[From the Ontario Repository.] BLACK CHERRY TRRE. - A medical corres pondent of the Cooperstown Watchtower, says that the bark of this tree is poisonous. He re ates the case of a young lady to whom he was lately called, and who, in consequence of drinking about half a pint of eider, taken from a close ly stopped to the filled the evening previous with cherry bark fresh from the tree, was seized with vertigo, stupor and syncope, followed by great difficulty of respiration and vomiting. Similar effects were produced in a slighter de gree upon another person, who took from the same bottle a smaller draught of cider. He says that the French chemists have recently ascertgined that the deleterious principle of the cherry, laurel and the kernel of the peach, is very analagous to prussic acid. This acid in its oncentrated state, if a feather be dipped into it and drawn across the eye of an animal, produces instant death. Two drops, says the writer, have been known to kill a vigorous dog in a ve ry few minutes.

The Ourang Outang .- This singular animal, f whom all have heard, and so much has been said, and written, but of whom so little is cer tainly known, promises to afford a subject of much conversation, so soon as the preparation for exhibiting the one lately imported are completed. The Orang Outang, brought to this port in the ship Octavia, Capt. Blanch in the year 1825, was a native of Boroco, from whence he was carried to Batavia and falling inhe was sent consigned to Mr. Charles Thacher of this city, but died on the first night after his arrival. He was three feet and a haif high -Dr. Jeffires, who has described him, relates the diowing account of his habits and manners "He was out on board the Octavia." under the care of Capt. Blauchard, who first saw him a Mr. Forresper's house in Batavia. While sit ing a breakfast, he heard some one enter a door chind, and found a hand placed familiarly on his shoulder; on turning round, he was not, little surprised to find a heiry negro making such an unceremonious acquaintance. 
