 69 YEARS AGO.

The Pope at Rome.

A letter to the London News says: "His Holiness formally entered the imperial city, from which he was so long an exile, on the 12th of April last. He was attended by all the French troops, Cardinals, Ministers of State, etc., and the crowds that lined the way by which he passed were immense, amounting to 100,000 persons. He was received with loud acclamations by the people. On the road they were so enthusiastic that at one place they lay on the ground, in order that the Pope might make a pavement of their bodies, and it was with difficulty they were induced to rise from their prostration. And yet these are the people who a year ago drove out the Pope, and shouted 'Long live Mazzini!'

New Opera House.

A splendid affair is projected at the corner of Baronne and Canal streets, on some of the old state house lots.

Jefferson Davis.

There having been called to the attention of Mr. W. O. Hart, Past Commandant of Camp Beauregard No. 130, S. C. V., a recent article in the New York Journal of Commerce likening the case of Sir Roger Casement to President Jefferson Davis, and also using as to the latter the following language: "The Leader of the Southern Confederates was the rankest kind of a traitor from the point of view of the United States Government, but as a matter of policy it was probably better not to inflict the penalty. It would have made the reconciliation of the South still more difficult and costly," thus intimating that Mr. Davis had been convicted of treason and the death penalty upon him not carried out. ago prepared an exhaustive paper on the trial of Jefferson Davis, has written to the New York Journal of Commerce as follows:

"My attention has been called to an editorial in your paper of August 7th, wherein you liken the case of Sir Roger Casement to that of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States of America, in connection with which I beg to call your attention to the fact that there is not the slightest resemblance between the two.

"Mr. Davis was indicted several times for treason by the United States Circuit Court for the Fourth Circuit and District of Virginia, sitting at Richmond, but when the case was finally heard on December 3, 1868, before Judge John C. Underwood, Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Virginia, who under the law was authorized to sit in the Circuit Court and Chief Justice Salmon P. Chase of the Supreme Court of the United States, on motion to quash the indictments there was a difference of opinion between the judges, that of the Chief Justice being that the indictment should be quashed, and as under the laws of the United States the opinion of the presiding judge in case of division becomes the decision of the court unless appealed from, the indictments would have been immediately dismissed except that the United States took an appeal, which was then allowed in criminal cases in the United States Courts only when there was a division of opinion.

"The certificate of disagreement was filed in the Supreme Court of the United States, but no action was ever taken in that court, and later on the indictments in the Circuit Court were dismissed.

"The ability, integrity, learning and intense patriotism of Chief Justice Chase has never been questioned and it has for many years been the opinion of practically every lawyer in the United States that no case existed against Mr. Davis under the indictments.

"A full history of the case will be found in Johnson's Reports of Chase's Decisions published by Dioisy and Company of New York in 1876, pages 1 to 124, under the title of "Case of Jefferson Davis."

## International Recreation Congress.

There will be held at Grand Rapids, Michigan, beginning October 26, the International Recreation Congress, under the auspices of the Playground and Recreation Association of America, and considering the great advance made in playground work in the past twelve months it is expected that the Congress will be one of the largest, most representative and important ever held; one of the features of the Congress will be the playing by the members therein of the games with the children in their playgrounds; Mr. W. O. Hart of this city, who has long been interested in playground work and who was a member of the first playground commission in this city and a member of the association, hopes to attend, having received in addition to his general notice, a special request from Secretary of War, Baker, to be present and Mr. Hart hopes other engagements will not keep him away.

discipliné, et le gouvernement la combat en laissant libre cours aux discussions sur les buts de la guerre, où l'on voit les socialistes eux-mêmes déclarer des annexions. On s'excite sur les territoires ennemis occupés, que l'on conservera ou que l'on étendra encore. Le peuple allemand retrouvé, dans ces controverses, le stimulant qui relève son moral et lui fait oublier les progrès des Russes et des Roumains. L'agitation hongroise et l'inquiétude de l'Allemagne regardent en ce moment surtout du côté de l'Orient, où le péril paraît le plus imminent. L'Autriche est hanteante sous les coups; et ce n'est plus elle seule que Hindenburg doit aider, mais les Bulgares, qu'il lance, sur le Danube, dans le dos de la Roumanie. Tous ces efforts sont anxiusement poussés, avec plus de ferveur que de foi dans le résultat. Il appartient aux Alliés de paralyser la confiance de leurs ennemis, sur le terrain de l'Orient, où la guerre a pris son point de départ. Ils y parviendront au moyen de l'application stricte du principe de l'unité d'action sur l'unité de front, qui n'a jamais été plus nécessaire que dans cet enchevêtrement d'opérations. Tandis que les Roumains luttent, à l'ouest, contre les Autrichiens, et, au sud, contre les Bulgares, renforcés d'Allemands et de Turcs, l'armée de Salonique, commandée par le général Sanrai, se hâte, à ce qu'il semble, tarder à se porter en avant, d'un pas plus accéléré qu'elle ne l'a fait jusqu'ici pour échapper les Bulgares et couper la route de Constantinople. Rien ne saurait justifier de la lenteur dans cette entreprise, pour laquelle les préparatifs sont achevés et dont dépend la solution de la guerre dans les Balkans, si ce n'est même de la guerre dans son ensemble.
