AN ORDINANCE fixing an uniform rate of duties on hawkers, pedlars, taverns, public houses &c. in the three municipalities of New Orleans.

The general council ordain as follows:
Article. 1. A tax of forty dollars per annum payable quarterly, shall be paid by all hawkers or pedlars, and they shall the bound to take a license at the mayor's office for which they shall pay one dollar.
